### $oldsymbol{Soccer}$ disturbances overemphasized

THE RECENT invasion of the field by Chicago baseball fans brought the comment from a sportscaster, "We do not want baseball fans behaving like European soccer fans."

Beyond the fact that this particular sportscaster's knowledge of soccer is zero, there is no excuse for this kind of statement. For many years the only coverage soccer received in the American press was when fans rioted in Europe or stadiums collapsed in South America. Naturally, soccer devotees in the U.S. have been sensitive on this point and have taken a lot of ribbing over the years.

What are the reasons for media preoccupation with soccer disturb-

Firstly, anyone can report on riots - you don't require background in the sport to do so - and for a long time there were few sportscasters around who knew enough about soccer to comment intelligently on it. Not until the 1974 World Cup did the media choose to analyze the sport itself rather than its peripheral social elements.

BY NUMERICAL standards, riots have been a very insignificant aspect of soccer. Disturbances pale in comparison to the number of games, players and spectators involved. There are about 16 million registered soccer players in the world with one billion fans watching in stadiums holding up to 200,000 people. Also, equating a situation such as the teenagers on the field in Chicago with the emotional flare-ups at a European soccer game is ridiculous. The only reason I can see for fans to run onto a baseball field would be to demand some action from the players.

There are at least three reasons why soccer generates heated emotional situations. Firstly, soccer is an exciting sport with continuous action. It has no innings, huddles or time-outs to slow down the action; it allows no mass substitutions or refreshed platoons to cool frayed

tempers; and a player once withdrawn is out for good. This means a relentless, exciting build-up for players and spectators alike.

SECONDLY, IT is important to recognize the extent of the season. Soccer is almost a year-round sport in many countries with many different league and cup competitions, many of them involving international games. Soccer represents a larger share of a country's sport involvement almost anywhere in the world except in North America.

Thirdly, most important to understanding spectator flare-ups is to realize that many games involve international, ethnic or traditional rivalries. There is no American equivalent to 30,000 Scots in Barcelona, or the trainloads of fanatical followers in England who live only for the next game. In Europe, feelings run so high that when the local team loses, industrial productivity

To summarize, this article is not to condone some of the problems which occur in world soccer, but to interpret some of the reasons behind them. The overriding reason is, of course, that soccer has more of everything - games, players, fans, skill and excitement.

it and make quite a living off of it. Hell, I guess if I could, I would, too."

pay your air fare, traveling expenses and a per diem. I've never heard of any world-class athlete getting money from the AAU. It just doesn't happen." However, since money is known to be paid in international and independent meets, world-class athletes are

faced with the question of why should they compete in a non-paying meet such as Spartacade or the Sports Festival when they could be paid to compete in an international meet. "I've heard a lot of stories (of payoffs), but I've never actually seen one take place," said McClimon. "But

I would say the top people in the world are probably getting something. I imagine they are doing it (getting their payoffs) through plane tickets. That's keeping it in a pretty grey area but at least that's better than accepting money."

"Most athletes have just their travel expenses paid for," Tegan said. "Others have their travel expenses, hotel rooms and food paid for. Some athletes make money by getting paid plane tickets to two meets in the same vicinity and then cashing one of them. You can get a little critical when you

get in that area, but generally it works out for the best."

Tegan said expense payments are generally based on previous performance but the former UW athlete said many of the big meets have performance premium clauses for the athletes. That means that in addition to being paid on the basis of past performance, athletes are also paid to break or not break records.

This, of course, is only at the very highest level of competition.

"Most of these people don't just live to run or compete," Tegan said, but have some kind of a job as well. All the athletes we know here have a job and don't get government money to help prepare themselves for say, the Olympics.

"But they need help with expense money to compete in Europe," he said, "and I don't see anything wrong with that. If you saw something wrong with that then, by the same token, you would have to say that international competition is only for athletes who can pay for themselves. "I feel there is nothing wrong with

helping to pay expenses, but when you go beyond that it is unnecessary," he said. "The problem, however, is that if you set up more rules to stop the payoffs people will only break those, too. It's very hard to control and I don't know that it can be done." McClimon said he felt if athletes were taught to do something other

than compete it might help eleviate

the situation. He indicated that ath-

letes go after the money because they know they don't have the training to earn it in another profession at a later date. "It's discouraging to see good intentions get lost in politics and red tape, he said. "It's no secret that in the European Eastern bloc countries the athletes' job is to be part of the national team. And in Africa, runners are placed in the service or police

force. I suppose Kenya figures a Ke-

nyan can do more for the country run-

ning than guarding the Ugandan border. "But in this country we have a system in which an athlete trains and competes until he's 30 and all he can do is run and jump. What we need to develop is a system where if a guy is an accountant we should get him a job as one so he can learn that, too.

"For these people to continue there has to be a system that's legal and works.

But how to get to that point is what all the shouting is about.

### Palmer upset over his poor play

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (UPI) - Arnold Palmer, despondent over virtually shooting himself out of the \$350,000 PGA with an opening round 81, hinted Thursday he might curtail his play if he continues to shoot bad golf.

"I'm not going to go out and shoot 80s very often and continue to play," said Palmer, who will be 50 Sept. 10. "That's out of the ques-

Palmer, who is 151st on the tour money winning list with earnings of only \$7,643 and has not won in the United States since 1973, still gathered an army of fans as he shot a round of 41-40-81. That was 11 shots over Oakland Hills' par.

"I felt like I was playing better," he said after his round, which included a pair of double bogeys, nine bogeys and only two birdies. "But I guess it was just a figment of my imagination.

"There are times," Palmer sighed, "when I still think I can go out there and do the things I used to do — but it doesn't happen."

### Mays becomes ill from fatigue

NEW YORK (UPI) - Willie Mays, scheduled to be inducted into baseball's Hall of Fame on Sunday, became ill Thursday after a hectic day of promotional activity and was forced to postpone a late news conference.

The former New York and San Francisco Giants star's condition was diagnosed as fatigue and heat exhaustion but Mays' personal physician, Dr. Robert Wells, was called in to administer an electrocardiogram.

Mays, 48, took a nostalgic subway ride to the site of the old Polo Grounds in the Bronx Thursday

morning, accompanied by nearly 200 reporters and photographers and a number of fans who jumped aboard. The temperature in New York climbed to near 90 degrees at noon Thursday.

### Phillies offer Cepeda fresh start

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - After nine months in prison, Orlando Cepeda is again swinging his 44-ounce bat, teaching the Philadelphia Phillies' minor league players how to hit.

Dubbed "the Baby Bull" for his strength and exuberance, Cepeda enjoyed the adulation of fans, and particularly his fellow Puerto Ricans, during a 16-year major league career that produced a .297 lifetime average with 379 home runs and 1,365 RBI.

"Maybe I thought I was bigger than I was," Cepeda said before beginning his new job as the Phillies' farm team batting instructor. "But when it happened, people in Puerto Rico treated me like dirt.'

What happened Dec. 12, 1975, was that Cepeda and a friend were arrested by federal agents and charged with trying to smuggle 160 pounds of Columbian marijuana out of San Juan International Airport. Cepeda eventually pleaded guilty to the charges and in 1976 was sentenced to five years in Florida's minimum-security Elgin Air Force Base prison and fined \$10,000.

After serving nine months, Cepeda was paroled in June.
"I came out of prison proud of myself," Cepeda said. "I didn't lose my cool. I never complained. I spent one year of my life in shock. I don't know how to express myself, but it was awful, a torture.

### WBA title bout to be held in style

CHICAGO (AP) - More than 1,000 customers are expected to pay \$100 to eat filet mignon, drink all they want from open bars and watch champion Ernesto Espana take on one-time street gang leader Johnny Lira in a World Boxing Association lightweight title fight Saturday.

It's a strange setting for this 15-rounder starting at about 2:35 p.m. CDT in the International Ballroom of the Conrad Hilton Hotel. Instead of seats, patrons will be sitting at rows of 150 tables, start-

ing 15 feet from ringside, and will be served meals (filet mignon is promised) during preliminary bouts. Then the food will be turned off for the main event, but the open bars will stay open:

Ashe admitted himself to New York Hospital late Tuesday after experiencing discomfort and some pain while conducting a tennis clinic at a New York area tennis

NORTH CONWAY, N.H. (AP) - Third-seeded Guillermo Vilas and defending champion Eddie Dibbs survived third-round challenges from unheralded players and humid weather Thursday to advance to the quarterfinals of a \$175,000 international tennis tournament.

Vilas, the clay-court specialist from Argentina, staged a remarkable rally as he fought back for a 3-6, 7-5, 6-1 triumph over Ralph Gehring of West Germany. Dibbs defeated Ross Case of Australia, 2-6, 6-1, 7-5, but had to come from behind in the final set to do it.

### Bengals' Corbett earns respect

WILMINGTON, Ohio (AP) - Jim Corbett was given the star treatment when he played at the University of Pittsburgh, but he got a rude awakening when he arrived in the National Football League.

He was picked by the Cincinnati Bengals in the seventh round of last year's National Football League draft. But Corbett has worked himself into the starting spot at tight end for the Bengals in Saturday's preseason game against the Detroit Lions. 

Today, Pearson will line up with Neil Bonnett to battle it out in the \$231,000 Grand National stock car event. Bonnett, who recently replaced Pearson in the Wood Brothers Mercury, won the pole Thursday.

"It tickled me because I run that fast," said Pearson, who had been without a Grand National ride since April when he was dropped by the Wood Brothers team.

"We ain't got no friction between us," said Pearson. "On yeah, I'd like to beat him. It'd tickle me to death. If I'd won the pole, I probably would have went over there and rubbed it track today."

Pearson was named earlier in the week to drive the Osterlund racing Oldsmobile. The three-time NASCAR champion replaced rookie Dale Earnhardt when Earnhardt was sidelined for an indefinite period Monday with two broken collarbones and a mild

Bonnett toured the 2.66-mile Alabama International Motor Speedway in 193.6 mph, beating Pearson's second-best time of 192,731 mph.

Bonnett, who has won the Delaware 500 and the Firecracker 400 in the Mercury, said he surprised himself by winning the pole.

"We're in pretty good shape. We came down here with the pole as a remote possibility," he said. "That was my third and fourth lap on the
