Pewaukee player says he picks UW

Chris McIntosh, a 6-foot-7, 270-pound senior-to-be at Pewaukee High School, told the Milwaukee Journal he will make an oral commitment today to play football at the University of Wisconsin.

McIntosh said he will meet with Badgers coach Barry Alvarez and offensive line coach Bill Callahan, who will offer him a scholarship that he will accept.

McIntosh was courted by such Big Ten Conference schools as Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota and Iowa, along with Arizona of the Pacific-10 Conference.

McIntosh was considered to be one of the Badgers' top in-state recruits and is the third in-state player to give a verbal commitment this summer. Alvarez's staff has also received commitments from Tom Burke, a 6-4, 235-pound defensive end and tight end from Maple Northwestern, and Nathan Kroepin, a 6-7, 235-pound tight end and defensive end, from Lakeland in Minocqua.

Alvarez may have as many as 25 scholarships to offer this season.

Braves' Tarasco hurt while sliding

Tony Tarasco of the Atlanta Braves sprained his neck making an awkward head-first slide into second base Friday night.

Tarasco, removed on a stretcher in the first inning of the second game of a doubleheader with the St. Louis Cardinals, was released a hospital a little more than an hour later.

After walking with two outs, Tarasco appeared to hit his head on the bag as he slid into second base. The game was delayed for several minutes while trainers applied a neck brace and carried Tarasco off the field.

■ Umpire Ken Kaiser, making his first appearance since being injured in a Boston traffic accident nearly two months ago, aggravated a neck injury and had to leave during the second inning of Friday's game between Seattle and Boston.

■ A Las Vegas man has become the third person to sue former New York Mets outfielder Vince Coleman, alleging he was injured when Coleman tossed a small explosive device into a Dodger Stadium crowd last summer. Larry Gillerman filed a lawsuit in Los Angeles for damages arising from the incident.

■ The Florida Marlins placed Dave Magadan on the 15-day disabled list after discovering he broke his left foot when he was hit by a pitch thrown by Cincinnati's Hector Carrasco in the ninth inning of Wednesday's 8-7 victory over Cincinnati.

■ There is a possibility that all 40,000 ceiling tiles at the Seattle Kingdome may have to be replaced. Four tiles crashed into the stands Tuesday just hours before the start of a game between the Mariners and Baltimore.

King County officials are bracing for the likelihood that the Mariners will bill the county for lost revenue, which could top \$2 million for the six games that had to be moved to other cities.

■ Second-seeded Stefan Edberg took advantage of numerous unforced errors and breezed to a 6-4, 6-1 quarterfinal victory over Aaron Krickstein at the Legg Mason Tennis Classic in Washington, D.C. Byron Black of Zimbabwe, Todd Wheaton and Jason Stoltenberg also won.

Cautious Indurain closes in on title

Miguel Indurain just about clinched his fourth straight Tour de France title on Friday.

The Spanish cyclist, aware that he had a large lead, wasn't about take any risks on a rain-slick mountain in the 19th stage that finished in Morzine, France, and he finished about 3 minutes behind Piotr Ugrumov of Latvia, who won his second straight stage.

Still, with only two days left, Indurain led Ugrumov by 5 minutes, 39 seconds in the overall standings.

The Frenchman later lost his lead, ending up more than 6 minutes behind Ugrumov, and dropped to fifth overall.

Ugrumov covered the 30-mile mountain trial in 1 hour, 22 minutes and 59 seconds, which moved him into second place overall.

Second for the day was Marco Pantani of Italy, 1 minute, 38 seconds behind Ugrumov. Indurain, never a great individual climber, was third, 3:16 behind.

William Sigei of Kenya shattered the world 10,000-meter record with a time of 26 minutes, 52.23 seconds at the Bislett Games in Oslo, Norway. It was the 60th world record since 1924 at the famous wooden stadium's "world record track." Sigei cut more than 6 seconds off fellow Kenyan Yobes Ondieki's old record. . . . The son of sports-caster and former St. Louis Cardinals football player Dan Dierdorf was arrested Friday on charges of raping and sodomizing his former girlfriend, authorities in Chesterfield, Mo., said. Daniel Dierdorf Jr., 25, was charged with two counts of rape, two counts of sodomy, one count of felonious restraint and five counts of armed criminal action. . . .

The United States' improbable run in the women's field hockey World Cup ended in the semifinals when the Americans were beaten by Argentina, 2-0, in Dublin, Ireland. Argentina will play pre-tournament favorite Australia in Sunday's final. . . . Promoter Vince McMahon, who transformed wrestling into a multimillion-dollar industry during the 1980s, was cleared Friday of charges that he fueled the sport's growth through a widespread steroid conspiracy. A federal jury in Uniondale, N.Y., acquitted McMahon of conspiring to distribute steroids among his heavyweight charges in the World Wrestling Federation. . . . Former University of Pennsylvania football coach George Mungler, who led the team through its glory days of the 1940s, has died of heart failure in Philadelphia. He was 84.

Alfredsson in control

Helen Alfredsson wasn't as impressive as she was in the opening round of the U.S. Women's Open, yet she set another record at Lake Orion, Mich.

The native of Sweden shot a 2-under-par 69 Friday for a record 36-hole total of 10-under 132. That was good enough for a 4-stroke lead over England's Laura Davies when play was halted by darkness.

An afternoon rain delay of 2 hours, 8 minutes on the Old Course at Indianwood Golf and Country Club, left 15 players on the course when play was halted at 9:06 p.m. EDT. Those players were to report at 7:30 a.m. today and complete their rounds before the cut and start of the third round.

Alicia Dibos, who was 5-under through 14 holes, was most notable among those players.

The long-hitting Davies, winner of three Ladies Professional Golf Association events this season and the tour's top money-winner, won the Open in 1987 before joining the LPGA. She fired her second straight 68, holding out for par on 18 just as darkness fell.

Michelle Estill and Patty Sheehan were 2 strokes back at 138. Estill shot 68 and Sheehan 71 in the second round.

Pamela Wright put together the most impressive round of the day. Wright, starting at 3-over, birdied five straight holes — Nos. 9-13 — en route to a 6-under 65. That left her tied with Donna Andrews and Judy Dickinson at 139.

Wright's 30 on the back side was the lowest 9-hole score in Open history, breaking the mark of 31 held by several golfers.

Madison's Sharri Steinhauer was at 140 (68-72).

Alfredsson shattered the Open record by 2 strokes with an 8-under 63 in Thursday's opening round over the 6,244-yard course. No other golfer, male or female, has ever shot better than 63 in a major championship.

Was it a letdown on Friday? "It is never a letdown to shoot in the 60s," Alfredsson said. "I mean, I'm very happy for yesterday. But I'm very happy today with a 69. You have to forget about yesterday. That is a day that passed you and you are happy with that, and today is a new day."

been 12 years since Ed Fiori won a Professional Golfers' Association tournament. His immediate future, though, looks promising.

That's because he held a 1-stroke lead over Kenny Perry after the second round of the New England Classic at Sutton, Mass. Fiori shot his second straight 66 for a 10-under-par 132.

"Mr. Fiori," golfer Blaine McCallister shouted playfully from the back of the interview room. "How does it feel to lead a golf tournament?"

"I don't know," Fiori answered with a smile. "It's been so long." Tied at 134 were Guy Boros and David Feherty, who both shot 69, and Fred Funk, who had a 66 on the 7,110-yard Pleasant Valley Country Club course.

With 10 golfers within 4 strokes of the lead and an easy course on which only players who shot 1-under par or better made the cut, Fiori isn't spending the \$180,000 top prize yet. He made less than that in

each of the last four years. And he's won just \$33,720 this year.

Dick Mast, Ronnie Black, Chris DiMarco and Tommy Armour III were at 135, while Michael Bradley and Bill Glasson were at 136.

Brian Henninger and Mark Wurtz shared the first-day lead with 64s. Henninger shot 74 Friday and Wurtz 73.

■ **Wargo British leader:** Tom Wargo wasn't as steady, but a bit of scrambling enabled him to be as good as he was the previous day, and the American will take a 2-stroke lead into the final round of the Senior British Open at Lytham, England.

Wargo shot his second straight 4-under-par 68 on the Royal Lytham and St. Anne's course for a 7-under total of 209, 2 better than second-round leader and defending champion Bob Charles.

Charles had a 72 on the 6,673-yard layout to stand second at 211.

Crowd favorite Arnold Palmer, the first-round co-leader, dropped another shot off the lead with a 71. He is tied for fifth at 214 with Frenchman Michel Damiano and England's Tommy Horton.

South Africa's Gary Player, who played in his record 40th British Open last week, was at 213, 1 stroke behind Doug Dalziel.

■ **Marsh in front:** South African Graham Marsh shot a 4-under-par 66 to take a 1-shot lead over Ray Floyd and four others at the PGA Seniors Southwestern Bell Classic at Belton, Mo.

Shorewood's Bob Brue opened with a 75.

■ **Kendall in hunt:** Skip Kendall of Mequon shot a 2-under-par 70 for a two-round total of 139 and was 2 strokes off the pace at the Nike Gateway Classic at Lake St. Louis, Mo.

Kendall, who shot a 69 Thursday, trails leader John Ross (68-69 — 137) and four others at 138. Madison's Jery Kelly was a shot back of Kendall in a group of six players at 140 (71-69). Jim Schuman, also of Madison, was at 143 (73-70). J.P. Hayes of Appleton was at 144 (68-76), a shot under the 145 cut.

Packers get their man

Oilers drop ball, receiver Duncan enters fold

GREEN BAY — His uniform was so new there wasn't even a name stenciled in above the big number 80.

It didn't matter. Curtis Duncan's name and reputation preceded him here by at least two years, according to Green Bay Packers general manager Ron Wolf.

"I remember when we played them down there a couple years ago," he said, referring to a game late in the 1992 season when the Packers played the Houston Oilers. Duncan, a wide receiver, was in the midst of his best season, one in which he caught 82 passes for 954 yards and was named to the Pro Bowl.

"He was a real fast guy," Wolf said. "Real fast. And he was a lot bigger than we thought he was." Duncan, the newest addition to the Green Bay's burgeoning receiver corps, arrived on the Oneida Street practice field near the end of the morning practice session — and he spent most of his time there chatting with former Oilers teammate Sean Jones.

The Oilers — battling the National Football League's \$34.6 million salary cap — were forced to waive Duncan last Friday. They had hoped to re-sign him, but couldn't come up with enough cash and Duncan wound up with Green Bay. He agreed to terms on a contract Thursday.

The Houston Chronicle has reported Duncan signed a one-year deal worth \$355,000. The newspaper said the Oilers tried to re-sign Duncan at the \$162,000 minimum. Duncan had a year left on a contract which could have paid him \$595,000.

"Things happen and they happen for a reason," said Duncan. "I'm just fortunate to be here."

Duncan, 29, has was a 10th-round selection out of Northwestern in 1987. He started just one game in his first three seasons with the Oilers but started 60 of 64 the past three years. A foot injury kept him out of four games last season.

In Houston the 5-foot-11, 184-pound Duncan was thought of more

as a possession-type receiver in the Oilers run-and-shoot offense. Wolf saw more.

"He can really run," Wolf said. "He would probably be as fast as any receiver we have. I haven't put him to a clock, but just watching him play, he would be that fast."

In seven years with the Oilers he caught 322 passes for 3,935 yards (a 12.2-yard average) with 20 touchdowns.

He joins a corps of wide receivers long on numbers but short on proven players. Sterling Sharpe is scheduled to miss most of training camp while recovering from foot surgery. The remaining receivers on the roster have started 11 games and caught a total of 80 passes in the NFL — two fewer than Duncan caught in '92.

"First, Curtis has played a lot and caught a lot of passes," said Packers coach Mike Holmgren. "He knows what the game is about. Second, he has great speed. And he's a veteran. It's good to have the maturity of a veteran."

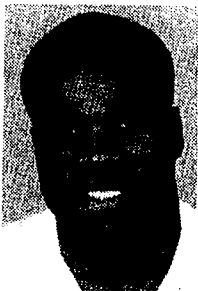
Wolf said Duncan will likely battle with Robert Brooks for the wide receiver spot opposite Sharpe.

"He's got a good chance to (start)," Wolf said. "He has to beat Brooks out, but he's a Pro Bowl player. You don't get there very often."

Duncan wasn't making any predictions.

"My primary objective is to come in and make a positive contribution any way I can," he said. "And we'll take it from there. This is a great team. The only thing I can do is come in and maybe make it a little better."

Eagles give up on Harris

The Philadelphia Eagles released former Green Bay Packers defensive end Tim Harris Friday to free enough money to sign defensive end Greg Townsend and stay under the National Football League salary cap.

Harris, who signed a three-year, \$5.4 million contract last year, was scheduled to earn a base salary of \$1.5 million this season.

Harris had 19 sacks for the San Francisco 49ers in 1992 but failed to register a sack last season, when he was bothered by a sore right elbow. He played for the Packers from 1986 through '90.

Townsend signed a one-year deal worth \$730,000, with a signing bonus worth \$80,000.

"We feel we upgraded our team," Eagles coach Rich Kotite said. "There was no way we could keep both of them. And we feel we definitely upgraded the team."

■ **Buck backs down:** After a three-day hold out that cost him \$12,000 in fines, defensive back

Vince Buck said he will report to the New Orleans Saints training camp at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse.

Buck had said he would not report until an agreement was reached on a contract extension. But Saints officials said no agreement has been reached.

Buck, who is projected to start at free safety this year, is in the option year of his contract and is scheduled to earn \$365,000 for the second consecutive season. He started at left cornerback last season, the first time in his four-year career that he started every regular-season game.

■ **Redskins acquire Bayless:** The Washington Redskins signed unrestricted free agent defensive back Martin Bayless of Kansas City to a one-year contract worth \$300,000.

Bayless, 31, who had two interceptions last season, will fill a void

at safety. The Redskins cut Brian Edwards this week after he declined to accept a 65-percent cut in pay.

■ **Giants sign top pick:** The New York Giants signed their No. 1 draft pick, wide receiver Thomas Lewis from Indiana, to a four-year contract worth \$3 million. Lewis, who has a pulled hamstring muscle, is not expected to practice with the team for at least two weeks.

■ **Kelly makes progress:** A few short passes were all Buffalo Bills quarterback Jim Kelly needed to pronounce his shoulder fit. "The first day, I'd definitely give it a passing grade," Kelly said after his first practice of training camp at Fredonia, N.Y. "Hopefully, at the end of camp my arm will still feel this good, and I have confidence that it will."

Kelly, 34, bothered by tendinitis in his throwing shoulder, didn't throw during the morning session of two-day practices, then took his turn in the four-quarterback rotation in the afternoon.

Poor play hasn't kept fans away

PHILADELPHIA — There are 28 major-league baseball teams these days, which is to say 28 teams bill themselves as "major league," pay their players major-league salaries, and charge their customers major-league prices. Of those 28 teams, nine have winning records, 19 have losing records.

Stop and think about that for a minute. For a variety of reasons, ranging from inept management — surely the primary villain — to crippling injuries, 19 big-league clubs have been unable to play .500 ball. Nineteen big-league cities have been asked to support teams that can't win half their games.

And yet, as bad as many of those teams are, fans keep pouring out.

If the preponderance of losing clubs says something about the quality of today's big-league baseball and the management types who run it, then the size of the crowds tells you how much people love this game, despite what's being done to

it.

Dick Ravitch, who represents the owners in their current, knock-down, drag-out, strike-bound battle with the players, said in a recent interview, "Baseball has a serious, serious problem. . . . Let me tell you something, if you strained out of the attendance figures this year at the new stadiums, attendance is way off. The fact of the matter is, the game's hurting."

Indeed, the new ballparks in Cleveland and Arlington, Texas, are responsible for this year's jump in overall big-league attendance, up 227,268 through Saturday. Throw out Cleveland and Texas, and the remaining 12 American League clubs are down 604,482. The 14 National League clubs are off 553,828.

Clearly, there's truth to what Ravitch says. But left unsaid is the fact that fans in more than two-thirds of current big-league cities are being asked to buy tickets and root for home teams that would have to improve to achieve mediocrity.

Ten of the 14 National League clubs and nine of the 14 American League clubs have sub-.500 records.

Apprised of those figures, the Phillies' Lee Thomas, one general manager who can't be blamed for the plight of his team, said, jokingly, "Is that parity?"

If so, it's parity at an alarmingly low level. So low that two of the divisional leaders — the Rangers in the AL West and the Dodgers in the NL West — are playing sub-.500 baseball.

That's a pretty sorry commentary on the state of the game. And, on top of that, there's the increasingly strong threat of a strike to dampen enthusiasm.

With that in mind, recent attendance figures are remarkable.

On Saturday, seven NL games drew a total of 305,305 fans, an average of 43,615. Only the Mets, who drew 29,592 in the rain for the Giants, failed to top 35,000.

Seven AL games attracted 243,946 fans, an average of 34,849, with four crowds — three of them to see non-contending home teams in Detroit, Toronto and Milwaukee — topping 35,000.

And here we are, with interest peaking, awaiting the start of a strike that could kill the postseason and leave baseball without a World Series in 1994.

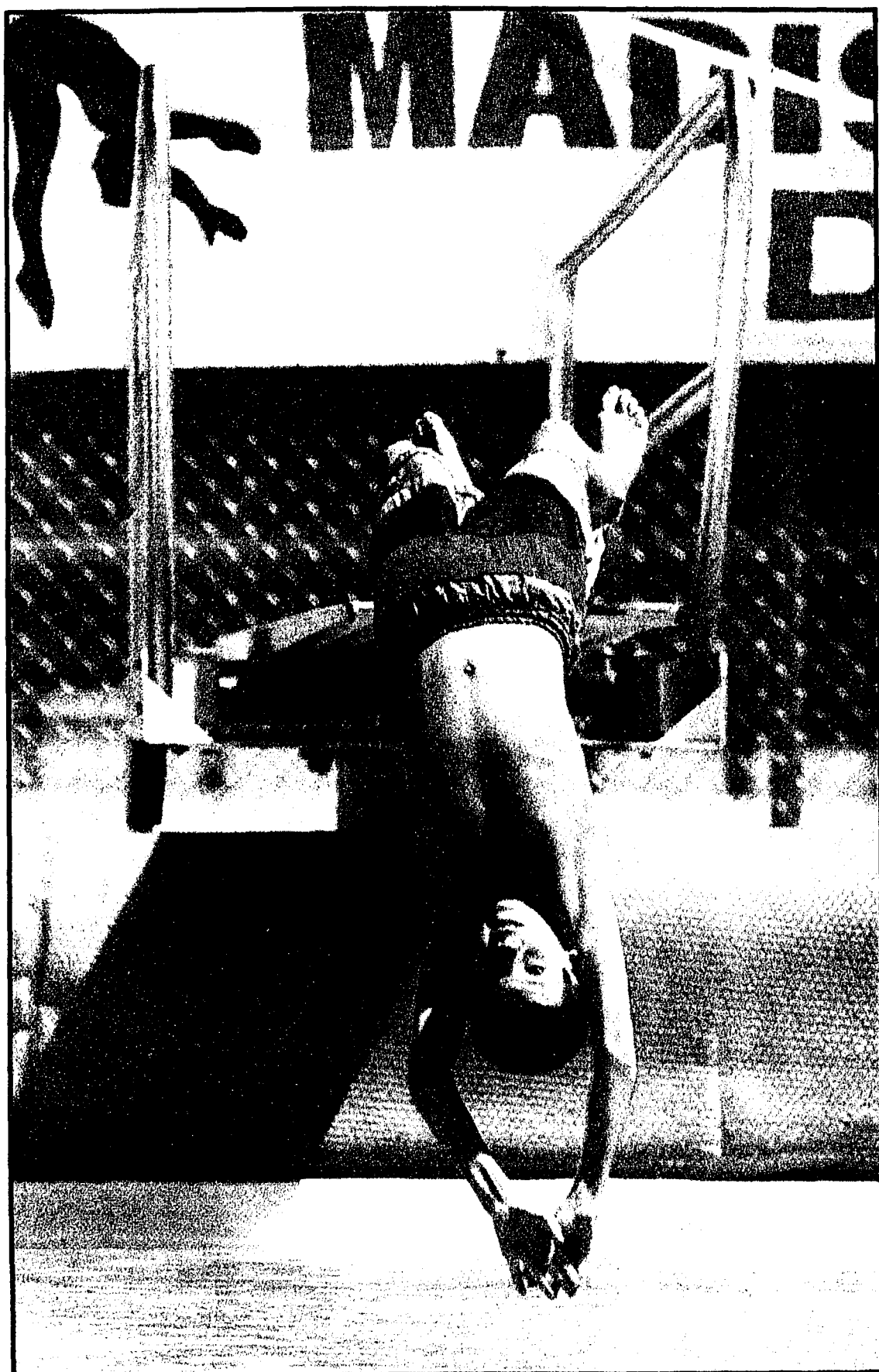
"(If it happens), it's going to hurt," Thomas said, "but I think baseball will survive. It always has."

He's probably right.

The people responsible for the mess baseball is in today — and the owners rank at the very top of the list — should thank their lucky stars that so many people love this game so much.

Finley leads Goodwill squad

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia (AP) — George Raveling has a dozen concerns about his young American basketball team's Goodwill Games semifinal against Italy.

"The 12 players that wear the uniform that says Italy on it, they all worry me," Raveling said after the United States defeated winless China, 99-80, Monday.

Wednesday's other semifinal pits Puerto Rico against undefeated Russia.

Monday's victory partly atoned for Sunday's 77-75 loss to Russia, a match in which the young Americans had the jitters from the first minute and never really lost them.

The team of collegiate players was more or less in command all the way against China. Lou Roe of Massachusetts led the scoring with 19 points and Michael Finley of Wisconsin came off the bench to score 16, including 13 in the first half. China's top scorer was Sun Jun with 20 points.

"To us, this is like an Olympics," Finley said. "Any time as a collegian you have a chance to

represent your country when the pros are now in the Olympics — we look at it as the Olympics.

"It was like we were out of synch coming into the Russia game," Finley added. "Our game is to run, we didn't get into that tempo last night and not all the time today. I think our best game is yet to come."

The Americans scored mostly on transition baskets and had a wide edge in rebounding. But even those advantages came only in spurts.

"We're probably the most impatient offensive team in this tournament," Raveling said. "We have a whole team of guys who

are used to having the ball."

When the game was tied early at 12-12, Shawn Respert of Michigan State scored eight straight points in just over 2 minutes to push the Americans ahead, 20-14.

But it was the 6-foot-6 Finley who provided an even more decisive lift. He scored nine points in just under 3 minutes to make it, 33-20, with 7 minutes, 41 seconds left in the half.

"He's been our most consistent player in the three games here at both ends of the floor," Raveling said of Finley.

Sharpe gets helping hand

Cobb adds ground game for Packers

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Running back Reggie Cobb carries expectations as easily as the football he tucks away, shrugging off pressure the way he slips past tacklers.

Green Bay general manager Ron Wolf spun the pressure valve wide open on Cobb this summer when he said the only positive way to look at losing tight end Jackie Harris to Tampa Bay was to consider it a trade for Cobb.

The Buccaneers got one of the best tight ends in the game when the Packers refused to match Tampa Bay's four-year, \$7.6 million offer to Harris.

In Cobb, a free agent who left Tampa Bay for a two-year, \$2.2 million deal, the Packers got a much-needed veteran running back with breakaway speed, somebody finally able to lighten the load of wide receiver Sterling Sharpe and quarterback Brett Favre.

"We'll see at the end of the year who got the better end of the deal," Cobb said, laughing.

It's widely anticipated that barring injury, Cobb will become the first Packers player in 16 years to rush for 1,000 yards.

But Cobb, who has 3,061 yards rushing in four seasons, said he actually feels less of a burden in Green Bay.

"It's a lot easier to go out and play where you're not the one focal point," Cobb explained. "Last year, we had a young quarterback (Craig Erickson) and our experienced receivers got hurt. So, teams knew we were going to run the ball and they kind of stacked up on us."

"They made it tough for us. And here, I don't think teams are going to be able to do that too much."

Not with Pro-Bowlers Sharpe, who broke his own single-season record with 112 receptions last year, and Favre, who ranked second in the league with 318 completions and second in the National Football Conference with 3,303 yards passing.

Green Bay coach Mike Holmgren said Cobb "gives us the type of back who can play every down. He is an exceptional, instinctive runner" who could become the first Packers player to rush for 1,000 yards since Terrell Middleton in 1978.

"I came here to help this team get a running game. As long as I do that, I think I have the opportunity to get 1,000," said Cobb, who rushed for 1,171 yards in 1992.

He was limited to 658 yards last year when he missed four games with a sprained left knee.

"I'm fine now. It's just something that needed time to heal. You don't have time to let it heal during the season," Cobb said.

At 26, Cobb said he feels fortunate to hook up with a team on the rise.

"My best years are ahead of me," he said. "Hopefully, being a part of a winning team will add to that. I didn't feel I could be the best back I could be in Tampa, the way things were going."

"Contrary to what people believe, there's a lot of talent in Tampa. It's just that things have never jelled together there. When you're not winning, you don't get the recognition."

Chmura injured

GREEN BAY (AP) — The Green Bay Packers' tight end situation is getting tighter.

The No. 2 man at that position, third-year Mark Chmura, will miss at least four weeks with a hamstring injury suffered Sunday afternoon.

A wide receiver who has been playing some tight end, Eric Boles, injured his hamstring last week. The extent of the injury wasn't immediately known. Boles is a second-year player in his first season with the Packers.

"We just have to wait. I'm hoping it's not as bad as it appeared," coach Mike Holmgren said.

Prior to Monday, a day which also included the signing of first-round draft pick Aaron Taylor to a contract believed to be for four years and worth \$4 million, the Packers' roster included only three other tight ends: Ed West, a 32-year-old in his 11th season, and two rookies, Charlie Dean and Jeff Wilner. Tight end Jackie Harris, an outstanding deep-threat receiver, departed for Tampa Bay in the off-season via free agency.

"It's one of those things," Holmgren said. "Every once in awhile, it seems like we get hit at a position."

But the Packers claimed rookie Bob Brasher on waivers from the Los Angeles Rams Monday afternoon in an effort to bolster the tight end position.

NASCAR drivers want protection at Brickyard

Early draws could hinder their chances

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — What's the biggest concern for the National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing's Winston Cup Series teams as they direct intense attention to the Aug. 6 Brickyard 400?

Making the field.

Approximately 80 cars have been entered, as drivers from a variety of sanctioning bodies want to be part of the first race other

than the Indy 500 ever held at Indianapolis Motor Speedway. A maximum of 44 cars will start.

Unfortunately — and unfairly — the qualifying format may play as much a part in who races and who doesn't as having a fast car.

Time trials for positions one through 20 will be decided in runs against the clock beginning at 2 p.m. (CDT) on Aug. 4. Qualifying runs starting at 2 p.m. Aug. 5 will set positions 21-40.

With so many cars in competition for a starting spot, trials will continue beyond 5 p.m. in the first round, and possibly that late in the second round.

This means a decided advantage for the drivers drawing late spots in the qualifying line. Both the air and

the racing surface will be cooler then, increasing speeds.

"The track might be as much as several tenths of a second faster late in the day," said three-time Winston Cup champion Darrell Waltrip. "Why do you think we see IndyCar drivers, who can qualify anytime they wish for the (Indianapolis) 500, wait as late as possible to go out?"

Winston Cup regulars are lobbying NASCAR officials to give them a break in 400 qualifying, the first round of which will be telecast live by ESPN.

The Waltrip brothers, Darrell and Michael, offer what seem fair ideas.

"They should let the full-time Winston Cup guys qualify last,

reversing the standings order among the top 40 in points to do it," Michael Waltrip said.

That would put Ernie Irvan, the points leader, last, and Dale Earnhardt next to last, with the 40th-place driver in the Winston Cup standings about midway through qualifying.

"I hope NASCAR will step up and do what's right," Michael Waltrip said.

Darrell Waltrip's suggestion is slightly different.

"Let the top 40 in Winston Cup points draw for the final 40 qualifying positions and the others who have entered from Winston West and ARCA (the Automobile Racing Club of America) and all the rest draw for the opening 40," he said.

"This may not seem fair to some degree."

"But I think for the benefit of those who compete on this circuit, who have their heart and soul and all their lifetime earnings invested in it, some accommodation should be made to give them every opportunity to make this field."

Said Earnhardt:

"I don't fault anyone for wanting to run that race. But if outsiders come in and bump our guys out of the race because they got a break in the time they qualified, it'll be tough to take."

"From what we've seen during testing at Indianapolis, I'd say if you draw an early number to qualify, your chances are cooked."

"We've worked to build our sport

and circuit and I think the full-time Winston Cup teams deserve to be in the 400, and if they aren't it'll take a little bit away from it."

So far, the only move NASCAR has made to distinguish between regulars and others is to separate them into practice groups.

Group I includes the top 40 in Winston Cup points plus the top five in the Winston West standings. Group II includes everyone not in Group I.

If possible, NASCAR should adopt one of the Waltrips' ideas, or a modification of the two.

For a race as important as the Brickyard 400, NASCAR needs to take care of its own.
