Hunt sets lap record in trials

HOCKENHEIM, West Germany (AP) — World champion James Hunt of Britain clocked a record time Friday as trials began for Sunday's German Grand Prix.

Hunt, ignoring predictions that 12-cylinder Formula One racers will have an edge over his eight-cylinder McLaren-Ford, established a lap record of 1 minute, 53.68 seconds for an average speed of 133.5 miles per hour on the 4.2-mile circuit. The old mark of 1:58.8 was set in 1970 by Belgium's Jacky Ickx in a Ferrari.

Running in rainy weather with frequent training interruptions, Hunt was chased by the 12-cylinders, with Frenchman Jacques Laffitte's blue Ligier-Matra finishing second at 1:53.97 for 133.2 m.p.h. Third was Britain's John Watson in a Brabham-Alfa at 1:54.12, ahead of the red Ferraris of Niki Lauda, 1:54.35, and Carlos Reutemann, 1:54.60.

The black and gold Lotus-Ford of Mario Andretti had suspension problems and only managed an initial 11th place in 1:55.46.

A near-capacity crowd was expected for final trials today to decide positions on the starting grid.

Bullets will let Bing shop around

OCEAN CITY, Md. (AP)—General Manager Bob Ferry of the Washington Bullets said Friday that veteran guard Dave Bing has been given permission to make a deal for himself with another National Basketball Assn. team.

Bing, who will be 34 in November, signed a two-year contract when he came to the Bullets from the Detroit Pistons in a 1975 deal.

The former Washington, D.C., high school star was told he could shop around, Ferry said, after saying he wouldn't be happy with a proposed fourth guard role next season.

Bing was used sparingly during the second half of last season, after being replaced in the starting line-up by rookie Larry Wright

and Tom Henderson, who was acquired in a January trade with Atlanta.

McCarthy undergoes hip surgery

BUFFALO (AP) — Joe McCarthy, 90, former manager of the New York Yankees baseball team, was listed in good condition at Millard Fillmore Hospital Friday after undergoing surgery for a broken hip.

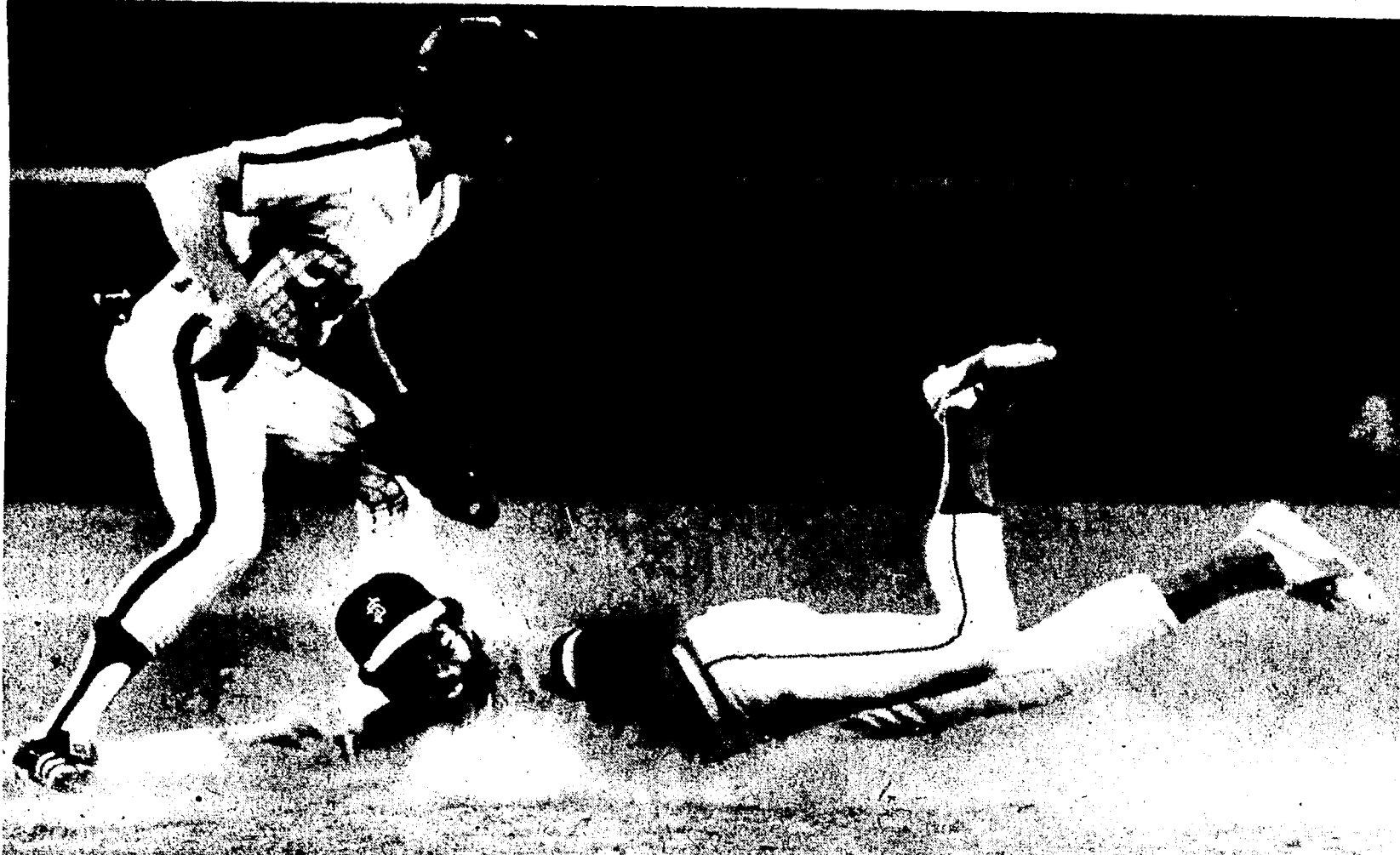
McCarthy broke his left hip in a fall at his home in the nearby town of Tonawanda Wednesday. He had a two-and-a-half-hour operation Thursday.

McCarthy managed the Yankees for 15 years in the 1930s and 1940s. He began his career as a minor league player and manager, then managed the Chicago Cubs before moving to the Yankees. He completed his career as manager of the Boston Red Sox. His teams won nine pennants and seven World Series.

Atlanta stops Pittsburgh streak

ATLANTA (AP) — Jeff Burroughs and Rod Gilbreath smashed home runs and Jerry Royster added a two-run triple as the Atlanta Braves downed Pittsburgh, 5-3, Friday night, snapping the Pirates' eight-game winning streak.

Knuckleballer Phil Niekro (10-12) went the distance, giving up eight hits and striking out seven, including four in one inning to tie a major league record. The mark was held jointly by four others.

Niekro fanned the first two batters in the sixth before Al Oliver doubled. He then struck out Rennie Stennett, who reached first on a passed ball by catcher Biff Pocoroba, with Oliver going to third on the play. After Stennett stole second, Omar Moreno became the fourth strikeout victim of the inning.

Burroughs hit his 23rd homer of the season into the centerfield seats in the second inning and Gilbreath hit his fourth of the year in the seventh.

Royster lifted the Braves out of a 2-2 tie in the fifth with his triple that scored Darrel Chaney and Gilbreath. Gary Mathews singled home a run in the fourth for the Braves.

Frank Taveras tripled and scored on a passed ball for the Pirates in the

first inning. Duffy Dyer singled in a run in the fourth and Moreno doubled home a run in the ninth.

Niekro also picked three runners off base during the first six innings. One of them was technically called a "caught-stealing."

He got Dave Parker at first base in the first inning, Moreno at second in the fourth, and then trapped Kison off second in the sixth, with the Pirate pitcher being thrown out at third base.

Atlanta threatened without scoring in the sixth, when Burroughs led off with a double before Matthews grounded out and Pocoroba drew an intentional pass. Chaney then lined into a double play.

Dodgers bunch hits to stop Expos, 4-1

MONTREAL (AP) — The Los Angeles Dodgers, held hitless by Steve Rogers for the first five innings, bunched three hits in the sixth inning to score two runs and defeated the Montreal Expos, 4-1, behind Doug Rau's four-hitter Friday night in a game called in the seventh inning because of rain.

After Rogers (11-9) struck out Steve Yeager and got Rau (12-2) to ground out to start the sixth, Dave Lopes singled to center, Bill Russell followed with a triple to the leftfield corner to score Lopes and Reggie Smith delivered a check-swing double to score Russell.

Ron Cey, who drove in the first Los Angeles run with a sacrifice fly in the fourth inning, followed with an infield single, but Smith was gunned down trying to score by a perfect throw from first baseman Tony Perez to catcher Gary Carter.

The Dodgers added their final run in the seventh when Steve Garvey beat out an infield hit, stole second and scored later when Yeager hit into a force play.

Then a driving rain began falling and plate umpire Lee Weyer finally called the game after waiting two hours, 33 minutes.

Rau improved his lifetime record to 7-1 against the Expos. The lefthander now has won five in a row against the Expos, although Friday night's triumph was his first victory this season.

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Sarah Scott of the Beloit Country Club, shaking off what she called "some bad luck" that saw her slip from 3-up to 1-down, won the 1977 Wisconsin Women's Amateur Golf Championship Friday.

She came through on the last hole in the 36-hole finale to post a 1-up victory over Laura Benciscutto, a Public Links player from Racine. Benciscutto lost the match when she overshot the pin coming onto the green, then missed the putt.

Even though she had to play catchup during the final holes, Scott said she never was really worried during a stretch that saw her lose three holes in a row.

"I had plenty of holes left," Scott said. "I didn't lose my cool, I just had some bad luck. I wasn't choking. I was just unlucky."
"Laura deserved to win. She was a really a machine there for a while. But when I'm playing well, I'm usually scrambling."

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Willie McCovey slammed his 17th home run of the season and drove in three runs and Jim Barr fired an eight hitter to post his second straight shutout as the San Francisco Giants beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-0, Friday night.

Barr (10-7) who blanked the Montreal Expos Sunday, struck out three and walked two. Barr now has pitched 19 consecutive scoreless innings.

The Giants took a 2-0 lead in the second when Jack Clark tripled as leftfielder Greg Luzinski lost his fly ball in the lights. McCovey then hit his home run over the rightfield fence.

Rob Andrews opened the Giants' third with a single and was sacrificed to second. Bill Madlock singled and Clark walked to load the bases. McCovey's ground-out scored Andrews.

Tim Foli made it 4-0 in the fourth with his fourth homer. Foli later walked in the sixth, moved to third on Marc Hill's double and scored on Barr's groundout for 5-0 lead.

San Francisco's final two runs came in the eighth on singles by Foli and Hill, a sacrifice by Barr and an error by Garry Maddox, who dropped Andrews' liner in centerfield and allowed both runs to score.

Millan's single lifts Mets to 4-1 victory

NEW YORK (AP) — Felix Millan's two-run, bases-loaded single in the seventh inning sparked New York to a 4-1 victory over the San Diego Padres Friday night and extending the Mets' winning streak to four games, equaling their longest of the season.

The victory went to Mets' starter Jerry Koosman (8-10) who struck out eight men in seven innings, raising his

season total to 137, second best in the National League. Koosman allowed only two hits and two walks.

San Diego scored in the fourth when Bill Almon walked, stole second, and scored on Dave Winfield's single to right.

The Mets rallied in the seventh against Padre starter and loser Bob Shirley (6-12). Lee Mazzilli beat out a bunt and Doug Flynn singled to right. Both men advanced when Shirley threw wildly in an attempt to pick off Mazzilli at second base. With two out, Lenny Randle walked to load the bases and Millan followed with a single to right.

Steve Henderson's single off reliever Dan Spillner scored the third run of the inning. New York scored again in the eighth when Mike Vail singled, Mazzilli doubled and, after a walk loaded the bases, pinch hitter Ed Kranepool singled in Vail.

CINCINNATI (AP) — Keith Hernandez' first grand slam homer capped a nine-run rally off Cincinnati's Jack Billingham in the second inning and helped the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Reds, 10-3, for a split of their two-night doubleheader Friday.

Pitcher Paul Moskau smashed two hits and scored two runs to lead the Reds to a 6-5 victory in the opener.

Hernandez' grand slam was his second hit in the Cardinals' second inning against Billingham (8-9). Eric Rasmussen (8-10) pitched his second complete-game victory over the Reds this week, scattering nine hits.

Mike Tyson singled home two runs

in the second inning of the second game, and Lou Brock, Garry Templeton and Ted Simmons each added run-producing singles.

Bill Plummer's first home run of the season drove in the Reds' three runs in the seventh inning.

In the first game, Joe Morgan's two-run single keyed a four-run third inning against former Red, Rawly Eastwick (5-7). George Foster singled home a run and Dan Driessen drove in the Reds' fourth run with a sacrifice fly.

The Reds opened up a 5-1 lead in the fourth when Rick Auerbach followed Cesar Geronimo's triple with a sacrifice fly. Moskau, who started the second-inning rally with a single, doubled in the sixth and scored on Pete Rose's triple.
