

San Diego knocks Cubs out of first

CHICAGO (AP) — San Diego Manager Alvin Dark had Gene Richards penciled in his lineup to play leftfield Friday and then changed his mind and went to Dave Kingman.

Kingman, playing in his favorite ball park, responded with two home runs, including a grand slam, and drove in seven runs to lead the Padres to an 11-8 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

The defeat, coupled with Philadelphia's victory over Los Angeles,

knocked the Cubs from first place in the National League Eastern Division, a perch they have held since May 28.

"When I saw how high the grass was and how wet and slow the field was, I decided to switch to Kingman," said Dark. "And, of course, that southwest wind blowing out had something to do with it."

"Richards is going to be a fine player with experience and he'll steal 75 to 80 bases one of these years. But this was not his type of day," said

Dark. "It was a Kingman day."

Kingman, who expects to be a free agent at the end of the season because the Padres have not offered him a contract, said, "I love this park; I'd like to play here all year long."

"I'm a fly ball hitter. Everything I hit is in the air and in a park like this fly balls have a chance to go out."

Kingman smashed a three-run homer off starter and loser Ray Burris (10-11) before Burris could retire a man in the first inning. He clubbed his

fifth career grand slam off reliever Paul Reuschel to cap a six-run sixth inning, giving him 17 homers on the season and boosting the Padres to a 10-4 lead.

Kingman's homers gave him a total of nine in Wrigley Field over the past two seasons. He hit six in Chicago last year and another on opening day this year when he was with the New York Mets.

The Cubs scored a pair in the first inning on a double by Bill Buckner and

run-scoring singles by Jerry Morales and Steve Ontiveros. They added two more runs in the third on doubles by Larry Bittner and Buckner and an infield out by Bobby Murcer.

George Hendrick launched San Diego's sixth with his 14th homer. Singles by Gene Tenace and Tucker Ashford and a pair of walks forced in one run, chasing Burris. Reuschel took over with the bases loaded and fanned Mike Ivie before Kingman blasted his homer.

The Cubs came back with four unearned runs in the seventh. Bittner reached on an error and scored on singles by Buckner and Morales before Ontiveros hit a three-run homer.

Dave Winfield hit his 22nd homer of the season for the Padres in the eighth.

Dave Tomlin (3-4) was the winner and Rollie Fingers worked the last two innings to earn his 24th save.

Tomlin gained the victory with three fine innings of relief. After Bittner and Buckner had doubled in the third, Rick Sawyer relieved starter Dave Wehrmeister and walked Morales. Then Tomlin took over and retired the next three batters.

The start of the game was delayed 29 minutes because of rain. There was also 21-minute delay during the Padres' half of the third inning.

Phils grab first place by whipping Dodgers

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Greg Luzinski hit a two-run homer in the eighth inning to ignite a seven-run rally Friday night that led Philadelphia to an 8-3 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers and enabled the Phillies to take over first place in the National League Eastern Division.

The victory gave the Phillies a half-game lead over the Chicago Cubs, who were beaten Friday by San Diego.

Mike Schmidt opened the inning with his third single of the night and Luzinski tied the game at 3-3 with his 27th home run of the season to knock out starter Rick Rhoden.

Lance Rautzhan replaced Rhoden and the Phillies greeted him with singles by Rich Hebner and Garry Maddox. After Bob Boone popped out trying to bunt, Ted Sizemore singled in Hebner with the go-ahead run. Pinch-hitter Tim McCarver greeted reliever Elias Sosa with a single that scored Maddox, then Jay Johnstone singled home Sizemore. After Larry Bowa grounded into a force out, Schmidt doubled to right-centerfield to make it 8-3.

The Dodgers had taken a 3-1 lead in the eighth on singles by Reggie Smith and Ron Cey, a double by Steve Garvey and a sacrifice fly by Johnny Oates.

Gene Garber, who replaced starter Jim Lonborg in the eighth, picked up his fifth victory in 10 decisions with Ron Reed relieving in the ninth.

The loss dropped the Cubs out of first place for the first time since May 27. It is the first time this season that the Phillies have moved into first.

Gridders enter no contest plea

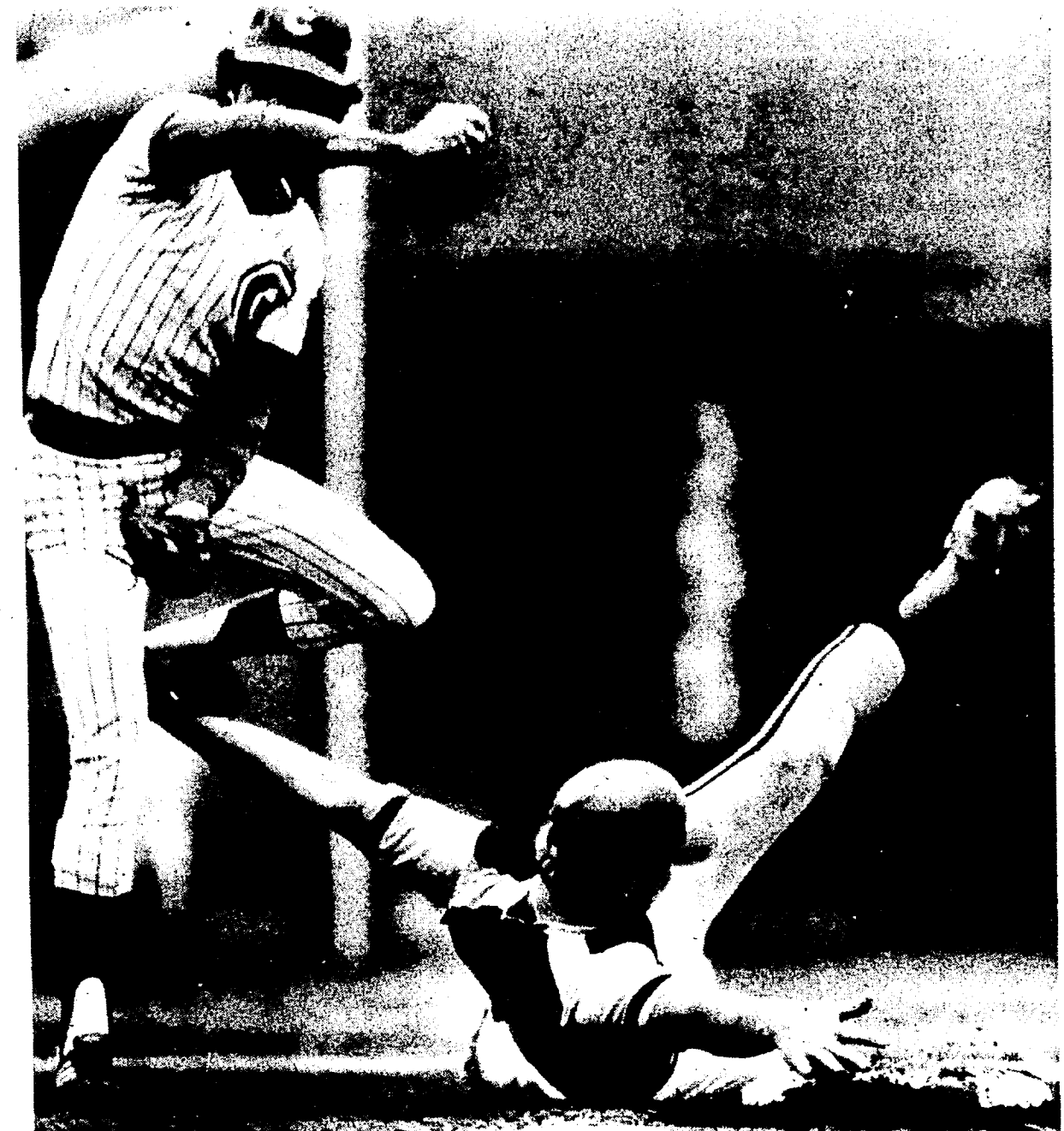
Athletes Ira Matthews and Robert Harris, both 19, entered the pleas after a pre-trial conference before Dane County Judge William Buenzli.

Matthews starred last year as a sophomore in the Badger backfield, and Harris, who no longer attends UW, was a freshman halfback. Police officers chased and arrested the two May 22 when they fled during questioning at the mall about purchases of clothing and sporting equipment made with the stolen card.

Packer opener to showcase rookies

GREEN BAY (AP) — No fewer than five first-round choices in this year's National Football League draft will be showcased when the Green Bay Packers play the Cincinnati Bengals in an exhibition opener here tonight (8 p.m., Ch. 3).

Unfortunately for Packer Coach Bart Starr, whose rebuilding program leans heavily on the draft, three of the prized rookies belong to the Bengals, who have been able to stockpile high draft picks despite their consistently high position in the standings.

The Bengals' talent is considered deeper than that of all but a few NFL teams, as their 10-4 record of last year attests. So they swapped what they deemed to be expendable talent to a pair of also-rans, and wound up with two of the first eight picks in last spring's draft.

Drafting third with a choice obtained from Buffalo, the Bengals landed Eddie Edwards, a 6-5, 250-pound defensive tackle from Miami. Then they used the eighth pick, acquired from Philadelphia, to pick 268-pound Wilson Whitley, a defensive tackle from Houston. They used their own pick, the 22nd, to draft tight end Mike Cobb of Michigan State.

But the Bengals' talent corraling didn't stop there. Their second-round pick was one of college football's most publicized players of the last four years — Pete Johnson, the 250-pound Ohio State fullback who scored a Big 10 record 58 touchdowns in four years.

Johnson is reunited in the Bengal backfield with former Ohio State teammate and two-time Heisman Trophy winner Archie Griffin, although Johnson is listed behind veteran Boobie Clark at fullback.

Of all the rookie talent on both teams, only Edwards and Cobb are expected to start tonight, but Starr and Bengal Coach Bill Johnson plan to play rookies extensively.

"We haven't had much time at all to get ready for an actual game," said Johnson. "We have intensified our drills and this has helped. The players are anxious to start playing against an opponent."

"We'll probably start out with our regulars and then get some of the new people into the game so we can get a good look at them."

However, Johnson said Friday that because of the short amount of practice time before this first game, he does not intend to use Ken Anderson, Bob Trumpy, Lenvil Elliott, Bob Johnson or Griffin tonight.

The Bengals also announced Friday that they have temporarily given up trying to sign veterans Bill Kollar and Ron Pritchard, two of three players on the team entering the option

year of their contracts. Kollar, a defensive tackle, and Pritchard, a line-backer, both had off-season surgery and are listed in backup roles with Cincinnati this year.

The Packers' two first-round draft picks, defensive ends Mike Butler and Ezra Johnson, are listed behind Clarence Williams and Alden Roche, although both rookies were impressive in a public scrimmage last weekend. Other Packer rookies expected to see action tonight are offensive tackle

Greg Koch and running backs Terrell Middleton, Nate Simpson and Jim Culbreath.

"We obviously want to win, but this has to be tempered by the realization that we have to develop our young people," Starr said. "They can't develop sitting on the bench, so they will play. Circumstances will dictate how much time our young people will play."

Despite the continued building ne-

cessitated by last year's 5-9 finish, the Packers' probable starting lineup shows relatively few changes from last year.

Second-year player Mel Jackson will open at one guard in place of the retired Gale Gillingham. Rookie Rick Scribner and veteran Tom Lyons, acquired from Denver Monday, will work at left guard, where last year's regular, Bruce Van Dyke, also has retired. Veteran guard Larron Jackson, obtained from Atlanta Thursday, also

may play.

M.C. McCoy, a second-year player, has replaced the traded Perry Smith at right cornerback. Ollie Smith, who caught 13 passes in the Packers' final three games last season, has moved ahead of Gerald Tinker and will start at wide receiver with Ken Payne.

The only Packer not expected to play is defensive back Steve Wagner, who had bone chips removed from his right knee last week.

The acquisition of Jackson increased the Packer roster to 67 players. Seven must be cut by Tuesday, and the limit will drop to 52 by Aug. 30.

The Bengals and Packers have met seven times in pre-season play, with Cincinnati holding a 4-2-1 edge. The two clubs will meet in a regular season game Oct. 9 in Milwaukee.

Rader sparks Jays to win

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Doug Rader hit a two-run double to spark a four-run sixth inning and tripled and scored in the eighth, leading the Toronto Blue Jays to a 6-1 victory over the Milwaukee Brewers Friday night.

The Blue Jays filled the bases with none out in the sixth on two walks sandwiched around a throwing error by loser Jim Slaton (8-10) on Al Woods' bunt. Ron Fairly followed with a sacrifice fly, and Rader drilled a 3-0 pitch to the left-centerfield wall for two more runs.

Sam Ewing then singled in Rader off reliever Sam Hinds as the Blue Jays took a 5-0 lead.

The Blue Jays had taken a 1-0 lead in the fifth on a one-out triple by Otto Velez, the first hit off Slaton, and a suicide squeeze bunt by Hector Torres.

Winner Jeff Byrd (2-4) who entered the game with a 6.45 ERA, carried a two-hitter into the seventh, but was chased when the Brewers scored on a single by Tim Johnson, a walk and a single by Robin Yount.

The Blue Jays got the run back in the eighth on Rader's triple and a sacrifice fly by Velez.

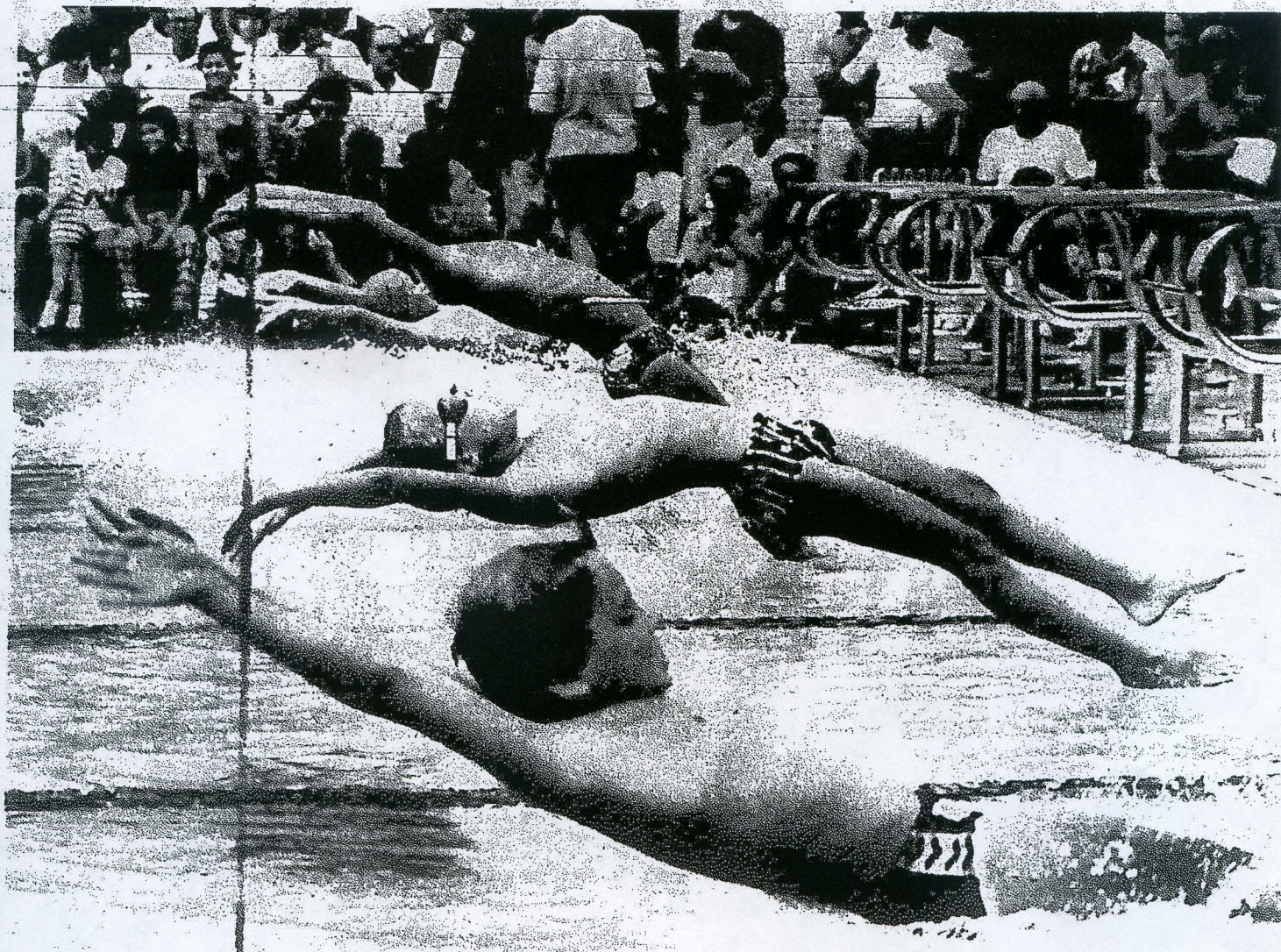

Ridgewood repeats as city swim champ

The Ridgewood Swim Club retired the traveling city swimming trophy Saturday by winning the All-City Swim Meet at Shorewood Hills pool for the sixth straight year.

Ridgewood, paced by nine out of a possible 10 victories in girls' relay events, finished with 1,744 points — 1,652 in swimming and 92 in diving — to easily outdistance runner-up Shorewood, which had a 1,238 total.

Parkcrest was third with 1,200, followed by Nakoma 1,168, Hill Farm 1,031, West Side 808, Monona 689 and Maple Bluff 550.

Sue Horinek, Kathy Reed and Beth Neuman each won two events in record time to pace Ridgewood. Horinek set marks in the girls 13-14 100-yard individual medley and 50-yard breaststroke. In the 11-12 class, Reed won the 50 freestyle and 100 individual medley and Neuman took the 50 backstroke and 50 butterfly.

Shorewood's only double record-setter was Larry Braue, who set

marks in winning the 13-14 100 freestyle and 100 butterfly.

Parkcrest was led by Doug Tom Kopp in the 15-18 group. Doug took the 100 freestyle and 100 backstroke and Tom won the 200 individual medley and 100 butterfly. Another Parkcrest swimmer, Heidi Wencel 8-and-under, set a pair of records, winning the 25 freestyle and 25 breaststroke.

Nakoma and Hill Farm each had two swimmers win two events in record times. Nakoma's Glen Messer won the 9-10 50 freestyle and 100 individual medley and Kathy Graham took the 100 individual medley and breaststroke in 13-14. For Hill Farm Andrea Domek won the 8-and-under butterfly and 25 backstroke, and Adam Drolson won the 100 individual medley and 50 butterfly in 9-10.

The only other double record-breaker was Monona's Amy McConnell, who set marks in winning the 15-18 50 butterfly and 100 individual medley.
