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Paul Robinson Aims for '68 Rerun

GREEN BAY (AP) — Fame came early for Paul Robinson — too early, he says, for his own good.

They spoke of him as the next Gale Sayers in 1968, when, as a Cincinnati Bengal, he became only the third rookie to rush for 1,000 yards in his first pro football season.

He never came close to matching that magic figure, however, and now is fighting for a job with the Green Bay Packers.

It is no cinch he will stick, either, although the 6-foot, 198-pounder has the kind of outside speed the Packers admit they desperately need.

He hasn't had contact since he tore rib ligaments in a goal line

scrimmage last Thursday and doesn't expect to play in tonight's intra-squad game.

"No one has given me any assurance. I just hope they will be a little patient with me," said Robinson, now 30. "I hope to end my career with the Packers, but I realize I can't expect special favors."

Robinson admits he had lacked that sort of humility and maturity in 1968 when he thought his 1,023 yards in 238 carries was worth more than Bengals Coach and General Manager Paul Brown was willing to pay.

"I guess I had kind of an attitude problem," he said. "The dollars became too important. When Paul Brown didn't pay me what I thought I deserved, I took it out on the field, only half

working."

Half-work became reflected in his rushing, which dipped to respective totals of 489, 622 and 213 yards the next three years.

"Coach Brown put up with it all for four and one-half years and then traded me to the Houston Oilers," Robinson said.

"We had some beautiful talent there, but no team balance. I finally couldn't take it and played out my option."

Robinson drifted from Houston to the World Football League's Birmingham Americans last year.

"At first, I wouldn't go to Birmingham," the Tucson, Ariz., native said. "I remembered the troubles there in the 1960s when Martin Luther King was fighting for change. I remembered dogs attacking children in the parks, churches blown up. But they flew my wife and two little girls down there and it was beautiful. Things had changed and I wanted to play."

Robinson played very well, leading the WFL champions in

rushing with 599 yards in 167 carries and catching 23 passes for 237 yards. But again there were financial problems.

"I had a three-year contract, two-year no-cut," he said. "But everything started breaking down, going bankrupt. They ended up owing everyone, including \$22,500 to me."

"We told them we wanted at least half our money before we would come back in 1975," he said. "We gave them a deadline, but in the meantime I asked my agent to see if he could get me a job back in the National Football League."

"I don't know if any other NFL teams were interested, but when my agent told me Coach (Bart Starr) was interested, I said that was it. I wanted to play for the Packers," he said.

The Packers acquired NFL rights to him from Houston last month for an undisclosed draft choice.

"The Green Bay Packers have the prestige that other teams don't," he said. "Because of Vince Lombardi and Bart Starr, who played for him, everybody has heard of the Green Bay Packers."

"When I left Tucson to come up here, all the relatives were there to send me off. I don't think it would have been that way with any other team," he said.

Robinson figures his healing ribs should permit him to resume full-scale practice next Monday.

"As a rookie, I ran the 40 in 4.4 or 4.5," he said. "Now it's about 4.6. I guess I've lost half a step, but I can still make the sweep."

"I know that's what Coach Starr is looking for, someone to complement John Brockington outside. I just hope to show these fans I can still be the Paul Robinson of 1968."

Ellis Escapes Robinson's Wrath

Frank Robinson asked what seemed to be an ironic question: "What's everyone so uptight about John Ellis for?"

The feeling had been that Frank Robinson was uptight about John Ellis, or vice-versa.

Mere weeks ago the Cleveland Indians manager had benched the big catcher and said that Ellis might never again wear the Cleveland colors.

At least, that's the way it appeared; but Robinson criticized gathered newsmen for listening with one ear Wednesday night

after Ellis' two-run eighth-inning home run had beaten the Baltimore Orioles, 3-1.

"When a story is carried somewhere else, you guys never get the full quote. The full quote was: 'He'll never be my regular catcher and he'll never play for me again if he doesn't come and

tell me he's going to play the game the way I want it played — for the good of the team.'"

"No player is bigger than the team. It's as simple as that," said Robinson.

Now it seems Ellis agrees with that philosophy, although when asked if the hatchet had been buried with the manager, he said,

"I'd rather not talk about it. I'd rather just stay away from it."

Elsewhere in the American League, California rallied to trim Chicago, 5-4; New York edged Detroit, 2-1; Oakland blanked Texas, 1-0; Milwaukee downed Boston, 6-2; and Kansas City beat Minnesota, 6-4.

Freddie Patek collected four hits and drove in three runs to lead Kansas City to victory.

Choice of Davis Cup Coach Could Keep Connors Away

NEW YORK (AP) — Will Jimmy Connors ever play for the U.S. Davis Cup team?

Not so long as Dennis Ralston was captain, he wouldn't.

Connors' manager Bill Riordan

says he won't play for Tony Trabert, either.

Trabert, a Davis Cup player and international singles champion in the 1950s and now a teaching professional in California, was named captain of the team Wednesday by the U.S. Tennis Association.

The appointment, announced at a news conference in New York, was an effort to calm the turbulent tennis waters and put the United States back into Davis Cup contention after humiliating early-round defeats the past two years.

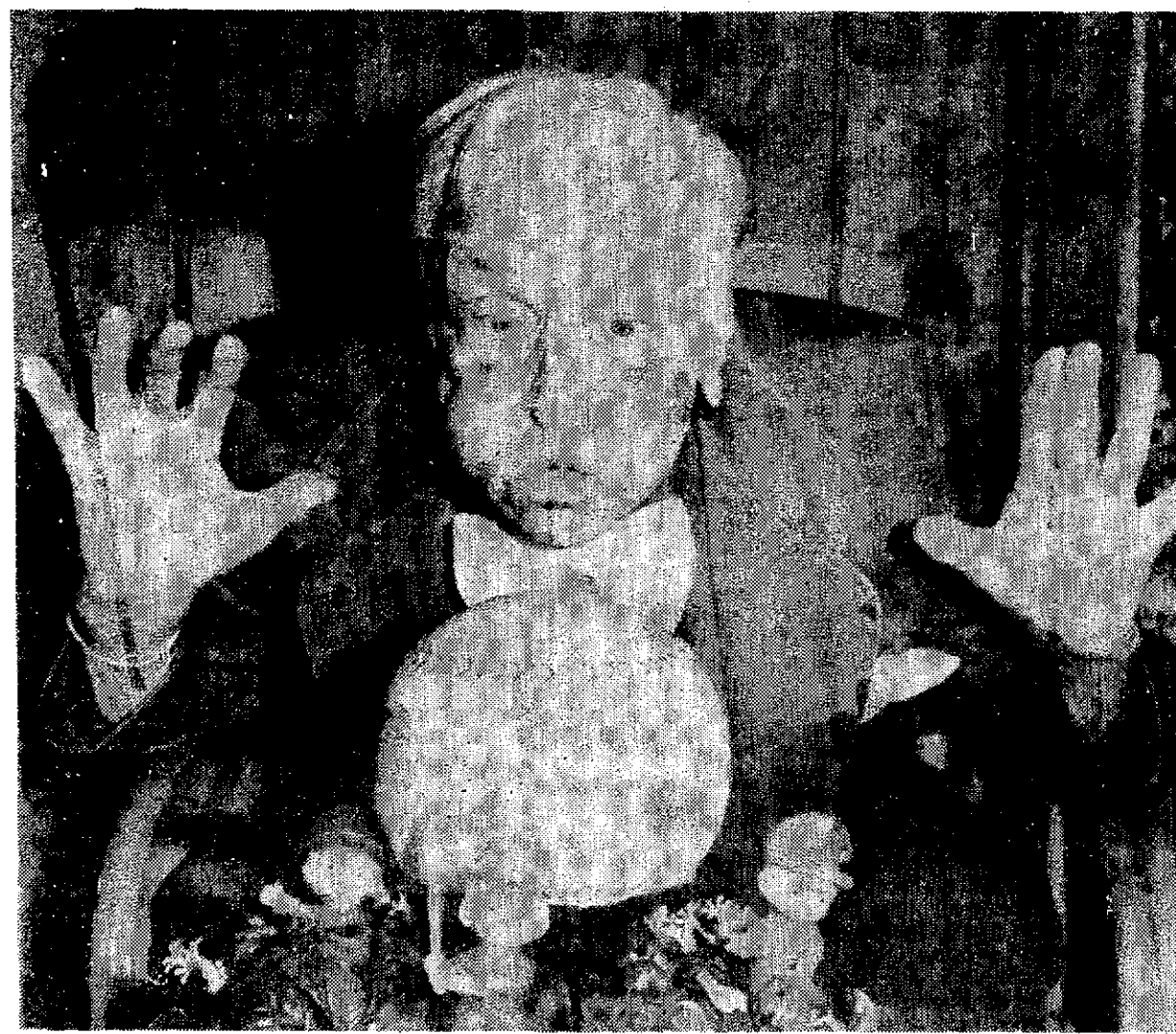
One of the keys was to get Connors to play.

"The USTA came to us four or five months ago saying they wanted to talk, to try to bring all the sides together," said Riordan from his office in Salisbury, Md.

Riordan said Stan Malles, president of the USTA, went over a list of 20 possible candidates for the job. Perhaps one would please Jimmy.

"The list was endless," said Riordan. "The only one that Jimmy couldn't agree with was Tony Trabert. It's obvious to me they don't want Connors."

Connors Hedges About Cup Play

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Jimmy Connors didn't quite answer the big question Thursday, but his attitude toward the U.S. Davis Cup team seemed to be softening.

The world's top-ranked tennis pro said he's made no decision about joining the team, "and I don't think one should be made at this time."

"Timing is very important," he added during a news conference, but declined to elaborate on that statement. "Let me say that I like to play and I try to play whenever I'm asked."

Connors sidestepped questions as to whether the appointment of Tony Trabert as Davis Cup captain would be a factor in his decision.

"I'd be happy to sit down and talk to Trabert about it," he said. "I know him and I know Dennis Ralston, the man he replaced."

There have been reports that Connors boycotted the team because of friction between him and Ralston.

Asked about that, Connors replied: "Who said I was opposed to Ralston in the past? I never said I didn't like Ralston. Maybe he said I didn't like him."

Connors said he flew here from Chicago to "coach" his friend, Ili Nastase, in the \$100,000 Pro Tennis Classic.

"I thought he might need a little help, so here I am."

There was another reason: Connors wants to test the leg he injured during Wimbledon, where he lost in the finals to Arthur Ashe.

"If the leg gets back into shape, I'll probably be in action next week in New Hampshire," Connors said.

Jazz Offers Belov a Pact
NEW YORK (AP) — Aleksander Belov, the 6-7 Soviet basketball star whose last-second shot beat the United States to the gold medal in the 1972 Olympics, was sent a contract Thursday by the New Orleans Jazz.

Under National Basketball Assn. regulations, a player picked in the annual May draft must be offered a contract by the following Aug. 1, or he becomes a free agent. The Jazz chose Belov on the 10th and final round of the draft.

A Jazz owner who announced the move, did not disclose the financial package tendered the rugged, 230-pound Russian, but said, "I think we have made him an offer commensurate with what a first-round pick received."

However, the Russian sports federation indicated last May, when Belov was drafted, that it would not allow him to play in the United States.

fall to get a four-year degree in zoology on which he lacks eight credits.

He is a serious young man who speaks articulately. His mother is a doctor in Fond du Lac, his father a commercial photographer.

He smiled sweetly in the post-tournament interview and said of the chip that won it all: "For sure, I hit it too hard. It was still bouncing as it neared the pin. I thought it was going by."

Pallin said he hit the prize shot with a sand wedge. "I usually use the sand wedge for chipping and hit down on the ball," he said. "I hit it no differently than any normal chip shot that I hit. Only it went in and won the tournament."

If the medical school dream never materializes, might he think of a golfing career, he was asked. He replied: "I don't

know. It's possible but I don't know." At 21, you don't have all the answers.

Pallin is just over 6-2 and 193 pounds. He is muscular. His 1971 Fond du Lac golf team was the state high school champion. And he was the State Amateur junior champion in 1972.

As it was, Montefusco wasn't even around long enough to face

Bench four times—as the Reds bombed out the righthander with a six-run second inning en route to an 11-6 triumph over the Giants.

"I told him before the game that I'd buy him a steak dinner if he struck me out four times," said Bench, who cracked a three-run homer in the big second-inning rally.

"Nobody's going to strike me

out four times in one game."

Montefusco also put his foot in his mouth when he confidently announced that he would shut out the heavy-hitting National League West leaders.

"Maybe The Count got everybody excited," said Bench about the Giants' swaggering young pitcher. "He got everybody motivated."

The Reds' victory, coupled with the Los Angeles Dodgers' 11-10 loss to the Atlanta Braves, boosted Cincinnati's runaway lead to 14½ games — biggest of the season.

Elsewhere, the New York Mets beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-2; the Montreal Expos turned back the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-4; the Chicago Cubs trimmed the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-3, and the San Diego Padres beat the Houston Astros, 5-3.
