

# Streak's end disappoints Rose

ATLANTA (AP) — "I was disappointed because I felt I could have gone on," Pete Rose said Wednesday, reflecting on the end of the strongest challenge ever made toward Joe DiMaggio's record of hitting in 56 straight games.

"Now I'll concentrate on leading the league in hitting," said Rose, who saw his streak end at a National League record-tying 44 games when he struck out on a Gene Garber change-up to finish a hitless night Tuesday against the Atlanta Braves.

The scrappy Cincinnati Reds' third baseman insisted he wasn't angry at Garber, but he questioned why the bearded relief ace went with his best pitch in that situation — Atlanta leading, 16-4, with two outs in the ninth — rather than challenging him.

"I'm not saying anything about him bearing down," Rose said. "I just said he should challenge somebody. I had one pitch to swing at that was a strike. "I thought he won the World Series. Did you see him jump up? All I know is he doesn't challenge the hitter. Most pitchers in baseball just challenge a

guy in that situation. He was just trying to in-and-out, up-and-down me."

The Cincinnati captain said, "If Phil Niekro had been pitching and I got five pitches, I guarantee you three would have been fastballs. I wouldn't have seen the knuckleball, his best pitch. I'd just as soon not talk about Garber. I don't want to give him the ink."

Rose said his hitting streak "helped stimulate the team. We made a move during the streak. It's not a complete loss last night because the other teams lost last night, too."

The Reds are lodged in a battle for the National League Western Division pennant, trailing the San Francisco Giants by one-half game and leading the Los Angeles Dodgers by one game.

Rose had bounced a sixth-inning single to right field Monday night on a rare Niekro fastball to extend his streak to 44 games, tying the all-time National League record set by Willie Keeler of the Baltimore Orioles in 1897.

The end came on the combined ef-

fort of Garber and rookie left-hander Larry McWilliams, who made a miracle catch of a vicious liner by Rose in the second inning.

"I hit a ball that was halfway into center field and the guy caught it," Rose said of the shot, which the lanky, 6-foot-5 Williams speared behind his back, holding on as he fell to the ground.

Rose drew a walk on a 3-2 pitch to open the game, grounded out to short-stop in the fifth and lined into a double play in the seventh on his first appearance against Garber.

It was a streak without luck, Rose said.

"Almost every night I've hit shots. I've said all along I could have had 20 more hits in the streak. I've been getting the meat of the bat on the ball a lot. You would think a guy would get lucky one time in 44 games. But all of my hits were clean hits. There wasn't a one off somebody's glove."

Rose, talking with only a handful of sports writers at his Atlanta hotel-room, was asked what this would do with his contract negotiations at the end of the year. He was told that the

New York Yankees had asked DiMaggio to take a \$5,000 cut after his streak in 1941 because of World War II.

"I hope World War III doesn't start," said Rose, adding that he did not want to talk about contract negotiations.

He said he felt no sadness at the streak ending, but believed he would have gotten his hit had McWilliams, in only his fourth major league appearance, remained in the game.

"I thought I would hit Garber, too," he said. "He's not the best reliever in baseball. He probably doesn't think I'm the best hitter in baseball. "I hit three balls harder last night than probably eight of their hits. But, that's baseball."

Rose said he stayed up until 4:30 a.m. watching a television replay of the game, and it wasn't until then that he thought the ninth-inning pitch he fanned on was a ball.

"The last one might have been too close to take," he said. "You don't want to end the streak arguing with the umpire. Besides Jim Quick was doing a good job back there. It was too close to take and put the pressure on him."

He said he was confident that No. 56 was within his grasp had he been able to return home Friday night with the streak still going.

"I was swinging the bat good. When you get opposing players, opposing managers, opposing owners, opposing fans rooting for you, you got a lot going for you. In reality, the streak was good for everybody."

Rose said he got only one telephone call when he returned to the hotel after the game because the switchboard operator was screening his calls. It came from a controversial New York Yankees' star.

"It came from Reggie Jackson," Rose said. "I guess he recognized his name. He just said he was waiting for it to end so he could call and congratulate me, but that he hoped it never ended."

## McEnroe blows cool, not lead, in net victory

SOUTH ORANGE, N.J., (UPI) — Temperamental John McEnroe blew his cool several times but held on to beat Keith Richardson of Rock Hill, S.C., 6-2, 4-6, 6-1, and advance to the quarterfinals of a \$75,000 tournament at the Orange Lawn Tennis Club.

The 19-year-old McEnroe, of Douglaston, N.Y., seeded No. 2 behind defending champion Guillermo Vilas, who turned pro after winning the NCAA championship last June, exited quickly from the stadium to a chorus of boos.

McEnroe was joined in the quarterfinals by third-seeded John Lloyd of England, who eliminated John James of Australia, 6-1, 6-2.

Balazs Taroczy of Hungary, fresh from his victory Sunday in the Dutch Open, beat Alvaro Belancur of Colombia, 7-6, 6-0, in a first-round match. Other first-round triumphs were recorded by Belus Prajoux of Chile, Peter McNamara of Australia, Pat Cornejo of Chile and Paul McNamee of Australia.

## Bryant's challenge made easier

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — As far as the NCAA is concerned, Bear Bryant needs 41 victories — not 62 — to pass Amos Alonzo Stagg as history's winningest college football coach.

With all due respect to the late Stagg, the NCAA is refusing to credit him with 21 victories his son says he recorded at Susquehanna University in 1947-52.

With Alabama's Bryant beginning to close in on Stagg's all-time mark, Amos Alonzo Stagg Jr., has petitioned the NCAA to add 21 victories to his father's name, which would push the total to 335. Bryant, who isn't hiding his desire to go out as college football's all-time winner, is preparing for his 34th year as a head coach and now has 274 victories.

"The senior Stagg was in his early 80s at the time of the Susquehanna thing," said an NCAA spokesman. "The junior Stagg was the head coach and he says his father was a 'co-coach.' We are satisfied with the validity of the records."

George, a former Miss America, joined CBS Sports in January, 1975, and was known for her off-beat interviews and "soft" reporting. She has left sports for assignments in the area of entertainment and will host the network's new "People" show in the fall.

CBS said that Kennedy, who grew up in Wickliffe, Ohio, and was Miss Ohio in the 1970 Miss USA beauty pageant, was selected for "The NFL Today" after interviews and auditions with several candidates.

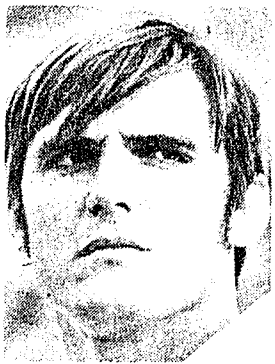
## Pool games cost Pastorini \$500

# Grove Lancers move toward title

COTTAGE GROVE — Ron Daggett's two-run, third-inning double led to the winning runs as Grove Lancers took a major step in defending their Class AA American Legion regional baseball tournament championship by shading Madison Badger Sports, 3-2, Thursday night.

Andy Storm pitched a seven-hitter and struck out 14 over eight innings, but needed a save from Greg Strangstalien to advance the Lancers into the winners' bracket of the double-elimination tournament.

Badger Sports, victors twice over the Lancers this season, threatened a comeback rally when Jeff Carl hit a two-run double in the eighth, and then put the tying and winning runs on base in the ninth before Strangstalien's save.

Dave Mayer's two-run first-inning homer and Ken Haffele's four-hit pitching for the first six innings sparked Monroe to a 9-4 nightcap victory and eliminated Bruns' Volkswagen with its second setback of the tournament.

The five-team regional continues today with Badger Sports clashing with Monroe in another elimination game at 5:30 p.m. Petries' Athletic World faces Grove Lancers in the 8:30 p.m. nightcap. The tournament takes a one-day break on Saturday but resumes again on Sunday with two games starting at 5:30 p.m. The eventual champion earns a berth in the state tournament at Sturgeon Bay.

Grove Lancers, managed by Don Olson and Doug Johnson, ran their record to 13-16 with the narrow triumph, but it was anything but secure.

"Andy (Storm) was pitching very well, but he just got a little tired there in the eighth inning," said Olson. "It was our first win over them, and we earned it."

Right-hander Dan Roach was Badger Sports' loser, but his mound performance was impressive, as he allowed just seven hits and struck out 14.

The victors took a 1-0 lead in the second inning on Mike Schuchardt's single and Storm's triple, then added what proved to be the winning runs in the third on an error. Brad Wendt's hit and Daggett's two-run double. Roach

then set the Lancers down with two hits and a string of strikeouts the rest of the way, but Badger Sports couldn't recover.

Coach Ray Clausen's team, now 17-14, made an effort in the eighth as pinch-hitter Jon Smoller and Tim Gaskell came up with singles. With one out Carl delivered a long smash to left field, and it skipped over the fence on one hop for an automatic double, but drove in two runs. Carl, however, was left stranded when Storm got the next two batters.

In the ninth Mike Palm drew a walk, and then Strangstalien took over for Storm. Following a one-out error which allowed Rick Chryst to reach base, Strangstalien ended the threat, and the game, by forcing John Queram and Gaskell to ground out.

The three-hour elimination nightcap saw Monroe leap to a 6-1 lead in the first four innings. The Cheesemakers jumped on Bruns' starter, Rich Cleveland, for three first-inning runs, two on Mayer's homer. After Monroe knocked out Cleveland in the second, Chris Washburn stopped the Cheesemakers, until the fourth when a pair of errors and hits by Steve Stadel-

man and Tom Nipple added three more runs.

Haffele allowed just one run through six innings before giving way to two relievers, Nipple and Scott Haffeltine.

# Brookfield swimmer breaks national breaststroke mark

THE WOODLANDS, Texas (AP) — Kathleen Treble, Cynthia Woodhead and Greg Winchell set American records and teen-age star Tracy Caulkins had to win a swim-off to reach the 100-meter breaststroke final Thursday at the Amateur Athletic Union Long Course Swimming Championships.

Treble, 16, of Brookfield, Wis., set an American record of 1 minute, 12.06 seconds in the women's 100-meter breaststroke preliminaries, breaking the previous record held by Caulkins, who had to win a swim-off with Patty Waters of Miami, Fla., to get into the final.

Caulkins, who set a world record Wednesday night in the 200-meter individual medley, and Waters had identical qualifying times in the preliminaries, but Caulkins won the head-to-head swim-off with a 1:13.32 compared to Waters' 1:13.64.

Winchell, 17, a high school senior from Long Beach, Calif., set an American record of 1:04.23 to lead qualifiers into the final of the men's 100-meter breaststroke.

Rick Hofstetter of the Cummins Engine Swim Club was the No. 2 qualifier and Steve Lundquist of Jonesboro, Ga., who set a world record Wednesday in the 200-meter individual medley, qualified third.

Woodhead, who finished second in the women's 400 freestyle Wednesday night when Kim Linehan of Sarasota Fla., set a world record, lowered the American record in the 200-meter freestyle to 2:00.45 to lead qualifying into the final.

Joan Pennington of the Nashville, Tenn., Aquatics Club, led qualifiers in the women's 100-meter butterfly with a 1:01.35 clocking. Nancy Hogshead of Jacksonville, Fla., qualified second at 1:01.60.

Joe Bottom, representing the Dutch Boy Swim Club of Los Angeles, Calif., qualified first in the men's 100-meter butterfly with a 55.05 time.

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# Richards looks back on a year of struggles

NEW YORK (AP) — The defensiveness and bitterness of a year ago seem mostly to have peeled away, and emerging now is a tough, combative but happier Renee Richards.

Three years after her sex-change operations and a year after she won her court battle to play tennis as a woman, Richards is out of the headlines but playing better tennis and having more fun.

Having attained the gender she always wanted, she's striving now for something else she always yearned for — to be a true athlete.

Richard Raskind, the man Renee used to be, longed to be a ballplayer, and at age 16 played semipro baseball briefly with a fellow named Whitey Ford.

"But my family insisted on college," Richards said of her father, mother and sister, who all were physicians. "They would have put me in a looney bin if I'd become an athlete."

So Raskind became a leading ophthalmologist well known for his successful treatment of children with crossed eyes, got married, had a son and was a ranked American player. He eventually gave it all up to become Renee, the towering maverick transsexual, who had the nerve to present herself as a female tennis player — a highly public profession.

**Began under pressure**

She strained through all the interviews, the probing questions about her sexuality. Sometimes she was glum and reticent, sometimes fiery and sharp-tongued when people asked too much about the politics of the body and too little about her tennis.

She weathered the soon worn-out jokes about playing mixed singles, and she stayed calm in the face of hostile, insulting protests by opponents who claimed it was unfair they should have to play a male.

Richards acknowledges now that the reasons she went about her sex change in such a public way were partly a social statement — that transsexualism is for real, that gender isn't only what one appears to be.

"Of course, I started out doing it for social reasons, but I did it primarily for my own reasons, my own happiness."

"I just love to play tennis, to compete. I love the sheer physicality of it, the relief you get from working hard."

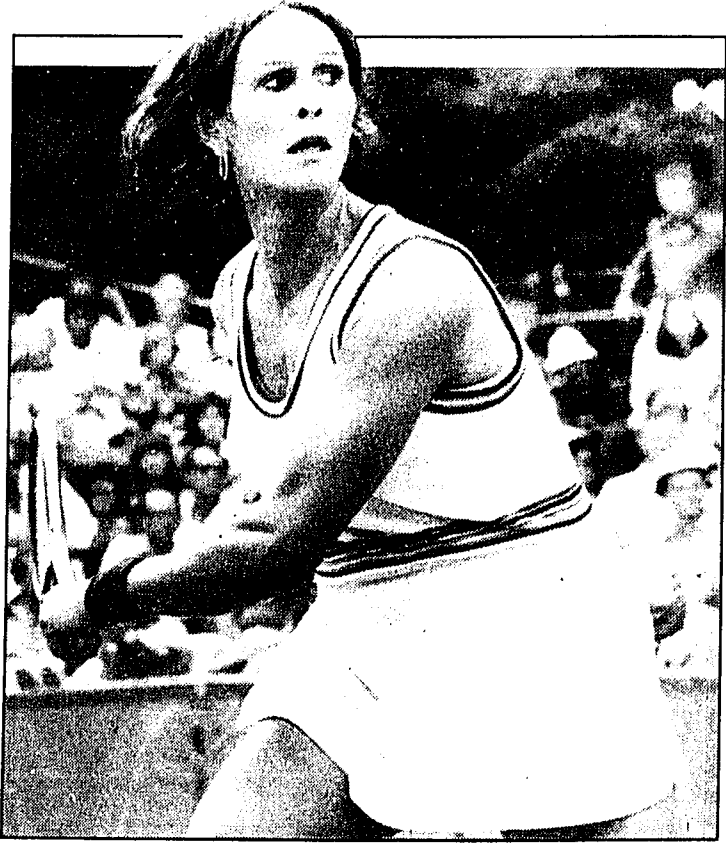
At age 43, it's late in life to be making a big splash as a pro, but Richards is approaching tennis with the hunger of a young woman who intends to be a champion.

"The U.S. Open is the biggest tournament for me," she said eagerly. "I'm not going to be ridiculous about it, but I think I have a good chance to win it."

Joe Zingale, her boss as the owner of the WTT New Orleans Nets, says:

"I'm issuing a prediction. She is going to surprise a lot of people at the U.S. Open ... maybe not in the singles, but watch out for her in the doubles."

The new confidence must be founded in part on the receding of public pressure and a growing peace with herself. She has made big emo-

tional gains, too, that must be attributed to playing World Team Tennis and to the new physical regimens she has adopted.

Physicality is her most oft-spoken word these days. Others describe her pursuit of it as relentless.

"She's in better shape now than she's ever been ... No one can drop-shot her anymore," notes Zingale. "She's really serious about it."

That could be an understatement. Give her a chance, and Richards will talk about diet, training and tennis all day.

Having decided that playing Wimbledon wasn't worth another legal battle, Richards took the three-week break in the WTT season and imprisoned herself at Harry Hopman's strictly-run tennis camp in Largo, Fla.

"When I first began playing as a woman, I certainly didn't think I'd have to come to Harry Hopman's camp and train so hard. I thought I

could just go out on the court and hit the ball and that would be enough."

She says she drilled at least five hours a day at the camp, then played matches and sometimes went on for light weight training — mainly to tone her leg muscles.

She began a new, strict diet on the advice of the New Orleans Jazz trainer, and she enjoys the camaraderie of another diet-cultist, Jazz star Pete Maravich.

"We reinforce each other a little," she says proudly.

The diet is heavy sacrifice for a woman who used to be a man who smoked, drank, ate richly and led a relatively sedentary life as a doctor and sometimes tennis player.

She has had to make physical adjustments because of the sex change, largely because of the hormone estrogen. Weight gain is a bigger threat than ever, and to make matters riskier, her appetite has become "voracious."

She is in the second year of her WTT contract with the Nets, although she was not allowed to play last year before a New York State court ruled that she must be permitted to play in this country.

Richards and her doubles partner, John Lucas, a gregarious young black who also plays basketball for the Houston Rockets, are known as the Odd Couple. They pal around like 10-year-olds. They psyche each other on the court and root wildly for each other when they're not playing doubles together.

The Odd Couple holds one of the best records in the league in mixed doubles, 16-5 at the start of last week.

## Her fighting days are over

To illustrate their closeness, Zingale tells a story about an unpleasant incident after a Net match in Lakeland, Fla., when the pair went to a small-town bar for beer.

Someone remarked, "Lookie, here. We got a nigger in here." Zingale said Richards, who is 6-foot-1 and weighed more than her current 155 then, walked up to the speaker and settled the matter.

"One more word and you're going to have to fight me," Richards said, according to Zingale, who said Lucas had told him. "She's that competitive and that protective. Incidentally, there was not another word spoken."

But her fighting days, the ones she spent trying to prove that her chromosomes and primary sex characteristics qualified her as a woman, are over. She says she will not again battle the International Tennis Federation for the right to play at Wimbledon and other European tournaments.

"I could go to court there and win it," she said, noting that English judicial tradition is similar to the United States. "But if I can try to win the U.S. Open, that's good enough for me. I'm an American, so the hell with all the rest."

"The American judicial system saw fit to do justice, and I'm grateful for it."

## Brewer attendance soars

MILWAUKEE — Attendance for this weekend's series between the Milwaukee Brewers and Boston Red Sox will be the highest for a three-game series anywhere in the major leagues so far this year.

The Brewers drew 52,562 persons Friday night for the series opener, including about 600 standing-room ticket purchasers, and Dick Hackett, the club's vice president for marketing, estimated that Friday's crowd would be the lowest of the three. The major league high for a three-game series this year is 153,112 — an average of 51,037 — for a Giant-Dodger series in Los Angeles May 19 through 21.

The listed capacity for baseball at Milwaukee County Stadium is 54,187, but Hackett said that figure was incorrect because it included all of the bleacher seats. Only about 6,000 of the 8,700 seats in the bleachers are used

for baseball, Hackett said, with seats in dead center not sold because hitters prefer the solid background of the empty, dark-green seats.

The Brewers would have sold up to 3,000 standing-room tickets, but Hackett said he thought most potential buyers probably were not optimistic about their chances of getting in.

Friday's crowd was the second-largest ever for baseball in County Stadium, trailing only the 1977 opening day crowd of 55,120. Unless more standing room tickets are sold today and Sunday, the series probably will end up as the Brewers' second, third and fourth-largest crowds ever.

Hackett estimated Brewer attendance for the season at 1.4 million if the team finishes poorly and upward of that depending on how the pennant race goes.

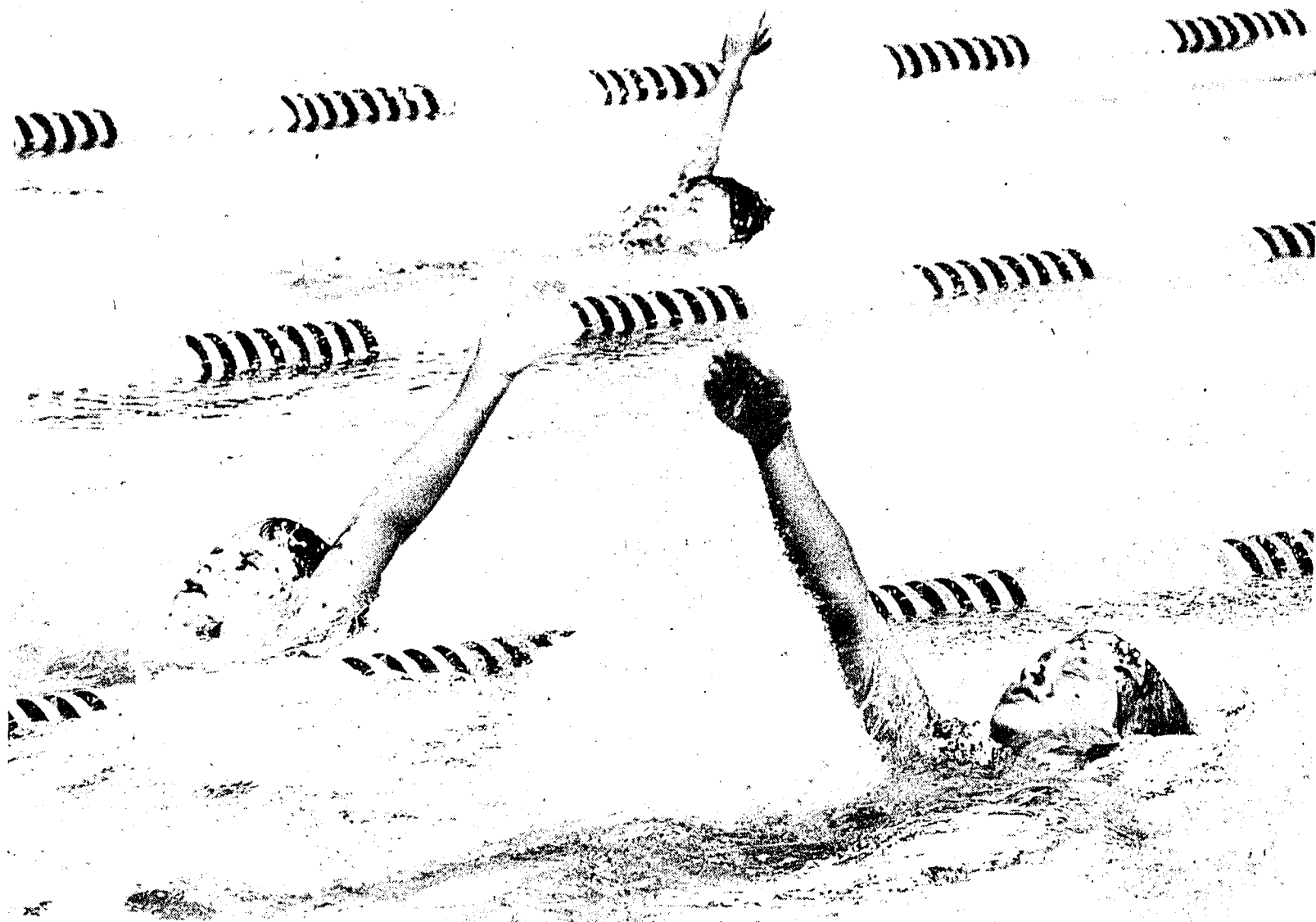

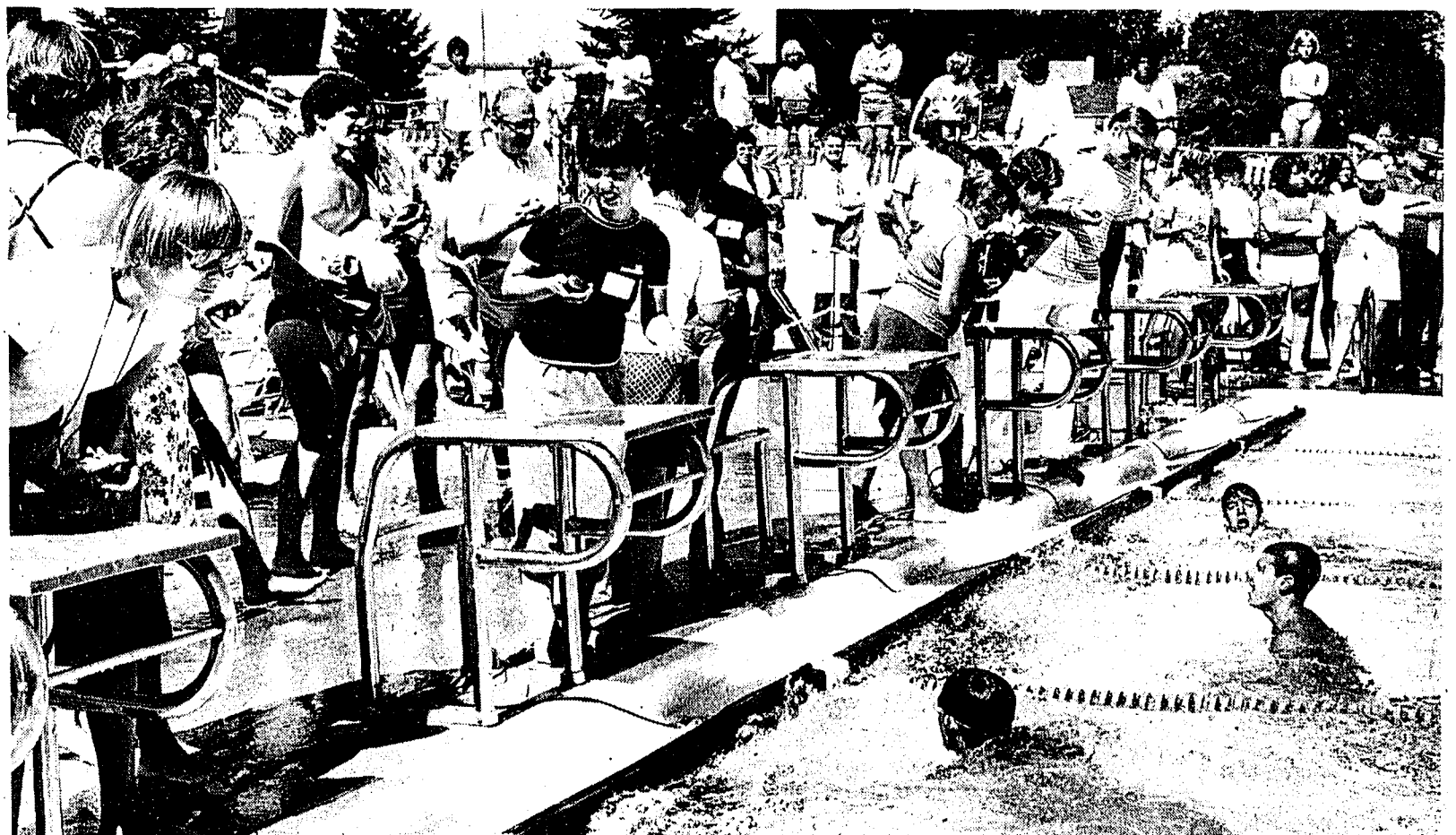

## Ridgewood floats to seventh all-city swim crown

## Bridge

In a tight match played early in June, the team of Bob Hamman, Bob Wolff, Seymon Deutsch, Jeff Meckstroth, Eric Rodwell and Jim Jacoby won the U.S. Bridge Team Championship. That victory gives us the right to represent the United States in the World Team Olympiad in Venice next October. One of our opponents in the June trials was Peter Boyd, and today's deal is an example of excellent defensive play on Boyd's part earlier in the year at the North American Championships.

Boyd was West, and his partner opened with a freewheeling weak two-bid in spades. South bid four hearts, ending the auction. Declarer won the opening lead and

played a diamond. East won the king and returned a club. When South played the king and Boyd won the ace, he could see that declarer had 10 tricks if he was allowed to trump three spades with dummy's hearts. So Peter played a low heart. Declarer won the six of hearts in dummy and trumped a diamond high. Then came the seven of hearts. But West had been watching the heart spots. He saw that South might be planning to put in the heart eight, ruff another diamond, and get back to dummy with the jack of trumps to run the diamond suit. So Boyd put up the nine of hearts, spelling finis to declarer's chances. This fine defense partially explains why our team felt lucky to win in June.

### Legislative audits

The Legislative Audit Bureau's recent audit of the Department of Veterans Affairs has raised questions about the role of the audit bureau and the actions of one of its employees in particular. Some clarification appears necessary.

The audit bureau is a non-partisan staff agency to the Legislature. In accordance with the basic principles of governmental checks and balances, the bureau's overall purpose is to provide legislators with information and analysis independent of the executive branch.

To fulfill their obligations, the state's lawmakers must be assured that state agencies are performing the functions they have been charged with and that they are attempting to carry out these functions in the most efficient and effective manner possible.

In the greatest majority of instances (the Department of Veterans Affairs being no exception) the audit bureau accomplishes its purpose by studying state agency performance relative to the agency's statutes, administrative codes, policies and procedures, and the department administrators' own expectations.

To objectively measure and verify performance, a number of techniques common to the social sciences and business are used. One of these methods is the statistical sample.

Veterans Affairs Secretary John Moses' strongest objection to the audit of his department's grant and loan programs regarded the statistical sample employed by the audit bureau. He believed there was a "continued reliance upon a tainted sampling analysis of loans and files (that) is not at all representative of the loan portfolio generally."

The charge is pitiful. By definition, a statistical sample cannot display a personal bias, as Moses seems to suggest.

What makes the Veterans Affairs Department audit story unique is not the comments made in the audit bureau report, but the singling out of one auditor for unwarranted and unprecedented attack. Ludicrous characterizations such as a "hatchet man" attempt to serve only one purpose — to direct public interest away from the real issues.

While Moses may disagree with some of the conclusions and recommendations found in the report, both he and the audit bureau should have a common goal — to provide the people of the state with efficient and effective public programs.

It should be obvious that such a goal could be more productively achieved by reasonable discussion — not diatribe. — Gary Kent-Bracken, Madison.

### Family practice

One of the reasons given for the dismissal of Dr. John Renner was his premature opening of the Wausau Family Practice Program at a time of faculty vacancies elsewhere.

In addition to our director, Dr. Thomas Peterson, we have the advantage of having ample access to four additional part-time faculty, all of whom are board certified and three of whom are residency trained. Very few programs can boast of this.

✓ The opening of our program has had absolutely no bearing on faculty vacancies throughout the state since our faculty are all from the community and could not have filled positions elsewhere.

✓ Wausau is one of the most ideally situated communities for a Family Practice Program; we believe it will be one of the most sought-after programs in the Midwest.

✓ The Wausau Family Practice Program should be listed as one of Dr. Renner's finest accomplishments and not as a reason for his dismissal.

In conclusion, we find it difficult to interpret Acting Dean Bernard Nelson's recent actions as being supportive of the University of Wisconsin Family Practice Program. — The Wausau Family Practice Resident Physicians, Wausau.

### Faculty salaries

Roger Gribble's recent article concerning faculty salaries at UW-Madison left a considerable amount of data unreported. The UW is above the average for all doctorate-granting institutions. However, if one examines truly comparable universities the picture changes dramatically.

Looking at the state universities of the Big Ten and state schools of similar stature throughout the U.S., one finds Wisconsin below average. Of the nine public Big Ten universities, UW is sixth in salary and benefits for professors and seventh for associate professors. Furthermore, it is \$3,100 from the top salary and only \$800 from the bottom for professors in the Big Ten.

When Wisconsin's salaries are ranked against those of other high quality institutions, they are quite far from the best in the country. In the Big Ten, the UW is far closer to the bottom than to the top.

In order to maintain both its reputation and quality vis-a-vis other public universities, Wisconsin must pay competitive salaries. Recent years have seen little progress in gaining ground on better-paying schools. If the gap continues to widen Wisconsin will continue to lose its best professors.

The former UW professors who have left for better pay elsewhere include many of the best known people in their respective fields: Perrow and Borgatta to SUNY, Aigner and Day to USC, Curtin to Johns Hopkins, Rosenberg to Stanford, Watts to Columbia, Alford to California and so on.

Few such respected scholars have been attracted away from other institutions to Wisconsin. Unless things are improved there may be few left at Wisconsin for better schools to attract. — Frank J. Rojas, Boulder, Colo.

### Abortion figures

Being pro-choice, and supporting all alternatives to an unplanned pregnancy, I need not comment on the recent letter to The State Journal from a University of Chicago geneticist, but I must comment on the anti-abortion letter written in response to his opinion.

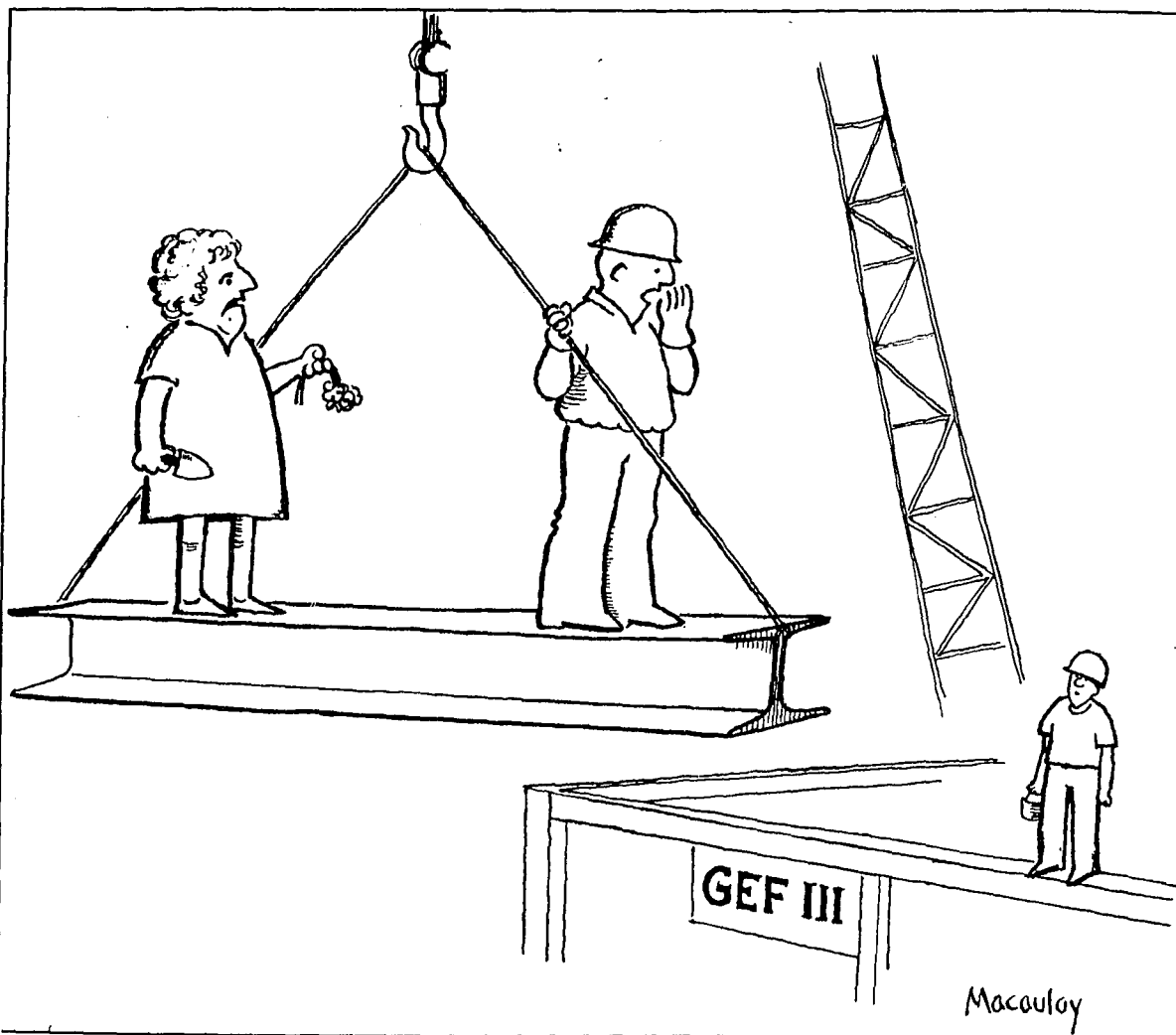
We are living in the 1970s, not the 1930s. We are living in the United States, not Germany. In particular, I must correct the implied misinformation in the statement, "I fail to see the distinction between killing a baby one day before birth and killing it one day after birth."

Anyone familiar with the Supreme Court decision of Jan. 22, 1973 knows that it is virtually impossible to receive an abortion beyond the 24th week of pregnancy. Aborting a fetus is a legal medical procedure. It is not the killing of a baby.

In 1976, 89.4 percent of all legal abortions were performed before the 12th week of gestation; 4.5 percent during the 13th-15th weeks; 5.1 percent during the 16th-20th weeks; and 0.9 percent beyond 20 weeks.

More significant, though, is the fact that since abortion has become legal, medically safe, and emotionally supportive, there has been a substantial decline in the number of women physically or emotionally injured, or dead as a result of an abortion.

It is the responsibility of each and every citizen to be well informed of the facts regarding abortion. — Marti Sopher, Chairperson, Catholics For a Free Choice-Wisconsin, Madison.

### Probation, parole

In a recent article in The Wisconsin State Journal, Dane County Sheriff William Ferris was quoted as saying the probation and parole system "should be abolished locally."

From his statement that the probation and parole system is responsible for "so-called criminal repeaters," the reader might conclude that there is a high rate of recidivism by probationers and parolees in Dane County. Yet, according to the records of the State Division of Corrections, this is not correct.

During 1977, the courts in Dane County placed 657 adults, 59 youthful offenders and six juveniles on probation and 198 were released on parole from correctional institutions to our Dane County staff.

During this same year 72 persons had their probation or parole revoked — 27 for violating a condition or rule of supervision and 45 for committing an act which could be classified as a criminal offense.

Crime statistics for 1977, excluding offenses relating to drugs, criminal damage to property, and minor sexual offense, show that 18,676 crimes were committed in Dane County.

If only 45 probationers or parolees had to be revoked for the commission of new criminal offenses in 1977, it would appear that that figure is not of significant magnitude to blame the probation and parole system for the "repeater criminals." The facts are that 842 probationers and parolees successfully completed supervision during 1977 without being revoked.

As of June 29, 1978, there were 1,006 persons under supervision in Dane County, of whom only 10.8 percent had a major employment problem; the rest are contributing towards their own support and supervision costs by paying taxes rather than being confined in expensive institution programs.

The state of Wisconsin can be proud of its community corrections service and the caliber of its staff. Continuing efforts are being made by the Department to Health and Social Services to improve upon it. — Gus W. Kressin, Chief, Southern Region Bureau of Community Corrections, Madison.

### Swim meet

Thank you for your fine coverage of the All-City Swim Meet. Each summer hundreds of children take part in the sport of competitive swimming. Many people don't know that this entails swimming thousands of laps just to get in shape.

While their friends are staying in bed in the morning, these children sometimes have to be at the pool by 7:30 a.m. or earlier. They also spend many hours in lessons to improve their technique.

The coaches, staff and pool managers are also to be commended. Week after week, through rain or shine, they

continue to encourage and teach these youngsters. They do everything — bolster a failing spirit, fix goggle straps, and tie up a 6-year-old's swimsuit so it won't fall down again. A "thank you" seems too little, but alas, it is what we must fall back on. Perhaps the smiles from their adoring proteges are payment enough.

### Insurance protection

I am writing in response to a recent article in The Wisconsin State Journal concerning Albert H. Kramer, Director of the Federal Trade Commission's Bureau of Consumer Protection.

I am for consumer protection, since I am a consumer, but I believe it should be based on relevant facts.

Mr. Kramer says: "In figuring the cost of a whole life policy, too many consumers consider only the annual premium cost and do not take into account how much money will be earned on the policy through investments by the insurance company."

Does Mr. Kramer ask a bank how much will it make when investing the money deposit? When he buys a refrigerator, does he ask the retailer how much it cost to manufacture and how much is his profit? The answer is "no!" Why ask it of insurance companies?

Mr. Kramer also says: "The prime need is for consumers to be told the rate of return on the savings part of their whole life insurance policies."

Whole life was never designed to be a savings plan. The front page of a whole life policy tells you its design: "The death proceeds under the policy will be paid to the beneficiary upon due proof of the insured's death."

Nowhere is there mention of a "savings plan."

In Wisconsin, it is illegal for an agent to refer to a whole life contract as a savings plan. The company owns the cash value of the policy and the insured owns the policy. To gain the cash value, the insured must surrender the policy.

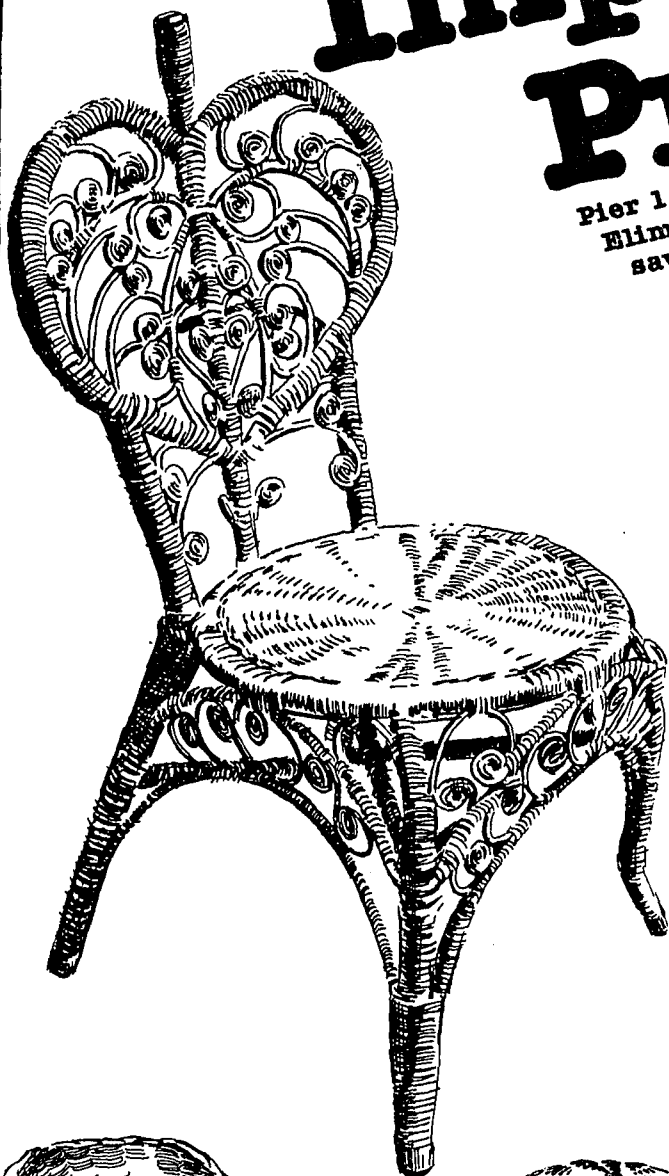
Finally, Mr. Kramer says: "The potential for loss can be staggering. A person who invests \$1,000 each year at 3 percent will have, at the end of 30 years, approximately \$48,000. One who invests the same amount at 6 percent will have \$84,000 at the end of 30 years."

What does that have to do with life insurance?

You cannot compare life insurance with any kind of investment. What, for example, is the rate of return for the family whose 35-year-old husband paid a \$1,000 premium on a \$50,000 whole life policy and died that year in an auto accident? Where is the "staggering potential loss?" No investment that I know of will guarantee that family \$50,000. — Donald Higgins, District Agent, Prudential Insurance Company of American, Madison.

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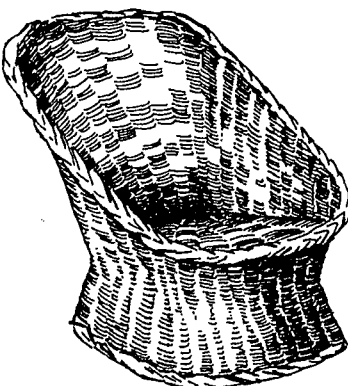


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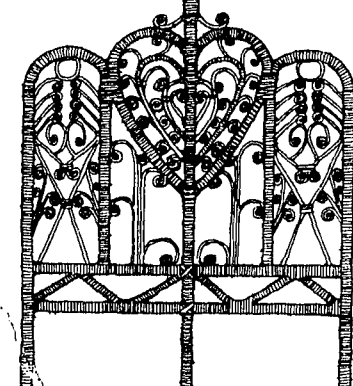
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
