## Soccer disturbances overemphasized

THE RECENT invasion of the field by Chicago baseball fans brought the comment from a sportscaster, "We do not want baseball fans behaving like European soccer fans."

Beyond the fact that this particular sportscaster's knowledge of soccer is zero, there is no excuse for this kind of statement. For many years the only coverage soccer received in the American press was when fans rioted in Europe or stadiums collapsed in South America. Naturally, soccer devotees in the U.S. have been sensitive on this point and have taken a lot of ribbing over the years.

What are the reasons for media preoccupation with soccer disturbances?

Firstly, anyone can report on riots — you don't require background in the sport to do so — and for a long time there were few sportscasters around who knew enough about soccer to comment intelligently on it. Not until the 1974 World Cup did the media choose to analyze the sport itself rather than its peripheral social elements.

BY NUMERICAL standards, riots have been a very insignificant aspect of soccer. Disturbances pale in comparison to the number of games, players and spectators involved. There are about 16 million registered soccer players in the world with one billion fans watching in stadiums holding up to 200,000 people. Also, equating a situation such as the teenagers on the field in Chicago with the emotional flare-ups at a European soccer game is ridiculous. The only reason I can see for fans to run onto a baseball field would be to demand some action from the players.

There are at least three reasons why soccer generates heated emotional situations. Firstly, soccer is an exciting sport with continuous action. It has no innings, huddles or time-outs to slow down the action; it allows no mass substitutions or refreshed platoons to cool frayed

temper; and a player once withdrawn is out for good. This means a relentless, exciting build-up for players and spectators alike.

SECONDLY, IT is important to recognize the extent of the season. Soccer is almost a year-round sport in many countries with many different league and cup competitions, many of them involving international games. Soccer represents a larger share of a country's sport involvement almost anywhere in the world except in North America.

Thirdly, most important to understanding spectator flare-ups is to realize that many games involve international, ethnic or traditional rivalries. There is no American equivalent to 30,000 Scots in Barcelona, or the trainloads of fanatical followers in England who live only for the next game. In Europe, feelings run so high that when the local team loses, industrial productivity declines.

To summarize, this article is not to condone some of the problems which occur in world soccer, but to interpret some of the reasons behind them. The overriding reason is, of course, that soccer has more of everything — games, players, fans, skill and excitement.

**SOCCER SHORTS** — Bayern Munich of Germany recently defeated the Cosmos in New York, 2-0, in an exhibition game. Paul Breitner, midfielder for Munich, commented, "The Cosmos have too many players who think, but don't work. You can't buy only players 31 and 32 years old." ... The All-Star game between Madison and Milwaukee last Saturday was unfortunately washed out by a deluge of rain after 20 minutes with the score 0-0. It will be rescheduled in Milwaukee later in the season. ... Datagraphics of Atlanta won the United States Amateur Cup recently, beating the San Francisco Glens, 1-0, in the final. Formed only 15 months ago, the Atlanta team compiled a 51-3 record this season.

# NBC puts Verona vs. Madison A's

SAUK CITY — Right-hander Larry Grove of the Madison Barrett A's hurled a brilliant three-hitter at Athletic Field Friday night in the quarterfinals of the 41st NBC State Baseball Tournament to whitewash New Berlin, 6-0, in one of the best pitching performances in the 32-team tournament.

Manager Gene Barrett of the A's figures he'll go with his best pitcher today in the semifinals at 6 p.m. against Bank of Verona, an 8-4 victor over Deerfield in the other semifinal clash Friday night.

"Rich Erwin — 21-4 on the season including his record for the University of Arkansas this spring — will pitch. We'll have to go with our best. You don't play in the finals unless you win in the semis," Barrett remarked.

Verona southpaw Marty Hruska, who at age 23 gets tougher as he loosens up, spaced Deerfield's six hits and cracked out a triple himself while striking out five batters.

New Berlin got three singles, two by veteran Jim Enlund and the other by Larry Schmidt, one each in the second, sixth and seventh innings.

The Madison A's stole five bases, with Tom Johnson's triple to deep right field in the third inning driving in the A's second run. The first scored on an error in the first as Groves got tougher as he progressed.

The Bank of Verona broke a 2-2 deadlock in the fourth inning with three runs on three hits as Hruska singled, Barth Becker doubled to left, Clyde Carpenter singled in one run, another scored on a wild pitch and the third tallied on an error.

Four walks and Carpenter's second single highlighted the three-run fifth.

Dennis Wedwick homered over the left-field fence at 342 feet for Deerfield in the eighth inning and Ken Simmons belted one over the same fence for Verona earlier in the third with Keith Peetz on base following a walk.

The last eight batters went out in a row for Bank of Verona off Deerfield reliever, young Jerry Haberkorn, but Hruska and his mates were a dead cinch by that time.

The other two quarterfinals were scheduled for this afternoon. Madison Howard Johnson's was to test Exeland and Lebanon, last year's runnerup, was slated against Dubuque Banworth.

A lot of people will be pulling for little David, Verona, against Goliath tonight.

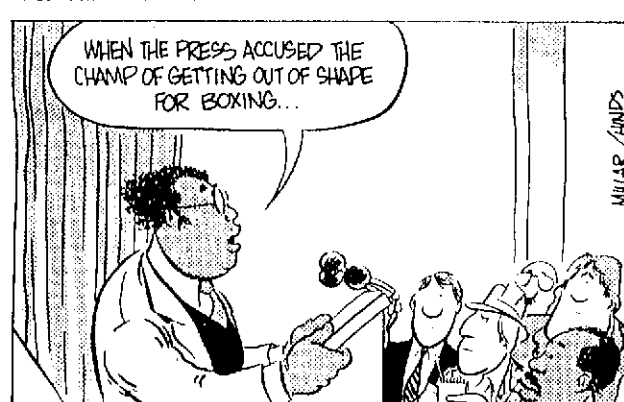

it and make quite a living off of it. Hell, I guess if I could, I would, too."

"If you are on a U.S. team, they pay your air fare, traveling expenses and a per diem. I've never heard of any world-class athlete getting money from the AAU. It just doesn't happen."

However, since money is known to be paid in international and independent meets, world-class athletes are faced with the question of why should they compete in a non-paying meet such as Spartacade or the Sports Festival when they could be paid to compete in an international meet.

"I've heard a lot of stories (of payoffs), but I've never actually seen one take place," said McClimmon. "But I would say the top people in the world are probably getting something. I imagine they are doing it (getting their payoffs) through plane tickets. That's keeping it in a pretty grey area but at least that's better than accepting money."

"Most athletes have just their travel expenses paid for," Tegan said. "Others have their travel expenses, hotel rooms and food paid for. Some athletes make money by getting paid plane tickets to two meets in the same vicinity and then cashing one of them. You can get a little critical when you

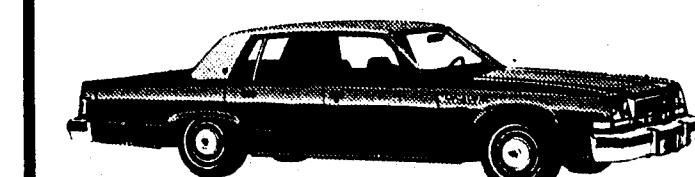

### Palmer upset over his poor play

"I'm not going to go out and shoot 80s very often and continue to play," said Palmer, who will be 50 Sept. 10. "That's out of the question."

Palmer, who is 151st on the tour money winning list with earnings of only \$7,643 and has not won in the United States since 1973, still gathered an army of fans as he shot a round of 41-40-81. That was 11 shots over Oakland Hills' par.

"I felt like I was playing better," he said after his round, which included a pair of double bogeys, nine bogeys and only two birdies. "But I guess it was just a figment of my imagination."

"There are times," Palmer sighed, "when I still think I can go out there and do the things I used to do — but it doesn't happen."

### Mays becomes ill from fatigue

NEW YORK (UPI) — Willie Mays, scheduled to be inducted into baseball's Hall of Fame on Sunday, became ill Thursday after a hectic day of promotional activity and was forced to postpone a late news conference.

### Phillies offer Cepeda fresh start

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — After nine months in prison, Orlando Cepeda is again swinging his 44-ounce bat, teaching the Philadelphia Phillies' minor league players how to hit.

Dubbed "the Baby Bull" for his strength and exuberance, Cepeda enjoyed the adulation of fans, and particularly his fellow Puerto Ricans, during a 16-year major league career that produced a .287 lifetime average with 379 home runs and 1,365 RBIs.

"Maybe I thought I was bigger than I was," Cepeda said before beginning his new job as the Phillies' farm team batting instructor. "But when it happened, people in Puerto Rico treated me like dirt."

What happened Dec. 12, 1975, was that Cepeda and a friend were arrested by federal agents and charged with trying to smuggle 160 pounds of Colombian marijuana out of San Juan International Airport. Cepeda eventually pleaded guilty to the charges and in 1976 was sentenced to five years in Florida's minimum-security Elgin Air Force Base prison and fined \$10,000.

After serving nine months, Cepeda was paroled in June.

"I came out of prison proud of myself," Cepeda said. "I didn't lose my cool. I never complained. I spent one year of my life in shock. I don't know how to express myself, but it was awful, a torture."

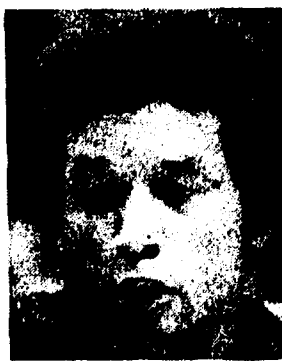
### Ashe resting, but status uncertain

"As far as Oakland Hills is concerned," he replied to a question about the severity of the course, "it was the greatest piece of cake I'll ever be. And I didn't even get the icing."

Watson said he made the change in his swing because "I'm an arm swinger. When my arms get out of timing with my body, things go haywire."

"I'm taking the club straighter away on my backswing and that seemed to help me," he said. "I've established my left arm radius away from it instead of breaking down. It allows me to extend both away and

# Bell hopes to keep Chiefs' enthusiasm high

Mike Bell doesn't even care that he's the highest drafted player from last season's college teams to sign with a National Football League team.

"There's not really any added pressure," Bell said during a recent telephone interview. "I don't even think of myself as being the highest drafted college player in the NFL."

Bell wasn't the first player chosen in last May's college draft. He was the second. Ohio State's Tom Cousineau was first, but opted to play with Montreal of the Canadian Football League instead of the NFL's Buffalo Bills.

The Kansas City Chiefs, choosing

second, picked Bell, a 6-foot-4, 255-pound defensive end from Colorado State.

Kansas City surprised many people by picking Bell, who had sustained a knee injury in his second-to-last col-

lege game. The Chiefs picked him with hopes that he would recover from his knee surgery. Bell claims he has.

"I'm almost all the way back," Bell said.

But that is Bell's prognosis. The Chiefs coaches are decidedly more guarded about his condition. Bell's contact drills have been held to a minimum. He was sent in for only nine plays in the Chiefs' scrimmage last Saturday against St. Louis.

But even that limited playing time taught Bell a lesson about pro football.

"Everybody was just standing around," he said. "Nobody was whooping or hollering. Sure, it was a controlled scrimmage and there were no fans, but I like to play the game with emotion."

"I'm not a big rah-rah guy in prac-

tice, because that's my time to learn. But when they use real bullets, when it's time to play the game, I get excited and I like to be around emotional guys."

Bell, who is expected to play the right defensive end of the Chiefs' three-linemen, four-linebacker defense, said his teammates don't hassle him about his enthusiasm.

"Everyone accepts me for my enthusiasm," Bell said. "I think some of it will rub off and I think most of the guys are glad to have somebody around who's always going to keep them fired up."

Bell said he doesn't worry about pro football putting a damper on his enthusiasm.

"Once it starts to become a job, once I start to get the blahs, then that

will be the time for me to quit," said Bell, who will be 22 years old on Aug. 30. "The money to me is really secondary right now. Really, I'm here because this is what I want to do and because I enjoy doing it. When I don't enjoy it any more, I'll get out."

But right now Bell is happy to be doing what he's doing. He is sort of the hometown boy come home. Bell grew up in Wichita, Kan., and went to high school there before going off to college in Colorado.

Bell did not play organized football until his junior year in high school. He had "other things" to do. But he so excelled at it when he took it up that last season he became an all-American at Colorado State, was named the West-

# Brewers rebound; Red Sox fall, 5-3

MILWAUKEE — The Milwaukee Brewers are back on the road after a 5-3 victory over the Boston Red Sox Friday night at County Stadium, but it still remains to be seen if the Brewers spent too much during their last pit stop to have any chance of catching the league-leading Baltimore Orioles.

For while Bambi's Bombers came back to life and Jim Slaton gave a strong pitching performance, the Orioles remained their nearly invincible selves by beating the New York Yankees, 1-0.

So the Brewers stay 10 games out of first, and Boston, the other team within hailing distance of the leader, drops to eight back.

Nevertheless, Brewer Manager George Bamberger was relieved his team's four-game losing streak was over.

"I had all my fishing gear packed," he joked, nodding toward a pile of rods, reels and tackle stashed in the corner of his office. "One more loss and I was taking off."

Seriously, he added: "We needed that one bad. This is going to pick the boys up. You know you're going to go into these things (losing streaks), but this was a very bad time to go through it. And you never know when you're going to break out of it. I've seen these things go 10-12 games."

Slaton (11-6) was the stopper for the Brewers Friday night. He allowed only one unearned run and five hits through the first 8½ innings before giving up a single to Bob Watson and a home run to Butch Hobson in the ninth. Twice earlier Slaton faced Boston's dangerous Jim Rice with two men on base and both times he got Rice to hit a ground ball for an out.

Slaton was pleased with his performance. "I'm happy because I was

the one who kinda got us started on this losing streak — losing to Baltimore (2-1 Monday)," he said. "I pitched all right, but it was still a loss. I was very upset because I wanted to win that game very badly."

Win Remmerswaal, a native of The Netherlands making his first major-league appearance.

The home runs gave Thomas a total of 27 and tied him with Rice for the American League lead.

"He's about to get hot," said Bamberger of Thomas. "When he gets down — where is he . . . 225? — he usually gets hot and goes back up to .250."

Cecil Cooper also homered leading off the sixth and the Brewers' other run came in the fourth when Cooper doubled and scored on Sixto Lezcano's single. Lezcano then scored on Thomas' first home run.

In all, the Brewers had 10 hits and seven of them were for extra bases.

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. — Ben Crenshaw, seeking the major title he needs to confirm his stature in the ranks of golf's premier performers, stroked out a smooth three-under-par 67 and took command Friday in the second round of the 61st PGA National Championship.

"I'd give my eyeteeth to win," said the man the other touring pros call "Gentle Ben."

"I think I've matured. I think this may be the time," he said after posting his 36-hole total of 136, four strokes under par on the famed Oakland Hills Country Club course, 7,014 yards of rolling hills and undulating greens in suburban Detroit.

Crenshaw, so often a challenger

were tied at 137. Graham scrambled to a 68, Haas birdied the final hole for a 69 and Caldwell matched par-70 in mild, breezy weather.

Tom Watson, the first-round leader, again fell victim to some erratic action off the tee and slipped to a 72 that left him at 138, two shots back.

"Some days you have it, some days you don't," said Watson, a four-time winner this season but in a slump the last month.

"I just didn't drive it very well," he said. "I let four of them get away to the right. I was in four fairway bunkers and I made bogey from two of them."

He was tied, at two-under-par and

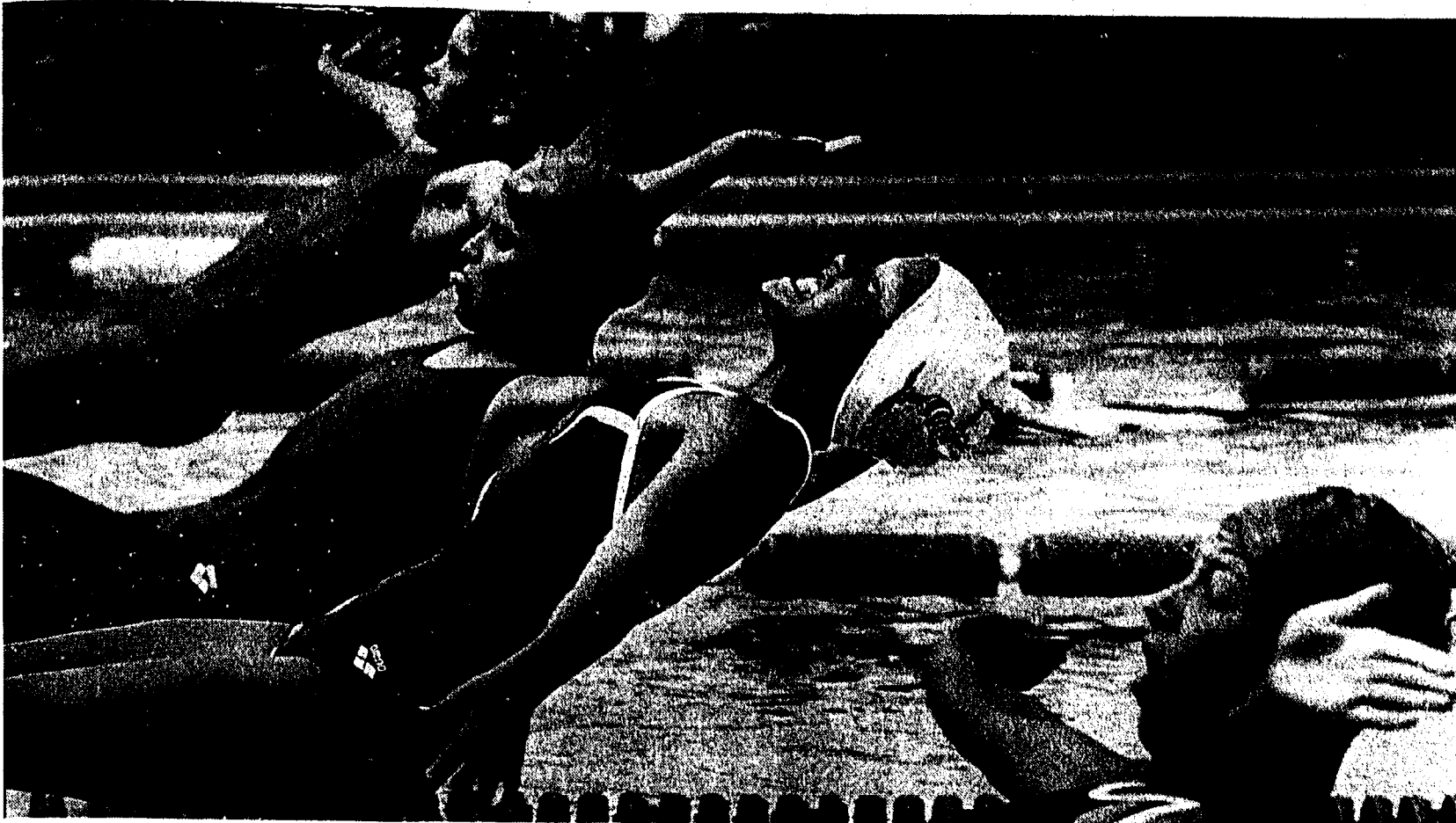

## Second starting spot pleases Pearson

TALLADEGA, Ala. (UPI) — Veteran stock car driver David Pearson failed to win the pole position Thursday for the Talladega 500, but his second-place qualifying spot still had its joys.

Today, Pearson will line up with Neil Bonnett to battle it out in the \$231,000 Grand National stock car event. Bonnett, who recently replaced Pearson in the Wood Brothers Mercury, won the pole Thursday.

"It tickled me because I run that fast," said Pearson, who had been without a Grand National ride since April when he was dropped by the Wood Brothers team.

"We ain't got no friction between us," said Pearson. "On yeah, I'd like to beat him. It'd tickle me to death. If I'd won the pole, I probably would have went over there and rubbed it

in." Pearson was named earlier in the week to drive the Osterlund racing Oldsmobile. The three-time NASCAR champion replaced rookie Dale Earnhardt when Earnhardt was sidelined for an indefinite period Monday with two broken collarbones and a mild concussion.

Bonnett toured the 2.66-mile Alabama International Motor Speedway in 193.6 mph, beating Pearson's second-best time of 192.731 mph.

Bonnett, who has won the Delaware 500 and the Firecracker 400 in the Mercury, said he surprised himself by winning the pole.

"We're in pretty good shape. We came down here with the pole as a remote possibility," he said. "That was my third and fourth lap on the track today."

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
