NL owners to consider Kuhn's fate

NEW YORK (AP) — Storm clouds gathered over Commissioner Bowie Kuhn Thursday after National League owners called a special meeting to consider his re-election.

Kuhn's status is among the topics to be discussed Aug. 18-19 in San Diego at baseball's regular summer meetings, but the NL will convene a day earlier to consider the commissioner's situation.

The special meeting was requested by the New York Mets, St. Louis Cardinals and Houston Astros, all reported to be against Kuhn's re-election to a third term. If those teams get a fourth league club to join them, they could force Kuhn's resignation or firing.

Kuhn's contract expires in August 1983, but under terms of his contract the commissioner must be advised by the owners between six to 15 months before that date whether they plan to rehire him.

Schramm: Quality an NFL concern

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. (AP) — Tex Schramm, president and general manager of the Dallas Cowboys, said Thursday the National Football League won't field patchwork-quality teams if there is a players' strike.

"We'll play (the schedule) as long as we can play, but we won't play if the integrity of the game and the integrity of the race is gone," Schramm said at the Cowboys' training camp.

He said NFL owners have a formula for "what we think would constitute a fair competition or race," adding that "if we lose that (a quality championship), then that's it. We're not going to be putting on games just to be putting games on."

Schramm and other NFL executives are concerned there could be "wildcat" strikes for a single game such as "Monday Night Football" or for just a day. But he said using non-union players and free agents just to have a contest would not be the answer.

Vilas upset in Grand Prix tennis

NORTH CONWAY, N.H. (AP) — Unseeded Victor Pecci of Paraguay upset top-seeded Argentina's Guillermo Vilas, the hottest player on the men's tennis tour, 5-7, 6-4, 6-2, in a first-round match Thursday in a \$200,000 Grand Prix tournament.

Pecci, 26, won the last four games of the third set to end the 3 hour, 10 minute match that Vilas said he entered unprepared. Vilas spent 22 hours traveling to the tournament after winning his seventh Grand Prix tournament this year and second straight, Sunday in Austria. He arrived Monday night, had his first match delayed one day to Wednesday, then had that match set back another day by rain.

Second-seeded Ivan Lendl and No. 3 Jose-Luis Clerc, also won first-round matches. Lendl struggled to a 6-2, 3-6, 6-3 triumph over Juan Aquilera of Spain. Clerc, the defending champion from Argentina, whipped Ken Flach of St. Louis, 6-0, 6-4.

Pecci, Lendl and Clerc won their second-round matches later in the day with little trouble. Pecci defeated Heinz Gildemeister of Chile, 6-1, 6-2; Lendl wore down Bernard Fritz of France, 6-4, 6-0, and Clerc trounced Thierry Tulasne of France, 6-4, 6-1.

Koncar's fate sealed in '81

GREEN BAY (AP) — Coach Bart Starr said Thursday that he had decided by the end of the 1981 National Football League season that offensive tackle Mark Koncar was through as a Green Bay Packer.

Koncar, the Packers' first-round draft choice in 1976 and once considered one of the best young offensive linemen in the NFL, was traded to the Houston Oilers Wednesday for "future considerations."

Koncar walked out of a meeting of Packer offensive linemen after he was berated by Starr last October. He missed the next three practices and a game against Tampa Bay before he rejoined the club.

Starr said Thursday that the walk-out was "a factor" in the trade. "I think it's suffice to say that it was simply a factor," Starr said. "We were attempting to make this move for some time."

The Packers on Tuesday acquired offensive tackle Angelo Fields from the Oilers in exchange for a third-round draft choice next year. Starr said the Koncar and Fields deals were separate transactions.

"I indicated the other day relative to Angelo's acquisition that these talks had heated up the last two weeks," Starr said. "We were discussing Mark's situation throughout the offseason, and particularly the last two weeks."

Koncar had serious knee and ankle injuries in 1978, 1979 and 1980, and his play last season did not measure up to what Starr felt were his capabilities. Starr's disappointment prompted him to challenge Koncar during the October meeting.

Starr said Thursday that the biggest change in Koncar since his injuries has been in his mental approach.

"Physically, I think he could be the player or approximately the player we thought he would be when we drafted him," Starr said. "He was a hard working, reckless, mentally tough guy coming out of college. He just never approached those standards here."

"I'm certain injuries played a big role in that," he said. "I think this (the trade) is in his best interests and ours. Hopefully, we have this behind us."

With Koncar gone, Karl Swanke has been promoted to No. 1 left tackle, but Starr said he expects Fields, Tim Stokes and possibly others to challenge for the job.

Twenty-nine rookies and free agents who reported to training camp Wednesday night had field tests Thursday. Sixty-one veterans were scheduled to report today.

In other news, player representative James Lofton said that Starr told him the urine tests taken as part of the team's regular physicals would not be used for detecting drug dependency.

Brewer boss expects close race all the way

MILWAUKEE — The dog days of the American League season are approaching. The Brewers went into Thursday's game against Cleveland with a half-game lead over Boston and a two-game lead over Baltimore, the contenders who usually sneak into the AL East race at this time every season because of the managing of Earl Weaver and the O's pitching.

Is Brewers Manager Harvey Kuenn feeling the pressure of the race? Is he worried about the Orioles?

"Baltimore is just one of the teams to watch," said Kuenn. "We knew they'd be where they are because of their pitching. But I haven't changed my mind about the race. I think four or five teams will have a shot at it (the title) in September. No one is going to run away."

The Brewers do not play a team with a winning record again until Aug. 20, and 13 of those 22 games are at home.

Those numbers might excite a Brewers fan, who is hoping Milwaukee can put some ground between the Wallbangers and Boston and Baltimore. Not Kuenn.

"My idea is to go out and play every game the same, whether it's on the road or at home and no matter who you are playing," said Kuenn. "If you win, no one gains ground on you."

Big Ten opposes USFL draft plans

CHICAGO (AP) — Big Ten Conference football coaches approved Friday a resolution that would ban United States Football League coaches and scouts from conference campuses if the new professional league conducts a December draft.

In response, USFL Commissioner Chet Simmons said college players drafted by the USFL before they finish college should return to school to earn their degrees.

"There's no question that we realize the importance of an athlete going back to school to finish his degree," Simmons said in a telephone interview.

Simmons said the league had not set a definite date for a draft, but acknowledged that because of the league's season, (March through July) a winter draft was likely.

Michigan Coach Bo Schembechler outlined the goals of the Big Ten resolution and said conference coaches and others, including Alabama's Bear Bryant, were in agreement.

Hornung sues NCAA for \$3 million

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Former Green Bay Packer star Paul Hornung filed a \$3 million lawsuit Friday against the National Collegiate Athletic Association, charging it has interfered with his right to make a living as a sports announcer.

The complaint arose from the NCAA's refusal to hire Hornung as announcer for 19 college football games to be broadcast this season over cable outlets by station WTBS of Atlanta.

In a letter sent to Hornung last April, NCAA TV program director Tom Hansen said, "The image which he projects or is projected for him does not personify college football."

Hornung was suspended from pro football for one year in 1963 from admitting that he gambled on the Packers to win and has been depicted as a playboy figure on beer commercials.

Arguello faces Rooney today

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Alexis Arguello stands to make \$1.5 million, his richest payday, if he gets past unheralded Kevin Rooney of Catskill, N.Y., in his junior welterweight debut today.

Arguello already has won three world titles, but he says today's scheduled 10-round bout (3:30 p.m., WISC-TV, Ch. 3) is "more important than a title fight."

The 29-year-old Nicaraguan exile needs to beat Rooney for a shot at World Boxing Association junior welterweight champion Aaron Pryor. A victory over Pryor would make Arguello the first man to win world titles in four weight classes.

NBA players' request denied

NEW YORK (AP) — Federal Judge Robert L. Carter declined a request Friday by the National Basketball Association Players Association that the league be kept from proposing or negotiating a player salary moderation plan.

The NBA proposed Wednesday at a meeting with the Players Association that the parties discuss such a plan, which is designed to moderate salary escalation.

The league said the players had refused to negotiate on that proposal. The NBA then filed an unfair labor practice charge with the National Labor Relations Board against the union on the basis of that alleged refusal.

The two sides are not scheduled to meet again until Aug. 25, when they discuss a new contract. The old contract expired June 1.

Chong had an emergency appendectomy this week. . . . **Julius Boros**, who earned more than \$1 million on the Professional Golfers' Association in the late 1950s and early '60s and **Kathy Whitworth**, the first professional woman golfer to win over \$1 million, have been chosen for the World Golf Hall of Fame.

Wimbledon winner **Martina Navratilova** may be forced to drop out of the McDonald's women's indoor tennis competition in Sydney, Australia, because of a hip injury. Navratilova pulled a muscle Friday night in the final set of her slugging 6-4, 3-6, 6-3 victory over West German **Bettina Bunge**. After the match, Navratilova said she would not make a final decision until further treatment this morning. Later Friday, Wimbledon runner-up **Chris Evert Lloyd** produced a polished performance in downing Australia's **Evonnie Cawley**, 6-3, 6-1. Evert Lloyd took 70 minutes to beat her longtime rival of 38 matches. American teenager **Andrea Jaeger** decisively beat England's **Sue Barker**, 6-0, 6-0. Packers to continue urine tests

The Green Bay Packers routinely have tested urine samples of players for years and will continue to do so, Coach **Bart Starr** said Friday.

Starr, saying such testing has been club policy since his first season as head coach in 1975, said the intent was not to detect possible drug usage by players, but to check for kidney ailments or other diseases.

"We will continue this program because it is in the best interests of the players, the football team and the organization," Starr said in a statement.

He said the National Football League club regularly has cautioned players about dangers of drug use and has been willing to "arrange counseling when it wasn't popular to do so" for any players who might have drug problems.

He said test results would remain confidential unless club officials had reason to believe that drugs were un-

determining a player's performance. In such a case, Starr said, he and trainer **Domenic Gentile** would determine whether any information would be made public.

Starr issued the statement after he had met with the players Friday. Sixty veterans reported to training camp Friday morning, joining 28 rookies and free agents who checked in Wednesday night.
