States baseball team won its second game.

ARGENTINA'S "Golden Crew," a patchwork of the nation's gold medal winners in smaller boats, upset the favored University of Washington shell in the featured eight-oar race and handed the United States its first rowing shutout in the Games.

The U.S. setback was nearly as humiliating as its 73-69 loss to Cuba in basketball Sunday.

Brazil won the other two final events, with the United States settling for a bronze in the double sculls and a fifth in the fours without coxswain. But the day belonged to the Argentinians.

THEY WOUND up with four gold medals in rowing, one silver and one bronze.

The United States, dominant in Pan Am rowing since 1955, had to settle for two silvers and three bronze medals, plus two fifth place finishes.

Pouring on the power over the final 500 meters of the 2,000 meter course, the Argentinians won by two lengths over the Washington crew, stroked by Clifford Hurm of Bellingham, Wash. The winning time was 6:01.6, with the United States second in 6:10.8, followed by Canada, 6:12.4.

BRAZIL WON the double sculls in 6:53.7, followed by Argentina, 6:59.9, and the United States' John Nunn of Palos Verdes Peninsula, Calif., and Tom McKibben of Huntington Beach, Calif., in 7:01.3.

The fours without cox went to Brazil in 6:28.8. Cuba won the silver and Argentina the bronze. The United States was fifth.

The U.S. baseball team won its second game of the round robin tournament, beating Canada, 7-1, and setting up the meeting with favored Cuba today.

PAUL PATTERSON, a 6-6 righthander from Canton, N.Y., and Ithaca College, shut out the Canadians for eight innings on one hit, but finally yielded three hits and a single run in the ninth. Alon Torregano of Southwest Louisiana State contributed a double and two singles to the U.S. attack.

U.S. competitors won their heats in the 200 meter trials — Marshall Dill, 18-year-old Detroit schoolboy, in 20.9 and Willie Deckard of Los Angeles in 20.8.

IN THE 800 meters Ken Swenson of San Pedro, Calif., had to hustle to qualify by finishing third in his heat in 1:53.4.

AL FEURBACH, a 6-1 250-pound muscle man from Los Angeles, led a 1-2 U.S. placing

in the shot put with a 64-10 heave. Karl Saib of Lawrence, Kans., even bigger at 6-4 and 290, got second place with 62-8, beating out Canada's Michael Mercer, who won the bronze with 59-1.

Steve Prefontaine, a stocky, 20-year-old University of Oregon student, won the 5,000 meters by some 75 yards over teammate Steve Stageburg of Eugene, Ore., for another 1-2 U.S. triumph.

Prefontaine, running with power and confidence, covered the distance in 13:53.5.

A break in American dominance of track and field was made by an 18-year-old Canadian girl.

DEBBIE BRILL, using what she calls the "Brill Bend" patterned after the "Fosbury Flop" popularized by Dick Fosbury in the 1968 Olympics, won the women's high with a Pan Am record leap of 6'4".

Shimanski Leads Junior Tourney

Scott Shimanski of the Maple Bluff Country Club took medal honors over his home course Monday and carries a one-stroke lead into the finals today in the Junior Boys City Golf Tournament at Odana Hills.

Shimanski posted the only par 36 on the front of Maple Bluff's demanding course, then slumped to a 40 for 76, low for the day.

JEFF BECKER of Maple Bluff put together 39-38 for a 77, one stroke off the pace. Chris Johnson of Nakoma with a 78 was the only other entry to break 80. Johnson shot a par 35 on the back nine after soaring to 43 going out.

Mike Dailey, son of Warren Dailey, prominent in state amateur golf circles for many years, and Conner Bakke shot 80s to give Maple Bluff four of the five low medal scores.

The low 36 scores will continue today in the final 18 holes at Odana Hills starting at 8 a.m. Play will continue in four flights of nine each with the third flighting teeing off first. The championship flight will begin teeing off at 9:30.

IT TOOK a 91 to get into a playoff for one berth in the third flight. Five tied at 91, but Don Mutch of Public Links won with a five on No. 2.

There was one other deadlock — six at 85 — and Chip Jamieson was the one dropped into the second flight.

It took an 82 or better to get into the championship flight, and three are repeaters. They are Ralph Stamler of Public Links, Pete McKenna of Nakoma, and Conner Bakke of Maple Bluff. Gary Steinhauer failed in a bid to repeat, but

Tom Steinhauer climbed from the first to the championship flight.

A NEW CITY Junior Boys champion will be crowned this afternoon. Mike Krueger of Public Links won last year, preceded by Harold Harder of Cherokee and John Golden of Nakoma.

Nakoma and Public Links led the qualifying with 10 each. Backhawk had eight, Maple Bluff seven, and Cherokee one.

Robustelli Praises Cleveland Star

Jimmy Brown—One of a Kind

CANTON, O. (AP) — Hall of Famer Andy Robustelli said Monday there likely will never be another running back like Jimmy Brown because it is virtually impossible to duplicate two vital prerequisites — the attributes of the man and the nature of the society that spawned him.

"All of us have challenges," said Robustelli, "but today when you add them up they don't come out the same way they did years ago. Kids today don't seem to have that burning desire — because they don't need it."

"AS OUR SOCIETY becomes more wealthy, things become easier to handle and there is a tendency to dilute what you're working for, the target you're struggling for. Jimmy Brown had nothing to lose — he had a looseness inborn because of a culture.

"It's a great asset to have in sports."

Jimmy Brown, of course, is black, a product of a working mother, without a father, driven

to excel in football as a means of finding success and affluence. He found it in the National Football League by gaining a record 12,312 yards.

And it's that black background that Robustelli, a defensive end for the New York Giants who played against Brown during his greatest days, feels is one of the keys to Brown's unmatched success.

"AS PEOPLE become successful — look at the Jews, the Italians, and the Irish," Robustelli added, "they tend to blend in, worry about security and

what they have to lose, and I think that's a disadvantage." But Brown had more than nothing to lose — he had physical attributes that obviously still amaze Robustelli.

"HE had quickness, speed, strength, flexibility. He was relaxed, very poised and he was a determined guy," Robustelli pointed out. "You just never get the speed, shiftness and elusiveness he had at 220 pounds, coupled with such a great temperament."

AND, SAID Robustelli, the great Cleveland running back did what he did when there was no thinning of talent brought about by expansion to 26 teams.

"I don't want to minimize any of the kids today," Robustelli said, "but in 1960, at the height of Jimmy's career, the league was at a peak with a minimum amount of teams (12) and a maximum of quality players selected from all the colleges in the country."

Robustelli also believes Brown's achievements should be judged abstractly against the

backdrop of the football field, and that the controversy Brown has stirred as an outspoken black leader and a Hollywood movie star should not in any way detract from them.

"ALL PEOPLE have obligations, but the athlete even more so because he's projected as something special," said Robustelli. "So I think we have to control ourselves and try to live up to what people expect. But you can't do what you can't do — you can't be a hypocrite."

"None of us is perfect — we all get lost at times in the ills of society. If we were to judge for the kids, we might have to tell them this was a tremendous athlete who may not have lived the life you think he should. But then maybe all we hear is not so."

"You would also have to say he's gone about his own life and done his own thing, and as long as he doesn't tell us how to live our lives there's nothing hypocritical about it. Judge him then as a player on how he played. I don't think we can judge how anyone lives.

Ellsberg Ordered to Appear for Trial

BOSTON (UPI) — Dr. Daniel Ellsberg, who admits leaking the top secret Pentagon Papers to the press, was ordered by a federal judge Thursday to appear for trial in California on charges of illegal possession and distribution of the 47-volume study of the Vietnam war.

At a removal hearing, U.S. District Judge W. Arthur Garrity set Aug. 16 as the arraignment date for Ellsberg in Los Angeles. Garrity expressed disappointment that Ellsberg was not in court, but accepted the pledge of the chief defense attorney, Leonard B. Boudin, that Ellsberg would report as ordered.

WITH THE consent of government attorneys, Garrity continued to allow Ellsberg free on \$50,000 bail.

Garrity denied two defense motions, one for a show cause order requiring U.S. Magistrate Peter W. Princi to hold a hearing to determine whether wiretapping was used to produce the indictments against Ellsberg,

Judge Bailey Aldrich took no immediate action.

"IF THE warrant is the product of illegal wiretapping, it must be suppressed," Boudin said. He said he had no evidence that illegal wiretapping was used to produce the indictments returned by a federal Grand Jury in Los Angeles, "but it is up to the government" to prove its evidence is not tainted.

Lawrence P. Cohen, assistant U.S. attorney, said the only issue was whether Ellsberg is the man named on the two-count indictment. He said the issue of wiretapping was "irrelevant" to the proceedings.

Ellsberg, a former Defense Department and State Department economist, helped prepare the Pentagon study when he worked several years ago for the Rand Corp. in Santa Monica, Calif. He surrendered to federal authorities June 28 in Boston after he was indicted.

Chinese Missiles Confirmed by U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Defense Department said Thursday Red China probably had installed for the first time a few missiles with a range of 1,000 miles, which might be capable of hitting targets such as Japan, India, or the Soviet Union.

A Pentagon spokesman would not say, however, where the missiles were located or where they were aimed.

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
