Wood, Preston making waves

Set records in preliminaries

What's in a name?

Just ask Chris Wood and Kathy Preston, who broke records in the competition for 11- and 12-yearolds Thursday at the 30th annual all-city swimming championship at Shorewood Hills pool.

Wood's namesake, Chris Dold, a longtime all-city swimmer and now a coach for the Hill Farm club, saw both of his 1985 city records fall in Thursday's preliminaries of the 50-yard breaststroke and the 100 individual medley.

Wood, the new owner of the 11-12 age group records, swims for Parkcrest. He swam the 100 individual medley in 1 minute, 2.91 seconds, shaving 2.22 seconds off Dold's mark. Wood swam the 50 breaststroke in 32.23 seconds, skimming 1.22 seconds off Dold's mark of 33.55 seconds.

"It's a pretty big accomplishment," said Wood, who will be a seventh-grader at Jefferson Middle School. "Dold is a very good swimmer."

Preston, a Cherokee swimmer, rewrote the record books in the 50 freestyle (26.19 seconds) and the 100 individual medley (1:04.92). Ridgewood's Kathy Reed set the 50 freestyle record (26.60) in 1978 and the 100 individual medley record (1:06.25) in 1977.

"I don't know her personally, but I've heard of her," said Preston, who wil be an eighth-grader at Gompers Middle School. "It's a real honor to break her records. I'm hoping I can break my own records in the finals."

Competition continues today at 9 a.m. with preliminaries for the 8-and-under and 9-10 age groups. The finals for all age groups are scheduled for 9 a.m. Saturday.

Wood came into Thursday's meet with an edge as he was crowned the 11-12 age group diving champion earlier in the week. That was special in that Wood finally beat two-time champion Lee Christianson.

"I like swimming better than diving," Wood said. "Swimming is just more fun."

His list of accomplishments this summer speaks for itself. He won seven gold medals — in the 100, 200 individual medley; 50, 100 breaststroke; 50, 100 freestyle and the 50 butterfly — at the Badger State Games. At the state Junior Olympics in Milwaukee last week, Wood swam away with four more gold medals — in the 200 individual **CITY SWIMMING**

record in the 100 breaststroke (1:10.95).

Hill Farm's Scott Koziar swam the 50 butterfly in a record 28.34 seconds in the boys 11-12 age group.

So just how tough is Scott Wilke's DeForest American Legion baseball team?

You might try asking some of DeForest's competition in the State Line League, where Wilke's club swept to the Western Division championship with a 13-3 record and took the overall title with victories over Metro Division champion Madison East and Southern Division winner Jefferson.

Or ask any of the teams that fell like dominoes in the Class A Region 8 tournament — Palmyra, Cottage Grove (twice) and Lake Mills - as DeForest stormed into its first Legion state tournament, a five-day, double-elimination affair that starts Saturday in Sturgeon Bay.

In fact, ask anyone who has had the misfortune of playing DeForest lately. They all lost. Wilke has his team — 23-7 overall — on a 14-game winning streak going into Saturday's 5 p.m. game with Holmen.

Or, you could just ask the coach. "This summer, we've really clicked," said Wilke, making his of-

ficial bid for understatesman of the year.

But then, when you can fill your dugout with three batters hitting over .400, six more hitting over .300 and a pitching staff that includes nobody with an earned run average over 3.10, maybe it's better to let their play do the talking.

Superspeedway may roar again

The old Capital Superspeedway outside Oregon, shut down since 1989, could be sold and reopened by next spring, if a prospective buyer has his way.

Wayne Erickson, owner of to purchase the racetrack from M&I Bank in Milwaukee.

"At the moment, I'm looking at it. There's nothing definite,'' Erickson said. "I'm trying to get some quotes together on what it's going to cost to make the thing operable. I'll make my decision by Oct. 1.'

The half-mile oval, between Oregon and Stoughton off Highway 138 on Sunrise Road, has a dirt surface and its resurfacing cost is the biggest roadblock to making the facility operable. However, Erickson runs his own construction company, so he would seem to have a good chance to work a deal.

"It's going to take some work," said Erickson, 53, of Hartford, 'but if I can get everything worked out, I'd be thinking of op-erating by mid-May of next year."

After converting the paved track to dirt in 1987 and renaming it Impact Speedway, Hemmen's group faced declining attendance and eventually shut down in 1989.

The Zeiders, who added a quarter-mile course inside the half-mile track, sold it three years later to Hemmen's group. Although attendance sagged in recent years when a variety of shows - sportsman, street stock and Enduro, as well as dirt late models, cycles and sprints — were offered, the track once regularly gotiating with Fritz Gierach, the drew between 3,000 and 5,000 fans when late models were offered.

Tonight's the night: Majkowski to take center stage in Packers' exhibition opener

GREEN BAY — Tonight's the night the Green Bay Packers and their fans will get their first clue of whether Don Majkowski can still play football.

Majkowski, the Packers' starting quarterback before he injured his shoulder Nov. 18, will start tonight against the New England Patriots in Green Bay's first exhi-

MILWAUKEE - Talk about your depth perception. Chuck Crim says the relief corps of the Milwaukee Brewers hit rock bottom Friday night.

En route to a humiliating 15-1 loss to the Texas Rangers before 22,323 onlookers at County Stadium, Crim, Darren Holmes and Edwin Nunez combined to allow 14 hits and 10 runs in — for lack of a better word — relief of starter Jaime Navarro.

Hodulik follows Kutzbach's wake

Katrina Kutzbach found out for the first time what it means for a teacher to reap what she sows.

Kutzbach, a long-time Shorewood swimmer, was more elated over student Sarah Hodulik's 25yard breaststroke record in the girls 8-and-under age group than the two she set in the 15-18 division at the 30th annual all-city swimming championship at the Shorewood Hills pool Saturday.

"I was so excited from that 8-and-under race that the adrenaline carried over when I swam my butterfly," Kutzbach said.

Hodulik swam the breaststroke in 19.39 seconds, surpassing the 1984 mark by .04 seconds held by Westside swimmer Julie Smith.

In terms of close calls, it came down to the day's final event — the boys 15-18 200 freestyle relay ---before Ridgewood could claim its 20th consecutive team title.

Ridgewood won the relay (1:33.80) to runner-up Parkcrest (1:35.17), thus winning the team title with 1,245 points to Parkcrest's 1,242.

"This was one of the closer meets between us in the last few years," said Ridgewood's Jeff Bruns, who won the 100 freestyle and 100 backstroke and was a member of the 200 freestyle and 200 medley relays. "That last relay is what won it for us."

Hodulik, seeded fourth in the 25 breaststroke, didn't expect do to as well as she did.

"I was surprised at the outcome," Hodulik said. "I thought I might get fourth because that's what I got in the preliminaries."

Hodulik, seeded second behind teammate Jane McDonald and ahead of teammate Kassie Linstroth, also won the 25 butterfly.

"I thought Kassie or Jane would win." said Hodulik, who was also a member of the record-setting 100 medley relay and the winning 100 frestyle relay. "This is the best I've ever done. It's really exciting."

Kutzbach, swimming in her last all-city meet, rejoiced in the rewards her first-year coaching efforts brought her.

"Watching the 8-and-under's reminds me of when I competed at that age," said Kutzbach, who will be a freshman at Northwestern University in the fall. "Watching them compete, It's exciting to see it all come together."

Kutzbach, a 1990 Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association state swim champion in the 200 individual medley, set records Saturday in the 200 IM (2:15.73) and the 100 butterfly (1:02.42), surpassing her own marks set in Thursday's preliminaries

son, Paul Perlberg and Brady Gomez clocked a 1:50.19 in the 200 medley relay, clipping Parkcrest's 1985 mark by 3.54 seconds.

Frattinger, Perlberg, Gomez and Lee Christianson combined for the record in the 200 freestyle relay, topping Shorewood's 1984 mark by .76 seconds.

Frattinger also set a record in the 100 backstroke with a time of 59.50 seconds, clipping Maple Bluff swimmer Jeff Fletcher's 1984 mark of 1:02.03.

Cherokee's Kathy Preston knocked off .87 seconds of her preliminary record set Thursday in the 100 IM of the girls 11-12 division, finishing in 1:03.65.

Monona's Keith and Ridgewood's Paul Brehm settled Friday's record-setting tie of 16.34 seconds in the preliminaries of the 25 butterfly in the boys 8-and-under division

Brehm, seeded second, surpassed that mark by swimming it in 16.02 seconds to runner-up Keith's time of 16.27 seconds.

Keith, however, finished with three gold medals in the 100 medley relay, the 100 freestyle relay and the 25 breaststroke.



The Milwaukee Bucks ended a two-year relationship with Frank Kornet Thursday when they waived the little-used forward to allow him to sign with Siena of the Italian A-1 professional basketball league.

Kornet, the Bucks' second-round pick in the 1989 National Basketball Association draft, played in 89 games in two seasons, averaging 6.7 minutes, 1.9 points and 1.1 rebounds.

With the draft-day trade for Seton Hall's Anthony Avent and the return of Larry Krystkowiak to the Bucks frontcourt, Kornet would have faced limited opportunity for playing time.

"Frank needs to play more minutes to reach his potential," Bucks Coach Del Harris said. "If he can get his game together, we certainly will want to look at him again in the future."

The Bucks agreed to release Kornet from the final year of a guaranteed three-year contract worth \$225,000 annually.

Former Bucks guard John Lucas bought the Miami Tropics and vowed to use the United States Basketball League franchise as a tool in helping players overcome drug problems.

Woosnam, Knox share PGA lead

CARMEL, Ind. - The leaderboard after the first round of the 73rd Professional Golfers' Association Championship at Crooked Stick Golf Club Thursday had the long and short of it. Co-leaders Ian Woosnam and Kenny Knox each shot 5-under-par 67s.

The tournament was scarred by the death of 39-year-old Thomas Weaver of nearby Fishers, Ind., who was struck by lightning at a parking lot about a mile from the course. Play was suspended at 2 p.m. because of thunderstorms. Weaver was struck shortly after 2:30 p.m.

Play resumed at 4 p.m. but was suspended again because of darkness at 7:50 p.m. with 27 players on the course. They will resume their rounds at 7:15 this morning.

Woosnam and Knox, who finished before the rain came, are at opposite ends of the spectrum when it comes to length off the tee. The 5-foot-4 extra-long-hitting Woosnam, who won The Masters in April, was expected to contend on the wet 7,289-yard Pete Dye-designed Stick. Knox, who is 162nd on the PGA Tour driving list, is something of a surprise.

with bogeys on two of the first four holes, but he holed out a 45-yard wedge shot on the par-5 ninth for an eagle, birdied the par-4 10th and then holed out a 168-yard 5-iron shot for an eagle on the par-4 12th.

"The shot on No. 9 was luck, but it had to be hit where I hit it," said Knox, a three-time winner on the PGA Tour.

Crooked Stick is the second-longest course ever to host the PGA Championship. The longest was Columbine Country Club in Denver. Players here wore out their long irons on par-4 holes like the 457yard fourth, the 468-yard 14th and the 469-yard 16th. PGA officials took pity on the field and moved the tees up on several holes. Knox called them "LPGA tees," and Woosnam agreed.

Woosnam, taking advantage of the soft fairways, used his driver on all but two driving holes. The 33-year-old Welshman had six birdies and one bogey in the best opening round he has ever had in a major championship.

Former champion Raymond Floyd is in a group of six at 69. Nick Faldo, searching for a PGA title to go with his two Masters and two British Opens, former British Open champion Greg Norman, three-time U.S. Open champion Hale Irwin and former British Open champion Mark Calcavecchia are in a large group at 69. With the tees up, soft greens and no wind, Crooked Stick was ready to be taken. There were 35 players under par and 13 at even par. Tom Sieckmann is 4 under par after 16 holes and Larry Mize is 3 under par through 15. With more rain forecast today, Knox knows he's going to be at a disadvantage. He described his chances of winning as "shaky" and is just trying to finish under par.

Infante: Daluiso able to replace Jacke

GREEN BAY -- Green Bay Packers Coach Lindy Infante wants it known he is telling the truth about the field-goal kicker the team has in training camp, and he isn't going to back off.

That kicker isn't Chris Jacke. So, on Thursday, Infante said again, as he has several times, that Brad Daluiso is kicking well for the Packers and would do a good job if Jacke doesn't sign a contract before the National Football League season begins Sept. 1.

"I feel good about the way Brad's hitting the ball," Infante said.

Infante said that just because Jacke's agent, Steve Weinberg, said Jacke was infuriated when Infante

expressed satisfaction with Daluiso. "That isn't going to change my opinion about anything."

Jacke and the Packers reportedly are about \$100,000 apart on a 1991 salary. Jacke reportedly is asking for \$800,000 over two years; the Packers reportedly are offering \$945,000 over three years. He made \$92,500 last year. He has made 45 of 78 field-goal attempts (77.6 percent) and 70 of 71 extra-point attempts in his two years with Green Bay.

Daluiso, a free-agent rookie who played at UCLA, "is good enough to play in this league," Infante said. "We've done a good job finding a guy in case Chris doesn't get in

here."

Infante said he talked to Jacke's father Thursday, because he couldn't reach Jacke, and "I said I wouldn't say anything but what I felt was the truth. That doesn't mean Chris is not our kicker. It doesn't mean we're trying to trade Chris, which we're not.'

Affholter watches, waits: Wide receiver Erik Affholter stood on the sidelines for the second straight day, but Infante said again that it was "precautionary."

Affholter has a tight hamstring muscle, Infante said, and rather than risk injury to the muscle, which kept Affholter out of play last season, it was decided rest would be best.

Only safety Mark Murphy (sepa-

rated shoulder), running back Chuck Webb (knee) and linebacker Brian Noble (knee) are definitely out of Saturday night's game against New Orleans in the Louisiana Superdome, Infante said.

Running back Vai Sikahema split a toenail in Wednesday's practice, and sat out Thursday.

Rotation undecided: The quarterback rotation for Saturday's game probably won't be decided until just before gametime, Infante said.

"It's not just a simple matter of changing a quarterback," he said. "I want to make sure we get the right kind of people in there with the right kind of quarterback so we get what we want out of the game."

"The tees were up, and that fa-vored me," said Knox, who sank two shots from the fairway for eagles. "I hope it doesn't rain until Monday. I know the farmers need it, but I don't need any rain. This course is long enough.

Hebert may miss Packers exhibition

Bobby Hebert pulled a groin muscle in practice at La Crosse and it wasn't known whether he will be able to take his turn at quarterback for the New Orleans Saints in Saturday night's National Football League exhibition game against the Green Bay Packers.

Saints Coach Jim Mora said it didn't seem to be a severe pull, but he wanted to see how well it responded to treatment before deciding whether Hebert would play against the Packers.

Hebert said the injury occurred after rain forced the Saints inside to complete a workout Wednesday.

"We were outside, and I was nice and warm," Hebert said. "Then we went inside and I sat around about 15 plays, and then, having to take off on that scramble ...

He scrambled right, threw back across his body and came away kneading the sore muscle.

"I'm going to try to play. I'm going to get treatment and wrap it. ... I wouldn't want to make it

worse, but it's not like I have something broken," Hebert said.

DeBerg: Pelluer lost interest: Steve Pelluer walked out of Kansas City Chiefs training camp because he lost interest in the game, fellow quarterback Steve DeBerg said.

"He just kind of lost his desire for the game," DeBerg said from the Chiefs camp at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls. "He was forcing himself to do it. He couldn't convince himself to do it just for the money."

Pelluer, 29, the backup to De-Berg, walked out Wednesday after meeting with Chiefs Coach Marty Schottenheimer.

Schottenheimer said he wasn't sure if the veteran would return.

Pelluer had been bothered by a sore back. "It hurts every hour of the day," Pelluer said last week.

McDonald admits drug abuse: Baltimore Colts linebacker Quintus McDonald says he's playing football

free of drugs and alcohol for the first time since high school.

"I'm an alcoholic and an addict. I no longer have qualms about saying that," McDonald said. "I live my life day to day, and my main goals are just staying clean and sober. The rest will take care of itself."

The 6-foot-3 McDonald, a sixthround draft pick, is starting his third year with the Colts after playing at Penn State.

McDonald's admission at training camp cleared up a mystery that has lingered since he spent five weeks on the non-football injury-illness list at midseason last year.

"This is a whole new thing for me, and I'm excited to see what the results will be," he said. McDonald, the nation's top-rated

high school player coming out of Montclair, N.J., High School, said he didn't know how good he could be because his mind was too foggy from substance abuse.

Out with injuries: Pro Bowl offensive tackle Richmond Webb will be out of Miami Dolphins practices for three weeks with a knee injury; and rookie wide receiver Jeff Graham, the Pittsburgh Steelers' No. 2 pick, is expected to miss about two weeks of practice with a strained thigh muscle.
