**Edgerton death  
probe reopened**

EDGERTON (AP) — Police on Monday reopened an investigation into the death of an Edgerton man whose body was found face down in a snow-covered alley nearly nine years ago.

Police said they would exhume the body of Paul Skar, 65, from Jenson Cemetery in Edgerton. It will be examined this week by state pathologist Dr. Robert Huntington in Madison.

Police had no further comment. Rock County coroner Richard McCaul ruled Skar died of a massive heart attack on Dec. 23, 1983. His body was found in the early morning, lying in an alley near the rear steps of the Carlton Hotel where he was living.

The incident initially was treated as a suspicious death because of the head cuts, the location of the body and the time the body was found, Police Chief Russell Laine said at the time.

But the coroner's report ruled out homicide and speculated that Skar suffered the head wounds when he fell.

"It's just like him dying all over again," said Skar's younger sister, Marian Busch, of Edgerton. "But I think if somebody did something to him, they should be caught."

Skar was born in Edgerton and served in the Army during World War II. He later worked as a machinist for Dorsey Trailers. After retirement, he lived at the Carlton Hotel, paying \$130 a month.

**Hen peckers need  
salt, vets warn**

Leave it to the American Veterinary Medical Association to come up with a concept to catch your attention.

"Reducing the amount of salt in your diet may help to prevent a variety of ills, most notably high blood pressure, but eliminate salt entirely and you could be asking for trouble," the association announced in a report of its 129th annual meeting.

Now, here was a concept worth thinking about.

All the human medical professionals keep telling us to cut our salt intake, but the dog doctors may have discovered a good reason to ignore that advice and to keep on salting our popcorn, potato chips and high-fat meats.

It would certainly come as good news to my wife, Jackie, and her friend Judith Nelson, each of whom sneaks extra salt into movie theaters to add to the already salted popcorn they buy in the lobby.

So, what is the danger of a diet too low in salt?

Well, Dr. Charles Howe Jr., of Woodward, Iowa, reports that a "salt deficiency in the diets of layer hens caused sudden and dramatic problems, including a drastic drop in egg production."

Not only did Howe's hens suffer a 29 percent drop in egg production, but they also started pecking each other.

This could be an alarming problem. I'm not stupid enough to discuss egg production with either my wife or with Judith Nelson. But I certainly wouldn't want to see them start pecking one another.

The veterinary association, however, after raising such fears in its press release, suggests that we don't have to worry too much about our wives — but we should worry about our hens.

"Salt deficiency can be a fairly common problem among hens because the modern layer diet is restricted to vegetables, which do not naturally contain sufficient salt," the association noted. "And, unlike human beings, hens are not in the habit of adding salt to their vegetables either before cooking or at the table."

Actually, it's pretty hard for a human to have a salt deficiency, given the fact that — unless we cook everything from scratch — the food we buy contains large amounts of it.

What the salt does is to regulate the flow of body fluids through our tissues and to protect our bodies against excessive loss of water. Human blood is, for all practical purposes, a salt solution.

Most nutritionists will tell you to limit the amount of salt in your diet, mostly because — as the veterinary association pointed out — salt can increase blood pressure in some people.

On the other hand, if you find yourself tempted to start pecking the head of the person next to you, perhaps you should eat a few more salted peanuts.

**Appleton says maybe to Bush**

APPLETON — Add the word "trust" to this year's political dictionary.

If "change" has been appropriated by Democrats and their presidential nominee Bill Clinton, "trust" was the word — at least on Monday — that Republicans and President Bush wanted voters in this traditionally Republican stronghold to think about.

But Bush evidently needs to provide more proof. The operative word here is "doubt."

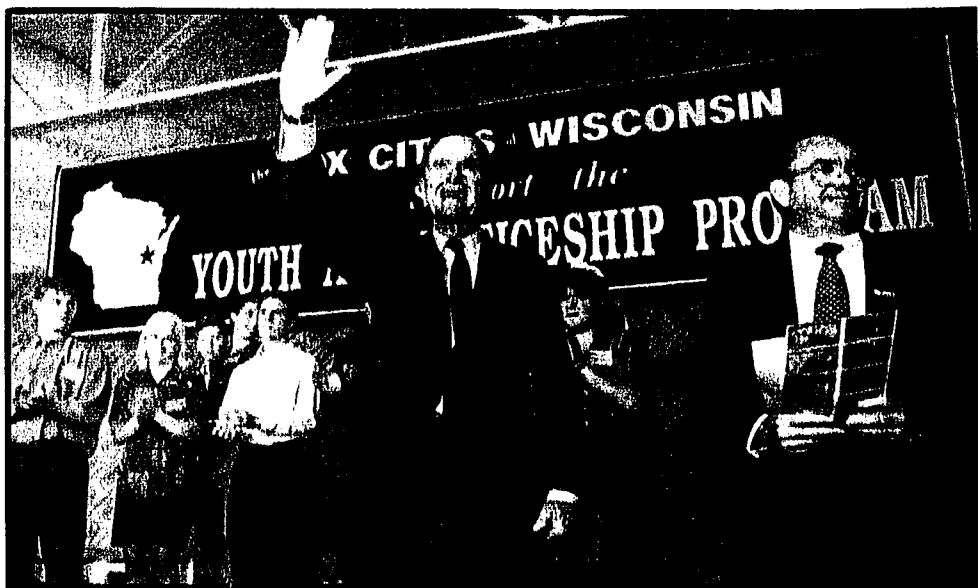
Loyal Republicans aren't panicky yet, but they're clearly worried about a Republican president who is being compared to Democrat Jimmy Carter, a weak incumbent who fell to Ronald Reagan in 1980. They have some doubts about Bush's ability to focus on a message and get the campaign going.

"He has to define the campaign in terms that are favorable to him," said state Rep. Gregg Underheim, R-Oshkosh. "If he can't do that, he's in big trouble. The Democrats have captured the moment."

Hundreds of striking paperworkers have doubts that Bush understands their plea for a better and more affordable national health care system. They greeted Bush's motorcade with Clinton placards, chants of "no more Bush" and angry signs ("George Herbert Hoover Bush," "Tax the Rich,"

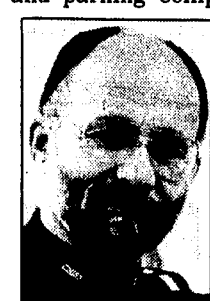

Cuts in police services may be necessary unless the city of Madison forks over \$180,000 for cost overruns in officer overtime, Police Chief David Couper warned Monday night.

But Mayor Paul Soglin said the city may jeopardize \$2.5 million in state funding if it pays the overtime along with \$330,000 the department has requested to pay for salary overruns.

Soglin and Couper locked horns on the issue at a meeting of the Board of Estimates.

The police chief said he can live within the budget constraints by cutting back on responses to non-emergency calls such as noise and parking complaints.

Couper said staying within the budget would have meant laying off 10 officers in January.

Soglin said the city can spend no more than \$800,000 allocated in this year's budget or risk losing \$2.5 million in state funding due to cost-control laws. He said security required for a visit by a presidential candidate this fall or cleanup costs of a major snowstorm could wipe out that money.

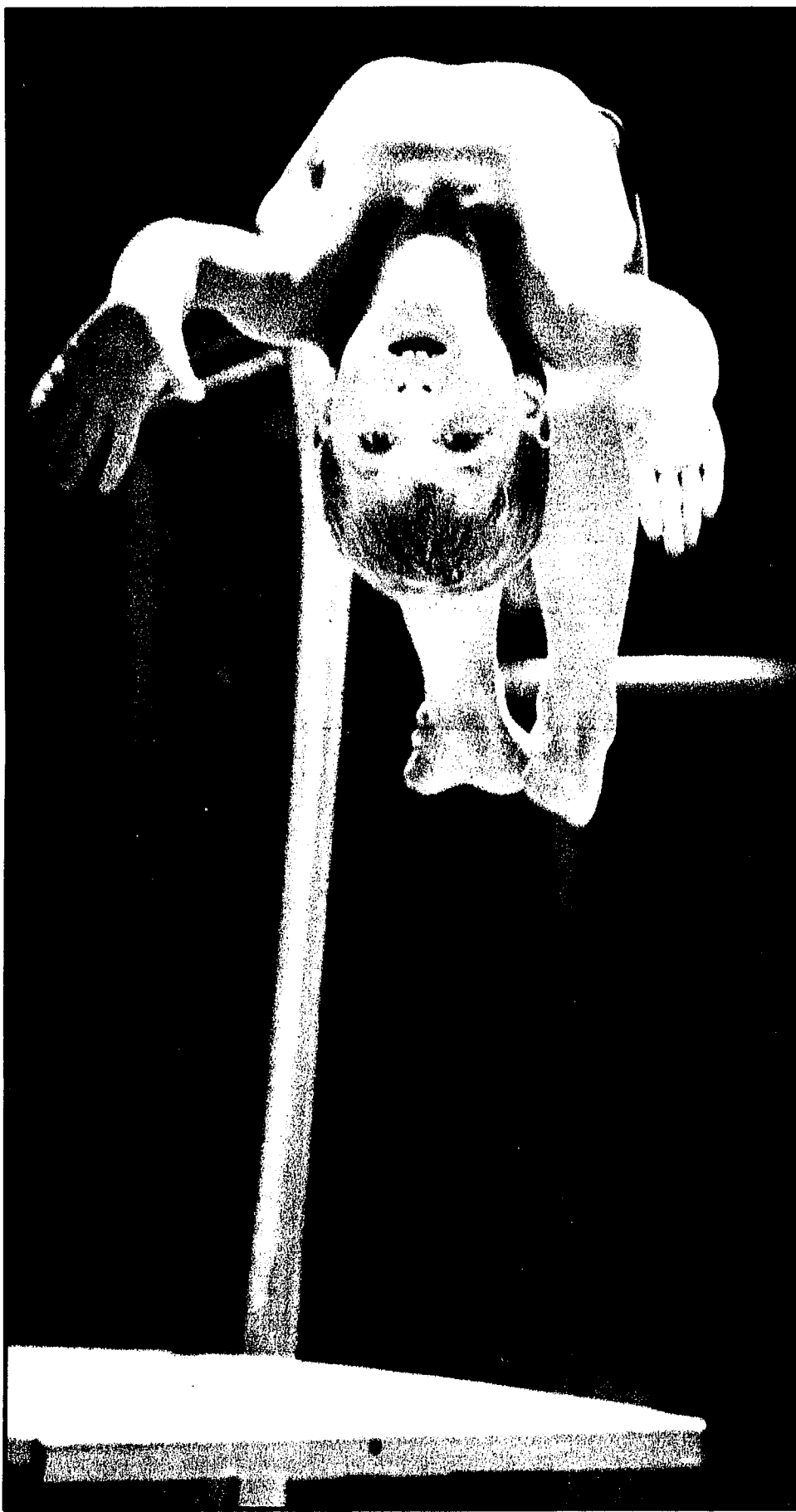
The mayor said the department started this year with 16 officers above its mandated full strength of 309 officers and received more than \$600,000 through a grant from the federal anti-drug "Weed and Seed" program. He said the department has failed to significantly reduce its overtime budget over four years.

"The department has got \$800,000 over what was approved for the '92 budget," Soglin said. "Are you telling me that the department really needed \$1.2 million over what was budgeted?"

Couper said the problem is when budgets are approved. "We put together budget in this city in November that we know can't get us through the year," he said.

A study of police overtime by Comptroller Paul Reilly found that officers are paid overtime for a 15-minute briefing even on days they take compensatory time. The study said these payments cost the department an estimated \$130,000 a year.

Couper and other police officials said the briefing pay is mandated by the police union contract.

**Staff shortfall  
stalls probes of  
welfare cheats**

Dane County's chief prosecutor of welfare cheaters is wondering where all the fraud has gone.

In 1991, Assistant District Attorney Ann Sayles charged and convicted 39 people of welfare fraud. She has handled exactly three new cases this year.

Sayles blames the drop in fraud cases on the county Department of Human Services, which has failed to replace investigators who left in the last six months.

"It does bother me the department isn't maintaining the resources devoted to investigating welfare fraud," Sayles said.

Sayles has been prodding Human Services since February to replace a fraud investigator who transferred to an unrelated job in the district attorney's office. Since Jan. 1, Human Services also has lost all four of the other staff members involved in welfare fraud investigation.

A combination of resignations, transfers and promotions this year wiped out the county's ability to investigate welfare fraud, said Daniel Kittel.

Kittel supervised welfare fraud investigations until mid-May, when he took a Human Services job as employment and training program manager.

As a result of the six-month lapse, Kittel said, there are "quite a few" cases of suspected fraud "waiting in the wings." He expects a new investigative team will be able to begin working on them this week.

"It's not that we have de-emphasized the importance of it," Kittel said. "We have not. If anything, it may be getting more important."

Earlier this year, County Executive Richard Phelps boasted in a letter to Gov. Tommy Thompson that Dane County's system for detecting welfare fraud is a model for other counties. Phelps noted that the number of welfare fraud convictions had risen from nine in 1989 to 39 in 1991, partly as a result of a decision to hire a full-time investigator. The total amount of money recovered as a result of successful investigations increased from about \$30,000 to \$370,000 during the same period.

Phelps aide Roberta Gassman said Monday that tracking welfare fraud is still a high priority.

"This is important for the taxpayers and important for the community that the few abusers there are dealt with strongly," Gassman said. "We will ask for a report immediately from the Department of Human Services to identify what kinds of barriers we have been facing for the last few months and ask for solutions to make sure the program stays strong."

Kittel described fraud investigation as a job requiring a combination of interviewing skills, familiarity with intricate welfare regulations and mathematical competence not easily found in one employee. He got one response from the department employees when he posted the opening this year, he said.

Plans to move Human Services' fraud investigation from Northport Avenue to an office in Sun Prairie also have made it harder to fill job vacancies, he said.

Kittel said he doubted much will be lost by the move from a central location because there will be more room and privacy and investigators spend most of their time outside the office.

**Research grants to UW top record**

Despite recessionary effects elsewhere, research grants to UW-Madison have reached a record \$300 million, Graduate School Dean John Wiley said Monday.

Compared with fiscal 1991, UW-Madison's outside research receipts jumped a record \$50 million, or nearly 20 percent, for the fiscal year ended June 30.

The equivalent of 3,519 full-time jobs on the Madison campus are supported by grants, gifts and awards secured by faculty and staff, the UW-Madison Office of Budget Planning and Analysis estimates.

Wiley attributed this year's funding jump to the ability of UW-Madison researchers to win major federal grants.

"We had 25 grants this year that totaled nearly \$50 million,"

Wiley said. "Our success is a tribute to both the quality of our staff and their willingness to prepare strong, competitive proposals."

This year's federal research funding for UW-Madison rose 18.2 percent, to \$228.6 million. That amounts to 76 percent of the grant total. But 10 years ago, UW-Madison researchers relied on the federal government for all but 10 percent of their grant funds.

"Big research universities like UW-Madison are getting a smaller and smaller share of the federal pie," Wiley said.

He cited federal budget cuts, more universities competing for research money and an increase in non-competitive grants awarded by Congress and the Bush administration.

UW-Madison ranked ninth in receipt of federal research and development grants in fiscal 1990, the last year for which figures are available from the National Science Foundation.

The largest research grant UW-Madison received this year was \$5.4 million from the U.S. De-

partment of Energy. That supports Professor Donald Reeder and the rest of the High Energy Physics Institute in their basic research of particle acceleration, with much of it conducted in Hamburg, Germany.

Among the other large federal grants to UW-Madison are ones supporting Nobel Prize winner Howard Temin's study of tumor-causing viruses, Professor Larry Bumpass' research on families and Professor Thomas Romberg's study of new ways to teach math and science.

"FUMMM-BULLLLLLL!!!"

In a scrimmage debut that made Coach Mike Holmgren a less-than-happy training camper, the Packers offense rumbled, bumbled and fumbled, fumbled and fumbled its way through a 15-minute, 30-play simulated game at the conclusion of Tuesday morning's practice.

Though admittedly impressed with the application of complex offensive schemes (Tiger, Eagle and Zebra are the names of the three primary formations) and feeding-frenzy nature of the defense (these guys were DYING to hit), Holmgren took considerable exception to the three fumbles and four dropped passes that marred the scrimmage.

"They're getting paid a lot of money to catch the ball, otherwise you play guard," Holmgren said. "And I don't like fumbles much — they get paid a lot of money to hold onto the ball, too. That's their job, period. There's nothing they can tell me."

Perhaps not coincidentally, the first two fumbles were committed by rookie fullback Dexter McNabb and halfback Edgar Bennett, respectively. McNabb tentatively joined halfback Darrell Thompson on the first unit, with Greg Bell and Buford McGee on the second team, Bennett and Steve Avery the third and Vince Workman and Doug Lloyd the fourth.

"The rookies are great, but they were a little nervous," said Thompson, who has shifted back to halfback after spending both minicamps at fullback. "You're a little uncertain out there hitting for the first time, but it still felt good to do it."

Tight end Ed West, a holdout until signing Monday, marked his first day of camp by catching two Don Majkowski passes to open the scrimmage . . . and then fumbling after his third reception.

Holmgren didn't save his grouching exclusively for the offense, noting a blown interception attempt by Plan B safety Adrian White late in the session. One play later, rookie Ty Detmer hit free agent tight end

Jerry Evans on a flat-pass that turned into a 64-yard scrimmage-ending touchdown play.

"It's a great way for the offense to finish," said Holmgren, who plans a heavy-morning, light-afternoon two-a-day practice routine for the duration of camp. "But if Adrian hangs on to that ball, he's got a touchdown, too. That's a 14-point swing that will kill you."

Though the scrimmage damage was negligible, three starters — Tony Mandarich (knee), Sterling Sharpe (ankle) and Tony Bennett (ankle) — sat out with minor injuries. Lloyd survived the morning, but the former Beaver Dam athlete left the afternoon session with what Trainer Domenic Gentile said could be a torn calf muscle.

Holdout happenings: It was another day of stalled talks between the Packers and their 12 unsigned players.

Left tackle Ken Ruettgens, one of nine veterans who has yet to report, is now reportedly willing to abandon a two-year package and settle for a one-year, \$850,000 contract in hopes of getting into camp. Negotiations with starters Brian Noble and Rich Moran remain at an impasse.

And though Holmgren ideally would like a full complement of players in camp, he is especially concerned about rookies Terrell Buckley and Mark D'Onofrio, neither of whom is close to signing.

"The simple fact," Holmgren said, "is if they miss a lot of practice and they're not in here prepared to play and they don't know things, then they're not going to play."

Purple haze: The days of rookies singing for their meals, waiting on veterans at the training table and other time-honored hijinks?

Gone.

At least at Camp Holmgren, where the new Packers coach has put the kibosh on the sometimes-not-so-innocuous tradition known as rookie hazing.

"I know a lot of teams do that, but once a rookie signs on here, he's a member of this team," Holmgren said. "I can remember guys dreading meals or not even going to dinner because of what they might have to do. I want our guys thinking about football."

# Montana's elbow not responding

Joe Montana worked out on a stairmaster while Steve Young guided the offense Tuesday, causing more rumors about Montana's surgically repaired elbow.

"The arm is still tired," said Montana, who had a tendon reattached to his throwing (right) elbow and missed all of last season. "It's not getting any worse, but it's not getting any better, either. So the best thing to do is try to let it get 100 percent healthy."

After throwing 30 times Monday, Montana consulted Trainer Lindsey McLean and took the day off. The veteran quarterback said he still might start against the Denver Broncos Monday in a National Football League exhibition game.

Later Tuesday, Montana said he would not throw today or Thursday.

Underpaid: Montana, Boomer Esiason and a handful of NFL superstars were the only 1990 restricted free agents who received contracts that began to approach their market value, an economist testified in Minneapolis.

Michael Glassman, testifying for eight players who filed an antitrust lawsuit against the NFL, included in that category quarterbacks Montana, Esiason of Cincinnati, Bernie Kosar of Cleveland and Jim Everett of the Los Angeles Rams and running back Neal Anderson of Chicago.

The names surfaced when Glassman explained during cross-examination that he didn't include those six players in calculating how much money restricted players lost in 1989 and 1990 under the league's Plan B free agency system.

Glassman testified Monday that salaries for 1990 restricted players would have been an average 34.2 percent higher had there been competition from another league.

Moon back: Quarterback Warren Moon showed up frustrated but on time for the Houston Oilers flight from Houston to Tokyo for an exhibition game Saturday against the Dallas Cowboys.

There had been speculation Moon might skip the Japan Bowl because of a contract dispute, especially after agent Leigh Steinberg said Moon could miss the trip.

Gibbs disputes report: Washington Redskins Coach Joe Gibbs called "inaccurate" a published report that he and Owner Jack Kent Cooke have agreed to a multi-year contract worth \$1.4 million a year.

## NFL NOTES

Gibbs didn't deny that he and Cooke had a new agreement, but he said the salary cited in the story in Tuesday's editions of The Washington Post was wrong.

"I'm not talking about it," Gibbs said. "It is the only thing I've been able to keep quiet. This is between me and Mr. Cooke."

Payback time: Alfred Oglesby had to be expecting some retribution sooner or later. It finally came late Monday when several of his Miami teammates duct-taped him to a tree outside their sleeping quarters at St. Thomas University.

Oglesby, a 280-pound defensive tackle, last week claimed to have been abducted at gunpoint. He later recanted and said he'd overslept and was trying to dodge the wrath of Dolphins Coach Don Shula.

"About 20 of us saw Alfred on the phone," said nose tackle Shawn Lee. "I took the phone and told his girlfriend, 'Sorry, Alfred can't come to the phone. He's all tied up right now.'"

After about 25 minutes of screaming and kicking — and just before curfew — Oglesby was cut free by tackle Gene Williams.

Indy-bound: Safety Joey Browner, released by Minnesota last week, continued his tour of camps, completing a two-day physical with Atlanta and then leaving for Indianapolis, where he's to work out for the Colts today.

Anderson takes chair: Dallas businessman Donny Anderson, a former running back and punter for the Green Bay Packers and St. Louis Cardinals, was elected chairman of the board of the NFL Alumni.

Injury report: Philadelphia Eagles running back Herschel Walker, who appeared to injure his ribs during a full-contact drill Monday, was held out of both practices Tuesday, but is expected to play in Saturday's exhibition game against the New York Jets. Cleveland Browns defensive lineman Michael Dean Perry underwent surgery to repair a torn cartilage in his right knee and will be out for three weeks.

### Team's close shave has its drawbacks

Symbolic acts of protest sometimes carry unexpected hazards. For example: When all 12 members of the U.S. volleyball team shave their heads, even they have trouble telling who is who.

"It gets confusing on the court," said Steve Timmons, after he and his teammates unveiled their new, angry look Tuesday in a close win over Canada. "A couple times I'd go, 'Nice hit Jeff, oh, ah, Bob?'"

The team went under the razor Monday as a way of protest and solidarity — protest against a ruling that cost them a game; solidarity with Bob Samuelson, a fiery bald-headed player whose passion to win caused the loss.

The team is protesting the International Volleyball Federation's reversal of the U.S. team's victory over Japan.

At issue was a penalty call against Samuelson, whose complaints over a shot he thought went out of bounds drew the referees' attention.

In volleyball, bad behavior will get you a yellow card. Two yellow cards earns you a red card and your opponent a technical point. Samuelson already had one yellow card.

By various accounts, referee Ramis Samedov showed the card, much the way a Sunday school teacher might threaten a truculent student with a ruler.

But Samedov didn't want to make it official; Japan was leading two games to one. One point would give them the third game and match. Samedov didn't want the contest decided on a technicality.

He allowed play to continue. The U.S. team fought back to win the set and then the match.

But the Japanese filed a protest. The next day the federation voted unanimously to give Japan the game.

The U.S. team didn't want to boycott, but it did want to do something.

"What we wanted to do is kind of all go bald so when they pull a yellow card, you'd ask, 'Which bald guy got the yellow card?'" Becker said.

### Cubs won't re-sign Dawson this season

The Chicago Cubs have told Andre Dawson that he can become a free agent at the end of the year because they don't have the money to sign him now.

"I flat-out don't think that I fit in their plans, and they can't convince me otherwise. I shouldn't be disappointed," said Dawson, who was seeking a two-year contract extension that would keep him in Chicago through the 1994 season.

The Cubs are keeping a close eye on their finances after signing Ryne Sandberg to a \$28 million contract extension this spring. And they are negotiating with pitcher Greg Maddux, who recently rejected a multimillion dollar offer.

Dawson, who has 392 career home runs, is leading the Cubs this year with 15 home runs and 54 RBIs.

### Battle of the Sexes II

Jimmy Connors and Martina Navratilova will face each other at Caesars Place Sept. 25 in a tennis match reminiscent of the sport's famous battle of the sexes nearly two decades ago.

Navratilova, in a teleconference Tuesday, likened the exhibition match to the celebrated showdown in 1973 between Billie Jean King and Bobby Riggs.

"The Billie Jean King match was a step for women's tennis but also for tennis because it brought the game to the masses," said Navratilova, 35.

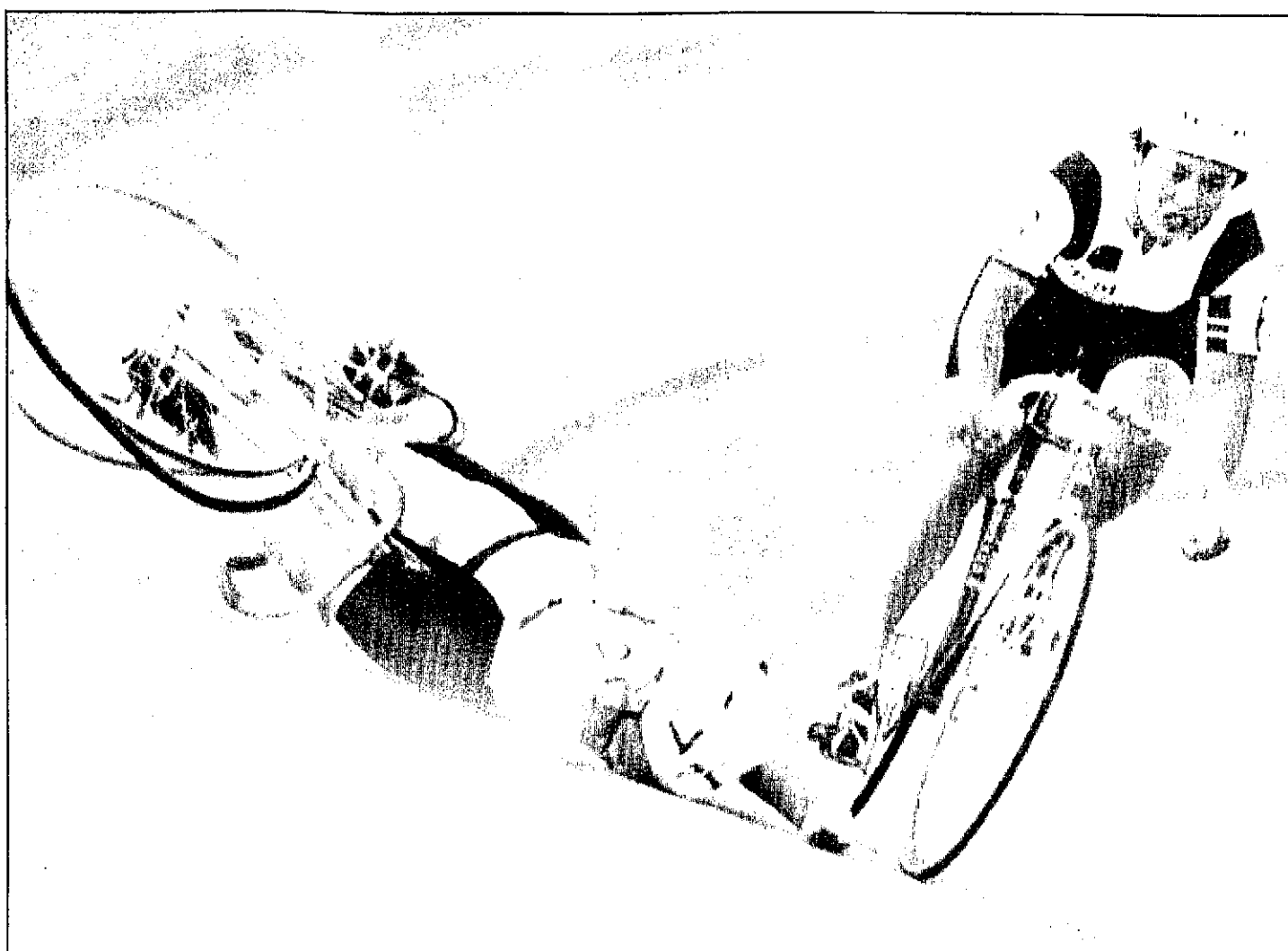

## Dream Team: Only true Olympians?

BARCELONA — The other teams aren't getting to them. The other teams aren't getting near them, except to shake hands. But the criticism is getting to America's Olympic basketball squad. They do something for their country and get ripped in return.

Some of them held a press conference Tuesday. In truth, it was a staged event, literally, up on the platform of a local theater, with questions from a paid interviewer, the ex-jock and current announcer Ahmad Rashad — who was wearing a baseball jersey with NIKE on the front, for heaven's sake.

Everything is a promotion these days, a figment of some marketer's feeble brain. The No. 1 sport in the Barcelona Olympics isn't basketball. Or swim-

ming. Or track and field. It's selling.

To get a few comments from Charles Barkley or David Robinson, and they weren't all that bad, Sir Charles sounding like Charlie Brown and asking "Why is everybody picking on me?" and the Admiral, Mr. Robinson, complaining about those who belittle America's effort, one had to sit through a Nike film — and Rashad's questions, written out on cards.

If it worked for Ronald Reagan, someone must have thought, it will work for Nike.

After the pap from Rashad, and applause from the audience — what would Damon Runyon have thought of all this? — Robinson, graduate of the United States Naval Academy, came out with all cannons firing.

This complaining that America is doing a disservice to international sport by sending pro basketball players to the Olympics? Robinson has had it up to here. And when you're seven feet tall, here is a long way up.

"Being in the military," said Robinson, perhaps alluding to Operation Desert Storm, "I see a country sending people into war who are semi-pacifists. That's garbage. That stuff that we beat

little Vietnamese, or people like that, it's garbage.

"This is sports, man. We don't need semi-pacifists. We need people supporting us. I don't think guys on this team are getting any great thrill about beating Angola by 65 points."

This argument can be made: In these Benchmark Olympics of Barcelona, where the chase seems to be less for gold than for dollars, pesetas, marks, pounds and yen, Team USA is the only true group of Olympians.

The Barkleys and Robinsons, and Michaels and Magics, aren't here to become rich and famous. They're already rich and famous. These guys are here for the sheer Olympian pleasure of the thrill of victory.

And the bleeding hearts of American journalism are finding fault. So too is the International Olympic Committee, which reportedly wanted to boot out

Barkley because he was writing a column for USA Today.

"I'm not getting paid, so it doesn't make any difference," said Barkley. "Everybody's jealous of the attention the team is getting. These people, they have ego problems."

P.J. Carlesimo, Seton Hall coach and one of the Team USA assistants, was on the stage with Barkley, Robinson, and three other Nike footwear people who rank a notch below Mr. Jordan, mainly Scottie Pippen, John Stockton and Chris Mullin.

## Nichols, Indians cool off Brewers

CLEVELAND (AP) — The way the Milwaukee Brewers have been playing of late, the last thing they expected was to be slowed down by a journeyman pitcher.

But that's what happened Tuesday night when Rod Nichols held the American League's hottest team in check and sparked the Cleveland Indians to a 4-2 victory at Municipal Stadium.

Nichols (2-2) allowed two runs on four hits, struck out four and walked two in his second start following a stay at Class AAA Colorado Springs.

Nichols had a 4.46 ERA in 16 relief appearances with the Indians before he was demoted. He is in his fifth season with the Indians but has spent time in the minor leagues in all but one of those seasons.

"That's the name of major league baseball, to be a survivor," Nichols said after his strong seven-inning stint. "But now I'm in the starting rotation where I want to be, and I hope I'm there for awhile."

The loss was a costly one for the Brewers because both teams they are chasing in the AL East — Toronto and Baltimore — registered victories. Milwaukee, which had a four-game winning streak snapped, is five games behind the Blue Jays, one behind the Orioles.

Mark Lewis hit a solo home run and Derek Lilliquist got the final two outs for his second save as the Indians won for the seventh time in 10 games.

Milwaukee starter Ricky Bones (6-7) gave up four runs and 10 hits in five innings.

"I was pitching them inside when I wanted to, jamming them

some, but they were still getting some base hits," Bones said.

"The Indians hit more jam shots and end-of-the-bat dinkers than line drives," said Brewers manager Phil Garner. "His (Bones) location wasn't off, and he wasn't hit that hard. It just was not his night."

Consecutive singles by Paul Sorrento, Glenallen Hill and Mark Whiten gave Cleveland a 1-0 lead in the second inning. In the third, Lewis hit his fourth home run and the Indians made it 3-0 in the fourth after Hill singled and scored on Sandy Alomar Jr.'s single.

Milwaukee scored both its runs in the fifth. Jaha hit his first major league home run with two outs. B.J. Surhoff then walked and scored on Jim Gantner's double.

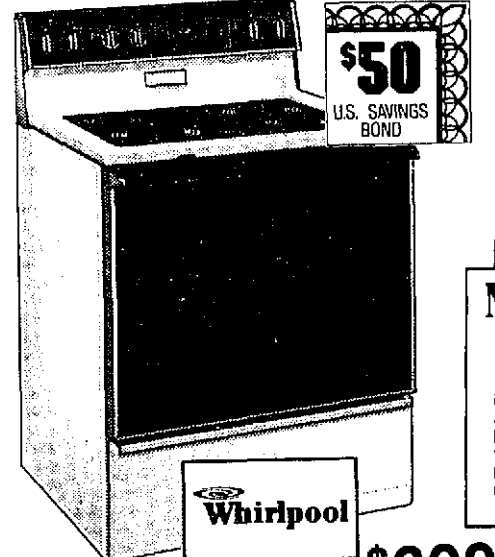

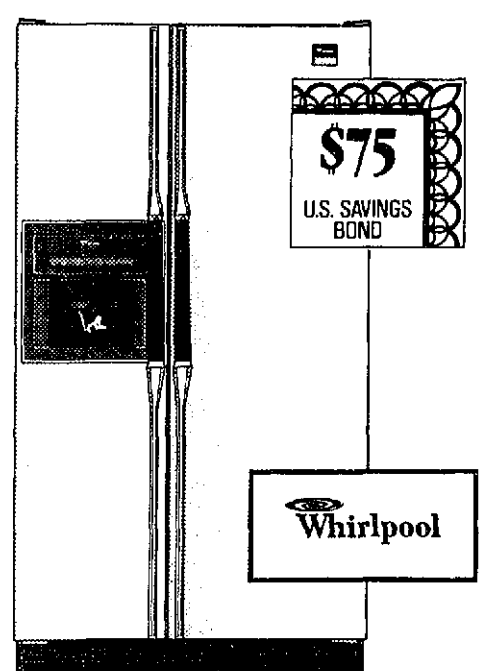

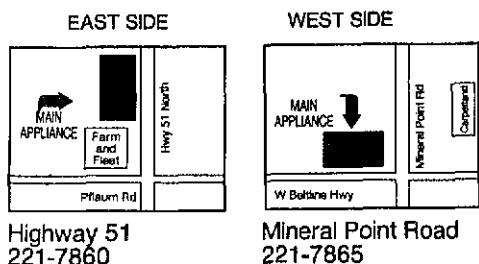

## SPORTS BRIEFS

**BOWLING** Marc McDowell of Madison slipped from second to fourth place after Tuesday night's fourth round of the PBA's \$135,000 Columbia 300 Open at San Antonio, Texas.

Roger Bowker of Ocala, Fla., won all eight of his games to move from fifth to the top spot. The two-time PBA champion averaged 249 over those eight games, rolling a 279 final game en route to a 6,350 pinfall total. Third-round leader Butch Soper slipped to second with 6,168 pins, followed by Scott Devers (6,144), McDowell (6,121) and Richard Wolfe (6,116).

**FOOTBALL** San Francisco quarterback Joe Montana says his arm isn't getting worse. But it isn't getting better, either.

Montana, who had surgery in October to repair a torn tendon in his right shoulder, sat out all of last season. Now the tired arm is preventing him from throwing in training camp today and Thursday. Montana said he would not rule out a start in Monday night's exhibition game against the Denver Broncos at Candlestick Park.

Montana, Boomer Esiason and a handful of NFL superstars were the only 1990 restricted free agents who received contracts that began to approach their market value, an economist testified.

Michael Glassman, testifying for eight players who filed an antitrust lawsuit against the NFL, included in that category quarterbacks Montana of San Francisco, Esiason of Cincinnati, Bernie Kosar of Cleveland and Jim Everett of the Los Angeles Rams, and running back Neal Anderson of Chicago.

The Washington-based economist also said Buffalo quarterback Jim Kelly was the only 1989 restricted free agent paid close to what he could have received if he'd been free to negotiate with any team.

**TENNIS** Bjorn Borg pumped life into his comeback drive Tuesday night with a 6-3, 6-4 victory over George Bezeny in the first round of the U.S. Pro Tennis Championships at Brookline, Mass.

Borg, who won three U.S. Pro titles at Longwood Cricket Club in the mid-1970s, delighted a capacity crowd of 7,500 in a highly publicized match that lasted only 73 minutes.

The 36-year-old Borg, who had been having little luck on a comeback drive, broke Bezeny's serve in the sixth game and held service through a 21-point seventh game to take the first set in 34 minutes.

He grabbed the advantage even earlier in the second set, breaking Bezeny in the third game and holding serve thereafter, winning on his fifth match point in the 10th game.

Borg's victory came just 24 hours after he was beaten in the first round of the doubles phase of the \$250,000 tournament and was only the second match victory during his comeback drive.

Borg came into the match ranked 920th in the tennis computer system. Bezeny, a 26-year-old University of Georgia graduate, is 430th.

**BASEBALL** Detroit Tigers owner Tom Monaghan has reached a tentative agreement to sell the team to Mike Ilitch, owner of the NHL's Detroit Red Wings and the Little Caesar's pizza chain, the Detroit Free Press reported.

The deal with Monaghan, who owns the rival Domino's Pizza chain, has yet to be signed, the newspaper reported in today's editions, citing sources familiar with the agreement. A purchase price wasn't disclosed.

**BITS AND PIECES** Matt Williams, Mike Cerniglia and John Peterman of Madison Memorial, and Dan Endres and Jeff Rodelfeld of La Follette were all selected to play for Team Wisconsin at the Minnesota Hockey Festival Saturday in Minneapolis. Jarred Goodson of Madison will play on another entry in the week-long tournament of select players.
