

West Side Legion Had Stroll to State

Ray Clausen has reason to be a "little excited" about his Madison West Side Legion team.

West Side has a 10-game victory string after struggling early this season, and last weekend gained a measure of revenge from always-troublesome La Crosse by rolling through the Middleton regional tournament.

West Side became the first team to earn a berth in the State Legion Tournament opening Aug. 8 in Delavan.

"GOSH, IT'S good to be back in the State tournament," said Clausen, whose 11 years of coaching have produced a 230-88 overall record and a 1967 state champion with West Side.

"It's the first time since 1969 and has seemed like forever," he added. "La Crosse knocked us out in 1970 and 1971, and Lake Mills did it last year.

"But this team has really come along and I'm so pleased. When we started we struggled. We were always in

the games, but we lost so many by one-run margins. During the last three weeks we hit well and our defense improved. We've had the good pitching all year."

Clausen may be overstepping bounds of usual coaching reluctance, but he believes West Side will do well at state.

"WE'VE PLAYED some very good teams, and I believe we're as good as any of them in the tournament," he added. "You've got to have good pitching to be a contender, and we have good pitching."

West Side won its scenic Legion league championship with a 10-2 record, losing twice to Verona.

West Side finished with a 27-11 record, and won the final

five games of the regular season and then topped Slough-ton, 24-0; Madison Post 57, 3-2; Middleton, 16-3; and La Crosse twice, 3-1 and 6-2, to win the regional title.

"Our turn-around came, I believe, on July 12 when we lost twice to Beloit," added Clausen. "We hit (Bob) Jeffers and (Tony) Brizzolara for 23 hits in those two games. Then we beat Post 57 with a patched-up lineup on July 13, with Mike Stansell pitching the whole game. We had several boys out with injuries and only had 10 in uniform.

"WE FIGURED if we could hit the two Beloit pitchers that well and could with a bunch out of position like that, we could beat anyone.

"Fortunately in the tournament, we didn't lose and have

to come back off the wall. It's easier on the pitchers."

Clausen had seven players returning off last year's team, and added eight more, mostly from the Madison West and Edgewood High School teams.

"The Little League experience that many of these boys had was a definite help, plus we had tournament experience in high school by both West and Edgewood players," he said.

CLAUSEN'S NO. 1 pitcher is Crusader Carl (Butch) Maglio (7-2), but he also has veteran Nick Cochems (4-3), Tom Wojta (4-0), Gene Madera (1-2), Stansell (2-0), and Chris Goodrich. He lost Brad Ryan, another West hurler, with a sore arm after he posted a 4-1 record.

"Maglio has been great. He hasn't had one easy game, and lost only to Janesville and Beloit, probably the two best teams we've played this year. He threw a one-hitter and struck out 14 in nine innings against La Crosse," said Clausen.

Dave Bryant and Rocky Vitale handle the catching, while Maglio and Bryant trade at first base. The rest of the infield includes Madera, Stansell, Wojta, and Bob Os-wall, and the outfielders are Marc Meyer, Bob Whitsitt, Jeff Schillinger, and Casey Meuer.

"Bryant is having one heck of a summer," said Clausen. "He's hitting .425, has 20 doubles, and his defense has been fantastic. Vitale has also been

doing a great job catching. Whitsitt is a surprise. He's our home run leader with four. Right now Stansell, Madera, Bryant, and Vitale are all over .300, and Whitsitt is close."

Clausen is anxiously awaiting the start of the state tournament.

"Janesville and Beloit handed us six of those 11 losses, but we've played good teams from Stevens Point, Arlington Heights, and Wisconsin Rapids. We beat Sturgeon Bay twice, split with Appleton, so we've met a good share of teams who may also reach the state. We even beat an Arlington Heights boy, 3-1, who has a scholarship to USC. That's why I'm a little excited about this team."

Death Makes Drivers Think About Safety

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — Jackie Stewart said Monday that he hoped the death of British driver Roger Williamson during the Dutch Grand Prix would trigger action to improve safety on international race circuits.

"They are generally guilty of not being well equipped with fire fighting equipment and personnel," said the Scotsman who won the Formula 1 race.

"If we can put out a burning Boeing 707 at an airport, we should also be able to put out a race car with 40 gallons of petrol."

Although Stewart was critical of fire officials at the track, he said the \$900,000 spent to improve the circuit which the drivers had judged unsafe last year, now "in my opinion is a safe track."

HE SAID Williamson's death was a "classic motor racing tragedy" that could have happened on other circuits as well.

"Motor racing will never be safe," he added.

Stewart's victory Sunday was his fourth of the season and the 26th of his career, one more than the record of the late Jim Clark, a fellow Scotsman. It also gave him the lead over Emerson Fittipaldi of Brazil in the world driving championship points standings.

Stewart rejected the contention by New Zealand driver Dennis Hulme that the race should have been stopped because cars had to pass through billowing black smoke from the wreckage.

"DRIVERS WERE not in a position to judge what was going on," he said. "People on the site were in the best position to decide. We had to

go along with whatever they decided."

He was particularly bitter about suggestions that all drivers should have stopped and tried to help in the rescue operations.

"This would only increase the hazard and drivers assume that there should be enough professionals around to help," he said.

One driver, Briton David Purley, did stop his car to help. He leaped from his car and grappled alone for eight minutes to get Williamson clear while officials stood by.

"I had to run back across the track to grab a fire extinguisher," he said. "There were five or 10 people standing by, but they wouldn't come near the car."

"I WAS appealing to them to help, but they wouldn't. Three spectators jumped over the fence and came to help me, but the police had dogs and wouldn't let them come near."

"I tried to turn the car over. If only I'd had four other people I could have done it and got him out."

Purley was quoted as saying after he had been pulled away from the blazing car exhausted: "I can't believe they could be so callous or so cowardly. If they'd helped me we could have got Roger out."

Purley claimed Williamson was still alive when he reached the burning racer and could have been saved.

"He was struggling to reach the fire extinguisher... and trying to undo his suit,"

CBS Wins Suit to Air NBA

NEW YORK (AP) — The Columbia Broadcasting System will televise National Basketball Assn. games for the next three seasons under a ruling handed down Monday in Manhattan Supreme Court.

The suit was filed by the American Broadcasting Co., which had exclusive television rights to NBA games since 1964. Each three-year contract gave ABC the right to accept or decline televising NBA games.

ABC alleged in the suit that for the 1973-76 period, CBS had "plotted" with the NBA to deny ABC the right to broadcast games.

In a 17-page decision, Judge Hyman Korn said he found no evidence that CBS "acted other than as a bona fide competitor network."

Star Pro Golfers Oppose Proposed New Tour Format

HARRISON, N.Y. (AP) — At first there were the puzzled expressions, and then the reactions began to come.

"I'd have to give up the American tour," said Gary Player.

"They might lose me," said Arnold Palmer.

The reactions of pro golf's leading players were to a new tour format.

The format currently is under consideration by the tournament policy board of the PGA Tour, the governing body which conducts the tour.

The crux of the new format, announced by TPD Commissioner Joe Dey Wednesday, is this:

There would be 15 "super" tournaments each year, called TPD Championship Events, with a minimum purse of \$250,000 each. All leading players would be required to compete in all of them.

"Excuses for absence would be... illness or grave personal emergency," Dey said in a prepared statement.

That's the key that disturbed Palmer and Player.

"I can't be understanding you correctly," Player said with a frown. "If you're saying what I think you're saying, I'd have to give up the American tour."

Player, a South African, usually plays in about 15 American tournaments a year, usually in two or three trips to this country.

"They can't expect me to fly back over here every two weeks or 10 days," he said. "And what if one of these tournaments was opposite the South African Open? They couldn't expect me to miss that."

At present, the pro golfers are free agents. They are free to pick and choose which tournaments they want to play or skip. The proposal — and it's nothing more than that now — would take away that privilege.

Dey said that the plan has not been discussed with sponsors and could not become effective — if it's passed — until 1975.

"Let's face it," said Jack Nicklaus. "It's aimed at only about five or six players."

"They want to be able to assure the sponsors that those five or six will be at every tournament."

"If they say you have to play 12 of the 15, that's something else. But I'm not an employee of the TPD."

Wise Is Erasing Carlton 'Shadow'

Rick Wise is finally shaking loose from the shadow of Steve Carlton, and his emergence as one of the top pitchers in the National League is one of the main reasons the St. Louis Cardinals are atop the National League East.

Until this season, Wise's main claim to fame was that prior to the 1972 season, he was traded even-up for Carlton. While Wise compiled a 16-16 record for St. Louis, Carlton won 27 games and the Cy Young Award for the Phils.

But this year is another matter. Wise boosted his record to 12-6—and hit a three-run homer—as the Cards beat the Montreal Expos 9-3, then watched as Reggie Cleveland pitched a five-hit, 2-0 triumph in the second game of a two-night doubleheader Wednesday.

The Cards, who lost 20 of their first 25 outings, now lead the second-lace Cubs by 3 1/2 games in the NL East.

Nets Pay \$3.5 Million For Erving's Services

NEW YORK (AP) — "Buying a hockey team was duck soup compared to this," said Roy Boe, president and owner of the American Basketball Association's New York Nets, after he wrapped up the deal returning Julius "Doctor J." Erving to his native New York for at least eight years.

"I've been trying for two years to get Erving," he said. Boe, who also owns the New York Islanders of the National Hockey League, paid an estimated \$3.5 million to obtain the rights to Erving.

About \$2.5 went to the Atlanta Hawks of the National Basketball Association and \$1 million to the Virginia Squires of the American Basketball Association.

Erving, the ABA's leading scorer the past two seasons, said he was taken aback by the trade announced Wednesday.

"I was a little surprised when the trade was made," said the native of Roosevelt, N.Y., "but I want to play with any team as long as it's going to win. The fact the Nets are going to be a running team suits my style. That kind of basketball is right up my alley."

Teamster Aide Faces Vote Charge

The secretary of a Teamster-sponsored political group in Milwaukee was charged Friday with failing to report a \$1,000 contribution to the State Republican Party in 1972.

Charged was Clifford Eils, secretary-treasurer of the Greater Milwaukee Democratic-Republican Independent Voter Education (DRIVE), a non-profit group sponsored by the International Brotherhood of Teamsters.

THE CRIMINAL complaint and summons was filed in Dane County Court by Dist. Atty. H. J. (Jerry) Lynch, and

is the result of an investigation into alleged violations of the Corrupt Practices Act.

Eils was ordered to make an initial court appearance Aug. 14.

The complaint alleges DRIVE made a \$1,000 contribution to the Republican Party on Aug. 31, 1972, but failed to report it to the secretary of state.

The contribution was included in the financial statement the Republican Party filed, however, the complaint states.

ACCORDING TO the complaint, any association, committee, or group which contributes more than \$5 to a po-

litical party is required to file a statement with the secretary of state.

Although DRIVE did not mention the alleged \$1,000 contribution, it did notify the secretary of state of other contributions it made to political candidates, the complaint states.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Dan Matthews said Friday that the investigation into irregularities in the filing of expense statements is continuing. He said that in the case of DRIVE, it is unclear whether the charge is a misdemeanor or felony.

THE PENALTY for a misdemeanor is between one

month and a year in jail; and for a felony it is between one and three years in prison and a fine of between \$25 and \$1,000.

In a letter to the secretary of state Eils wrote Nov. 13, 1972, he stated that the organization is not one which endorsed or opposed any political party or candidate and thus is not necessarily under legal obligation to file a list of its financial contributions.

The letter, however, included a list of candidates to which DRIVE had made financial contributions (omitting the alleged \$1,000 to the Republican Party).

Welfare Aid Seen Cutting County Tax

Dane County's property tax levy for 1974 probably will be reduced by \$4.1-billion by provisions of the new state budget bill, County Executive George F. Reinke said Friday.

Most of the tax relief will come from state takeover of welfare costs, Reinke told the West-Towne-Middleton Rotary Club.

UNDER THE budget bill, signed Thursday by Gov. Patrick J. Lucey, the state will take over Dane County's share of welfare assistance to the aged, blind, and disabled on Jan. 1.

That will result in a saving of \$854,000, based on 1973 county appropriations, Reinke said.

The state also will assume responsibility for the medical costs now paid by the county on aid to dependent children, old age, disabled and blind assistance programs. Savings to the county will be about \$2.7-million, Reinke said.

THE OTHER savings will come under a provision ending the requirement that the county appropriate \$350 per elementary school teacher as a common school levy. That will delete about \$600,000 from the county budget, Reinke said.

The \$4.1-million in property tax reductions amounts to about 9 per cent of the county's \$46-million budget for 1973.


The state also may pick up part of the costs of operating the county's mental health clinic, Reinke said, although that has not been clearly spelled out.

THE COUNTY will benefit even more in 1975, he said, when the state takes over the county's share of aid for dependent children and administrative costs, which combined amount to another \$3.3-million, Reinke said.

Reinke said state takeover of welfare costs was "the biggest thing we got" in the budget. "It will take away a department (Social Services) over which we had little control," he said. "It will permit us to have more control of our budget."

The budget also sets a ceiling on the amount of increase for county tax levies, tying in on a percentage basis to the amount of statewide growth in assessed valuation.

Reinke said he would ask the Dept. of Revenue to rule specifically on how much Dane County's levy can increase for 1974, considering growth of the county, possible takeover of Madison Municipal Airport, and the fact that federal revenue sharing for two years was used to greatly reduce the 1973 county levy.

You will see the 1974 American Mo-

tors line Sept. 5, even before some other manufacturers' lines go on public display.

The AMC line for 1974 includes 14 models, one more than the 1973 line. All have had a "face lifting", usually including new grille, bumpers, and dashboard. The Gremlin has a much-improved looking rear end.

A quiet insulation package is featured on the Gremlin, Hornet, Matador, and Ambassador models.

JEEP, THE RECREATION vehicle, has mechanical improvements on the J series, with a full-time 4-wheel drive.

All models of the pleasure cars have safety changes which have brought promise of a 20 per cent reduction in insurance rates for at least one company.

"AMC must continue to be a small-

car specialist," said Roy D. Chapin Jr., board chairman, in addressing the newsmen.

He said the nation's fourth-largest auto firm will wind up the current production year with a total output of 380,000 cars, and said its goal continues to be 500,000.

HE SAID THE FIRM is "well along in recording one of the best fiscal years in history," earning \$40.5-million after taxes through nine months on record sales of \$1.4-billion.

The firm couldn't build enough Gremlins and Hornets to meet demands in recent months, and at auto auctions a used Gremlin is selling for more than the dealer price for a new car.

As a result, Chapin predicted increased activity at the company's plants in Milwaukee and Kenosha.

Library Offers Children Chance to Check Out Pets

LOS ALAMITOS, Calif. — Children who want to try out a pet for a short time can borrow one for a week from a library here.

All it takes is a library card to check out a rabbit, chameleon, guinea pig, hamster, turtle, or rat.

IN ALL, there are 20 pets available for loan, kept in cages in the children's section of the Los Alamitos Rossmore Library.

"We've got a waiting list of 26 for our rabbit, Honey Bunny, and most of the animals are out most of the time," says Joyce Kearns, children's section director.

Mrs. Kearns decided last spring to feature "creatures" for summer reading. Hearing of a similar lending program in Erie, Pa., she contacted the principal of a nearby elementary school in the Orange County community and got permission to keep the school's animals at the library during the summer.

PRESCHOOL and elementary school children are allowed to check out animals, taking them home in their library cages. At home they're allowed to take them out and pet them all they want.

A week's supply of food is provided with each animal. It is donated by Friends of the Library.

"One of the big advantages of these animals is that, because of their experiences in the school, they are used to being handled by children and respond to it well," Mrs. Kearns says.


