Platteville. Bearsville. Dullsville. Friday was opening day of the National Football League team's training camp at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville and the gorgeous 78-de-

gree day helped keep 80 players,



Milwaukee took advantage of the Orioles' skid. The Brewers are 10-10

since the all-star break, but they won 10 of the last 14 by tightening up the defense, getting good pitching and timely hitting.

"I don't think anyone could have expected that we get back in this as quickly as we did," third baseman Paul Molitor said. "I think a lot of us expected Baltimore to hit a low. But the longer they played well, you started to have doubts."

If the doubters were worried, they should remember the Orioles are in the AL East, a division where only one team has a winning record yet the fifth place team is only five games back. It's a division where the Yankees lost 11 of 14 games and didn't lose ground in the standings. But the rules say that the East must have a representative in the playoffs.

"Realistically, it's going to be tough for anyone to win more than 87 or 88 games this year," Molitor said. "When we sat down in Kansas City (for a team meeting), we had 70 games left and said if we win 45, we'd have a chance. Basically, we've played at that level, Baltimore has done its part and we have hope. But so do three or four other teams."

All of those teams have holes. The Orioles pitchers are young and the bullpen has been taxed, yet the Orioles play 17 of the next 20 games at home. Cleveland has good pitching, but its ace, Greg Swindell is hurt.

That leaves Boston and Toronto, the two teams likely to keep the Brewers' eyes focused to the scoreboard over the final 55 games. Boston is over injuries to Marty Barrett, Jim Rice and Ellis Burks, but the pitching staff is hurting. The Red Sox have Lee Smith, a closer second only to Milwaukee's Dan Plesac in the East. Both will be important down the stretch.

The Blue Jays have a lot of talent yet have won only 12 of 25 games in their new ballpark. If they don't learn to adjust to the Skydome — where they play 22 of the last 38 games - they could have problems.

Then there's the Brewers, a team buoyed by the addition of 40-year-old left-hander Jerry Reuss. He will give the Brewers a veteran No. 3 pitcher behind Chris Bosio and Teddy Higuera. But don't forget he still had an 8-5 record and a big 5.06 ERA with Chicago. While General Manager Harry Dalton deserves credit for making a move, it doesn't convince everyone the front office is committed to winning.

"Committed is a strong word," Molitor said. "It had been frustrating because some of the holes we had were pretty glaring the first half. For them to wait until we proved that we were going to be a contender was a little frustrating for everybody.

"But the move shows that they are trying to fill areas where we need help. Jerry might win five or six games for us and I think that would be a great contribution."

Still, the Brewers have deficiencies. They are susceptible to right-handed pitching unless Greg Brock produces runs as he has the last two weeks and the bench is woeful with B.J. Surhoff, Gus Polidor, Joey Meyer and Terry Francona as reserves.

But at least the Brewers are in a pennant race. And in a state where the Packers and Badgers figure a .500 football season is outstanding and a bid to the National Invitation Tournament sends basketball fans into cartwheels, the local sports fan has every right to be thrilled.

Just so the same fan remembers the Brewers record says they are three games under .500 and lucky to be in the AL $\bar{\mathbf{E}}$ ast.



GREEN BAY — The Green Bay Packers' Thursday afternoon practice turned into a lively and loud reunion

Linebacker Tim Harris was back after an 11-day contract holdout, and everybody was aware of the fact.

Last year's most valuable — and most visible — Packers player signed a two-year contract worth \$1.185 million Thursday morning.

In the afternoon, the talkative Harris was out on the practice field, working on his promise to lead the defense as he did last year, when he scored a touchdown, two safeties and had a team-leading 131/2 sacks.

But it wasn't Harris' first trip to the Packers practice field. In fact, Harris came to several practices even as he was holding out.

"I know it's the usual thing for unsigned players to hide out but it's hard for me to stay away," he said. After his first practice, he was smiling and satisfied

in the locker room. "Everything went fine," he said. Harris said he was not bitter over the length of the on-again, off-again contract negotiations.

One of Harris' agents, former Packers player Steve Luke, said Harris will receive a base salary of \$425,000 in 1989, plus a \$50,000 reporting bonus and a \$30,000 roster bonus. 
But Tom Braatz, Packers vice president of football operations, said Harris did not receive a signing bonus. The Packers have a policy against giving signing bonuses to returning veterans.



wife of sports agent Jim Bronner. "We wanted a year to look into the park site, and asked for the year extension plus two option years."

The only real change in the lease allows for a second level of outfield fence located behind the current barrier. The additional layer will provide

extra advertising space. "That will help us make a profit," Barnhill said. "I don't know if we'll make a profit this year. I was especially unhappy about the rainouts we

had in July.' Rain forced the loss of three home dates in July - bringing the year's total to nine - adding to persistent attendance woes.

Using the per-game average paid attendance over the final third of last season, this year's total projects to 74,949 over 58 dates, a 13,894 drop from last year's total of 88,843 over 65 dates. Both numbers pale in comparison to the high of 124,123 in 1982, the team's first season. However, the average actual attendance per game

is up, 824-788, over last season. "This isn't the type of thing you can turn around overnight," Muskies Director of Operations Jeff Jurgella said of the attendance problem, which resulted in a previous low of 84,381 paying spectators in 1987. "We have been making gradual progress as we try out more promotions, but nine rainouts, including five over June and July, makes it tough."

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

Anything for big bucks: Pete made it and spent it

Pete Rose made the most of his living-legend stature, turning himself into a one-man memorabilia business that marketed "official" Pete Rose hats, posters, pennants, buttons, plates, jerseys, figurines, newsletters, medallions, lithographs, beer mugs, video tapes, key chains and T-shirts.

He also profited by selling some of his possessions, usually to friends. A Rolex watch went for \$11,000, a Corvette (a gift for breaking Ty Cobb's record) for \$55,000. The bat and ball used for his record hit were sold to his insurance agent — a baseball memorabilia collector — for \$125,000. "You have to go to this guy's house to appreciate the Pete Rose collection he has," Rose said.

Then there was the baseball card show circuit. Although Rose still got a "big kick" out of signing his name, he now wanted to be compensated for the exercise. Major League Baseball's investigation portrayed Rose as a shrewd, if sometimes unorthodox, business-

Typically, Rose would hire a private plane to fly to a show city and, over a 2½-hour period, sign 1,000 autographs for a guarantee of between \$7,000 and \$12,000. Rose said he would collect his fee in cash if he didn't know the promoter. "I don't need to take a check home for eighty-one hundred dollars and the son-of-a-bitch bounce on me two days later," he explained.

Rose usually was accompanied on the trips by friends who assumed responsibility for counting his money, putting it in a bag and carrying it out of the show. "I don't want someone, a fan, to see someone handing me money," Rose said. "It's bad enough to sit down and sell autographs without having a stack full

Rose's traveling companions included Paul Janszen, a bodybuilder who has admitted selling steroids and cocaine and served four months in a halfway house this year for filing a false income tax return; Don Stenger, a gym owner who is serving a 10-year prison sentence for cocaine trafficking and tax evasion; and Tommy Gioiosa, a gym manager who was indicted this spring on charges of tax evasion and conspiracy to distribute cocaine. Rose said he had no knowledge at the time that any of his friends or acquaintances might have been engaged in criminal activity.

Rose lent his name and financial support to Pete Rose Hit King Marketing Inc., a New York-based company operated by Mike Bertolini, a baseball-card and memorabilia dealer. Under questioning by baseball's chief investigator John Dowd, Rose said that in the fall of '86 he loaned \$88,000 to Bertolini without asking him to sign a note. The loan was made in 11 \$8,000 checks, payable to ficticious names.

"It was just my way of sending Mike money to prepay some athletes for (card) shows," Rose told Dowd. "I was just helping Mikey out."

Rose said he didn't want to send Bertolini a single \$88,000 check because "that would wake up the world." He said the checks were written for \$8,000 because, "If you make them for over 10, then you've got to fill out a bank form and stuff." Rose may have been referring to the federal law that requires banking institutions to report to the IRS cash transactions of \$10,000 or more.

Although he was earning a lot of money, Rose was spending a lot. He owned a Rolls, a BMW M-1, three Porsches, thoroughbred horses, houses in Florida and Ohio and a piece of a popular Cincinnati nightspot. And he had an expensive hobby: gambling.

Even casual acquaintances knew Rose was dedicated to the track. It wasn't until last year, however, that baseball officials began hearing allegations that he wagered on baseball — including the Reds.

Early in 1988 Janszen was being investigated by the FBI, IRS and Drug Enforcement Administration for allegedly selling cocaine and anabolic steroids. In a meeting with federal agents, Janszen said he was asked to discuss his relationship with Rose.

At first Janszen said he refused because, "I didn't want to hurt him." He said he reconsidered after having a dispute with Rose over a gambling-related loan. In March 1988 Janszen told federal agents he had placed bets for Rose on baseball, football and basket-

Aware of the allegations, then commissioner Peter Ueberroth met with Rose on Feb. 20 of this year. At the meeting in New York, also attended by soon-to-becommissioner A. Bartlett Giamatti, Rose was asked if he had ever bet on a major league game. He said he hadn't. Later when a New York Times reporter inquired about the meeting, Ueberroth said, "There's nothing ominous and there won't be any follow through.

Three days later Ueberroth hired Dowd to follow through. On Feb. 24 Dowd and baseball security director Kevin Hallinan met Janszen in Cincinnati. During two days of tape-recorded interviews, Janszen described his gambling relationship with Rose and others, including a Franklin, Ohio, bookmaker, Ron Peters. So began baseball's investigation of Pete Rose.

Rose maintained his innocence from the start. Responding to a newspaper story that he had wagered on basketball games, Rose told a reporter: "Bet on basketball? I don't. It's illegal." He later told Dowd he had bet on basketball, both college and pro.

In March Dowd offered a proposition to Peters, who was awaiting sentencing on federal drug and tax charges: Tell us about your dealings with Rose and we'll inform your judge of your cooperation in baseball's investigation.

Peters accepted, and on March 23 he told Dowd and Hallinan that over a three-year period Rose had wagered an estimated \$1 million with him. "Did he place bets on the Cincinnati Reds?" Dowd asked. "Yes," Peters said.

On April 18 newly installed commissioner Giamatti sent a letter to the federal judge, lauding Peters's cooperation as "candid, forthright and truthful." Rose's lawyers later questioned how Giamatti could have characterized Peters's testimony as when he hadn't heard Rose's side of the story. Dowd didn't begin questioning Rose until April 20.

"It's obvious that the commissioner made up his mind or he wouldn't have sent that letter," Rose said. "I mean, the letter said, 'Mr. Peters is truthful ...' so why would Giamatti believe anything I say?

Not far from Riverfront Stadium, on Pete Rose Way, Joe Kaiser, a long-time friend of Rose, manages a bar called Flanagan's Landing. The other afternoon Kaiser spoke with sadness and resignation about a man he has known for 40 years.

"I don't think this is a light issue by any means," he said. "And I honestly feel that somewhere in time he will draw a suspension and maybe rightly so, because of his behavior. I don't think he should be betting through a bookie. I never approved of it. I always felt if he wanted to do that he should go to Las Vegas, where it's legal."

Kaiser said he shared his feelings with Rose numerous times. "He just shrugged it off, said 'Mind your own business,' " Kaiser said. "How can you talk to a self-made superstar who's making millions of dollars when you're Joe Blow, making \$450 a week? But I care about him. He's my friend."

Kaiser paused to recall some of the sacrifices Rose had made to become a baseball legend. Taking batting practice during the '81 strike "when it was 100 degrees outside." Dieting on lettuce and watermelon to get

down to his spring training weight.

"This man's a champion," Kaiser said. "He worked to get everything he got. But we're all human. We're not dealing with an Ivy League graduate here. We're dealing with a street kid that grew up and overcame insurmountable odds. I believe he should've been more discreet. But has Pete Rose ever been discreet about anything?"

"Pete Rose is no altar boy," he said quietly. "But he's no Al Capone either. He's not a threat to anybody. Except to himself."

Chang, the No. 2 seed, thus joined No. 1 Andre Agassi as a spectator.

Agassı was eliminated Thursday by 122nd-rated David Wheaton, who reached his first Grand Prix quarterfinal. On Friday, he made his first semifinal by eliminating Jim Courier 6-4, 6-3 after a 21/2-hour rain

Grabb was matched in today's semis against Jim Pugh, seeded 14th, who has done his best work in doubles. Pugh defeated Robert

No. 3 Brad Gilbert, the only remaining member of the top eight seeds, was the other semifinalist after beating another unseeded player, Glenn Layendecker, 6-4, 7-5.

The \$114,000 final is Sunday.

Subplots should add to usual drama at PGA

HAWTHORN WOODS, Ill. - The 71st PGA National Championship has more subplots than a soap opera. The tournament that starts next Thursday is more than the year's final event of golf's Grand

It's the last appearance in a major tournament for Jack Nicklaus and Lee Trevino before they pass into the Seniors category. It's also 39-year-old Tom Watson's chance to become only the fifth man to complete a career sweep of all four major titles.

It's yet another chance for Greg Norman to try to bounce back from yet another major-title near miss. And it's yet another round in the American vs. foreign player fight for golf domination.

It's the end of a two-year scramble for positions on the American Ryder Cup team that will face Europe's best in England next month. And it could mean an early end to the Player of the Year race.

That latter category could come about only if Masters champ Nick Faldo of England, U.S. Open titleholder Curtis Strange or British Open winner Mark Calcavecchia could annex the PGA crown.

Of the three, Calcavecchia would appear to have the best chance. A notorious streak player, he has not competed since his playoff victory in the British Open.

"For the first time in a long, long time I feel like I'm in control of my game again," Watson said after he finished fourth, two shots out of the British Open playoff.


