It's official: Seles shares top ranking

Martina Navratilova figured if Monica Seles was No. 1 when she left tennis, so she ought to be No. 1 when she returns to the game. And after a bit of a struggle, that's the way it will be.

Navratilova, president of the Women's Tennis Association, said that Seles will be ranked co-No. 1 with Steffi Graf when she returns to tournament tennis next month, 2½ years after Seles was stabbed in the back during a tournament in Hamburg, Germany.

"That's where she was and that's where she belongs," Navratilova said Wednesday.

The WTA made it official. For a while, there was some question whether the WTA would grant the co-ranking, especially after a contentious players meeting at Wimbledon.

"What happened was there was some misunderstanding and some miscommunication between the players and the agents," Navratilova said.

Seles was prepared to come back without a ranking and accept wild card invitations to tournaments. Navratilova, however, said that if Seles were not ranked, it would create early round matches between her and top-ranked players.

Under terms of the agreement, Seles and Graf will be co-ranked No. 1 for the first six tournaments Seles plays.

"The players had no problem with that," said Navratilova.

The problem, Navratilova said, was how Seles would be ranked after the first six events. One proposal was to calculate her standing based on the number of tournaments played rather than the regular minimum of 12 within a 52-week period. Among those opposed was Graf, who thought it would give an unfair advantage to Seles.

Graf was concerned her own chronically aching back might not allow her to play 12 tournaments and, in fact, Graf withdrew Wednesday from the Toshiba Tennis Classic because of her back.

■ No. 4 seed Todd Martin, a game away from elimination in the second set, rallied past No. 14 Byron Black, 4-6, 7-5, 6-1, to advance to the quarterfinals of the Legg Mason Tennis Classic.

Defending champion Stefan defeated Paul Wekesa, 6-2, 6-1; while Andre Agassi beat Michael Joyce, 6-2, 6-2.

Indiana was fined a record \$30,000 by the NCAA after Knight's explosive-filled outburst in a news conference following the loss to Missouri, but he was not suspended.

The committee said it had become concerned because one other head coach and two assistant coaches were reprimanded by the committee during the tournament.

"Consequently, the committee wants to ensure that student-athletes, coaches, administrators, alumni and fans conduct themselves in a manner that is consistent with the operating principles of the association."

■ The NCAA men's basketball committee voted to raise ticket prices to the Final Four by \$30 with the top ticket going to \$100. Ticket prices for the 1997 and 1998 Final Four will be \$100, \$80 and \$55.

■ Phil Martelli, an assistant basketball coach at St. Joseph's the past 10 years, was hired as head coach. He replaces John Griffin, who resigned to return to private business.

Martelli, 40, graduated in 1976 from Widener University outside Philadelphia. His hiring breaks a string — dating to 1953-54 — of seven straight St. Joseph's head coaches who were graduates of the school.

Watson in a familiar spot

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland — From one end of the golf spectrum to the other, the first round of the 124th British Open provided something for everyone Thursday.

It ranged from the sublime story line to the frightful spectacle, from Tom Watson, Ben Crenshaw, John Daly and Mark McNulty all going around the Old Course in 67 strokes to Jack Nicklaus taking a 10 on one hole.

There have been wilder rounds in the 124-year history of the Open. But not many. Watson, 45, Crenshaw, 43, McNulty, 41, and Daly, 29, are an unusual quartet of leaders at 5-under par.

Three old guys and a good old boy on the Old Course? Why not? The ball takes funny bounces over here, something to which Nicklaus will attest to later.

First things first. The furious day began on a crazy note. Watson hooked his opening tee shot almost into the 18th fairway, hooked his second shot with a 7-iron just over the Swilcan Burn and 70 feet from the hole, and then slammed the putt for birdie.

"Pretty nice start," Watson deadpanned. It foreshadowed a pretty nice finish, though. Watson went on to shoot his lowest first round in 21 Opens, birdieing five holes and eagling one.

BRITISH OPEN

All of a sudden, here we go again. The sky is gray, the wind is up, the golf is on the links and Watson is tied for the lead at the British Open.

"I played some pretty good golf coming in," he said. "It's always nice to get back to the Open Championship. I love links golf and playing the kind of shots that it demands."

Some people get sand in their shoes. Watson gets sand — old sod. The five-time British Open champion hasn't won a golf tournament since 1987 and he hasn't won a major championship since the 1983 British Open. But he is again in contention here, just as he was last year.

How he holds up is still to be seen, but in the meantime there are plenty of other possibilities.

Daly figures he can drive the green at six of the par-4 holes, did it on one (the 316-yard 12th) and will try to arm-wrestle the place into submission. Crenshaw is looking for his second major of the year; he won the Master's in April.

Lurking a stroke behind at 68 are Vijay Singh, Bill Glasson, Mats Hallberg and Northern Ireland native David Feherty.

In a group of nine players at 69 is the menacing apparition of

Corey Pavin, whose reputation and confidence have been enlarged by his U.S. Open victory last month.

Of all the things that happened at the haunted old links, Nicklaus' quintuple bogey was the most amazing. It happened at the 14th hole, the 567-yard, par 5 that is called simply "Long" and statistically is the hardest par 5 in championship golf.

Nicklaus hit a good drive over the Beardies and had a 3-wood in his hands. He had 200 yards to carry Hell Bunker, the deep, dark trap that sits 83 yards from the green. He hit what he thought was a good shot and thought he would find his ball 30 yards in front of the bunker.

As he walked past it, he heard his son, who was caddy for him. "There's a ball in the bunker," Steve Nicklaus said.

"Bunker, hell," his father replied. "That's Hell."

And it was. Nicklaus left his first shot in the bunker. Outraged, he tossed his club out and got his sand wedge. He thrashed at the ball again. And again.

"It was frustrating," Nicklaus said. "I was just looking for a way, any way, to get out of there."

Finally, on the fourth attempt, he was out. He tossed his club again, and pitched his ball 35 feet from the hole in 7 strokes.

"To add insult to injury," he said, "I then three-putted."

Bucks open season at Boston

The Milwaukee Bucks will get a chance to inaugurate the Fleet Center when they open their National Basketball Association season Nov. 3 against the Boston Celtics.

The Bucks' home opener is Nov. 4 against the New York Knicks at the Bradley Center.

In the schedule announced Thursday, the Bucks are slated to host the Chicago Bulls Dec. 9 and April 16 and play the two-time defending NBA champion Houston Rockets only once in Milwaukee — on Nov. 16.

According to the 1995-96 schedule, the NBA's new teams make their home debut against beatable teams. Toronto is scheduled to open at home Nov. 3 against the New Jersey Nets, 30-52 last season, and Vancouver is to play host Nov. 5 to the Minnesota Timberwolves, 21-61 in 1994-95.

But the NBA noted the schedule is contingent on a "timely" resolution of the labor situation.

In the first labor action in its history, the NBA locked out its players on July 1 after the players' association failed to ratify a new collective bargaining agreement. The league and the union will meet Tuesday in the first bargaining session since the lockout.

NBC will televise 26 games, including a Christmas doubleheader and the Feb. 11 All-Star Game at San Antonio.

Other highlights of the 1995-96 schedule:

■ New York at Detroit on Nov. 3, a game featuring two coaches starting with new teams, Don Nelson with the Knicks and Doug Collins with the Pistons.

■ A Christmas Day matchup between the Rockets and the team they swept in the NBA Finals, the Orlando Magic.

UW opens season in Hawaii

Bennett, Badgers start off with tough tournament

Dick Bennett will make his basketball coaching debut with the University of Wisconsin off the beaches of Hawaii in the Maui Invitational Nov. 20.

UW is one of eight teams (along with defending National Collegiate Athletic Association champion UCLA, North Carolina, Villanova, Michigan State, Vanderbilt, Santa Clara and host Chaminade) in the three-day tournament. North Carolina lost to Arkansas in the Final Four last year.

The Badgers' 1995-96 schedule, announced Thursday, begins with exhibitions against the Croatian national team Nov. 7 and Marathon Oil Nov. 15. The regular season home opener is Nov. 28 against Northeastern Illinois and the Big Ten opener is Jan. 3 against Michigan.

The non-conference schedule features games at Wright State Dec. 6 and Providence Dec. 11 and is highlighted by a New Year's Eve game against Marquette at the Field House.

The Badgers' only national television appearance is Feb. 22 against Northwestern on ESPN. The UW game at Ohio State Jan. 31 will be carried on ESPN2.

We start with the New York Knicks, who just raised the price of courtside seats at Madison Square Garden to \$1,000 per game. Yes, that's 500 bucks an hour to see a rugby team play the Clippers. Spike Lee has already plunked down 82

grand for a pair in the front row.

Spike, do the right thing and get a refund. Use that cash to make Batman IV, a film about a caped crusader determined to save basketball from Gotham's greedy goons. Quit yelling at Reggie Miller and let your cameras scream in indignation at those criminals posing as the Knicks front office.

Speaking of criminals, baseball needs Darryl Strawberry like television needs Ricki Lake. Meanwhile, the Yankees need pitching to stage a serious comeback in the American League East.

Instead, George Steinbrenner signs a power hitter whose judgment in the outfield is almost as bad as his judgment in life. If you're scoring at home, that's multiple drug charges, tax evasion, domestic abuse and drunken driving — a quadruple play.

Tyson also expects the world to stop and worship his greatness when he returns to the sport next month — and fights a tomato can named Peter McNeely.

Most telling, however, is the fact that Tyson never apologized for his crime. He may still be the best fighter in the world, but he's also a convicted rapist who has failed to show remorse.

That same emotion was not easy to detect in interviews with Richie Parker, a heavily recruited Manhattan prep basketball star who forced a girl at his school to perform oral sex on him. Division I powers Utah and George Washington backed off only after public outcry forced their retreat.

Now that other schools have shied away from Parker, the big debate is whether this 18-year-old deserves a second chance. Few have focused on the victim, who has already had to transfer schools twice since the incident.

New York is not alone. Bobby Cox, Brian Blades and Warren Moon are other sad case studies and Saturday's managerial brawl between Phil Garner and Terry Bevington was ridiculous.

Still, it's time for the city that never sleeps to give us a rest. If that happens, maybe we'll follow a new trend and erase these nightmares.

Labor of love

Brewers' Givens overcomes odds to reach dream

MILWAUKEE — If left-hander Brian Givens were in the San Francisco or San Diego organizations, baseball would've missed one of the best stories of the year.

In Milwaukee, a union town if ever there was one, Givens, a 29-year-old former replacement player, was able to put on a Brewers uniform when his number was called and end more than a decade of heartache.

No, he wasn't welcomed with hugs and handshakes, but he wasn't shunned either.

He wasn't treated like Joel Chimelis, the replacement player who spent two days with the Giants before being sent back to the minors after a closed-door clubhouse meeting he wasn't allowed to attend.

He wasn't ostracized like former replacement outfielder Ira Smith, whose call-up to the Padres voted not to permit.

So in Milwaukee, of all places, Givens, a veteran of hard knocks and five elbow operations, finally

Walker suffers bad break

Packers' cornerback sidelined indefinitely

GREEN BAY — Often-injured Sammy Walker, battling with Lenny McGill and top draft pick Craig Newsome for time at left cornerback, has a broken finger and could miss most of Green Bay's training camp.

Walker broke the middle finger at the end of Sunday's drills when he reached to deflect a pass to flanker Robert Brooks.

"They've been working on us stripping a lot and I reached in for it and all my fingers bent back," Walker said. "I put them back in place and I was like, 'one ain't moving a lot.' So I walked over to the trainer and he said it was broken."

There was disagreement over

just how long Walker will be out.

Walker said he hoped to be back on the field later this week. Coach Mike Holmgren said he would miss at least two weeks.

"He broke his hand, so they're going to operate and put a couple of screws in there," Holmgren said, "and then he'll have two weeks where he can't do anything at all, and then after that, week-by-week."

"They say as soon as the wound heals up I can get right back out there," Walker said. "I'll definitely have to wear a cast for six weeks. That's a gimme."

Last year, Walker's promising training camp was cut short when he dislocated his right elbow in an exhibition game at New Orleans Aug. 19. He was placed on injured reserve, forcing him to miss the entire season.

Earlier in the year, he had to

fight through lingering Achilles' tendinitis and the effects of a car accident. This summer, he got into a fight with a man who uttered a racial epithet at him.

"I don't really believe in luck because if I did, all mine's just bad," Walker said. "I'd would be looking at it bad if it weren't for the fact that a lot of coaches have been supportive of me. They know guys have had bad strings and then you pop out of it."

McGill is coming off surgery to repair a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee and last week he strained his hamstring.

Meanwhile, 27-year-old wide receiver Brad Lamb, a three-year veteran with the Buffalo Bills, decided to retire rather than try making the team.

Simpson's Hall bust found

CANTON, Ohio (AP) — Police on Monday began searching for a man suspected of stealing a bronze bust of O.J. Simpson from the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

The undamaged bust was found Monday, lying on the side of Interstate 77 in Cleveland, about 50 miles north of the Hall.

The 35-pound, 2-foot-tall bust was stolen from a pedestal Sunday after the kickoff parade for the annual Hall of Fame Week, which culminates Saturday with inductions into the Hall of Fame.

Simpson, on trial in Los Angeles in the slayings of his ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend Ronald Goldman, was inducted into the Hall in 1985.

The football shrine has bronze

busts of all 180 members.

Hall employees reported the theft at about 5 p.m. Sunday, after a family touring the facility noticed the empty Simpson pedestal, said museum spokesman Don Smith. The bust had been anchored to the pedestal by a large bolt.

Smith said there were about 1,300 visitors at the Hall Sunday. The bust was the first ever stolen from the Hall.

"The bust is a commissioned piece of art that is replaceable," Smith said. "It would not seem to have much value on the selling market because there is only one bust of that nature and whoever has it could be identified."

Other Simpson memorabilia,

including a football jersey and his 1968 Heisman Trophy, were not disturbed.

Pete Elliott, the Hall director, said no precautions had been taken to safeguard the statue after Simpson's arrest in June 1994. Smith said no extra security to protect the remaining Simpson items was planned.

Cleveland Police detective Denise Reeves said two Ohio Department of Transportation maintenance workers found the bust near downtown Cleveland, then called police.

Police said they had a description of a possible suspect, but no arrests had been made. A composite sketch of a white male, about age 30, was released Monday.

Brewers hold off Mariners

SEATTLE — Jose Valentin hit a home run and Fernando Vina had a pair of triples as the Milwaukee Brewers overcame Edgar Martinez and the Seattle Mariners, 6-4, Monday night in an American League baseball game.

Martinez, the major leagues' leading hitter at .366, homered twice and drove in three runs. The Mariners left 14 runners on base.

Seattle manager Lou Piniella was thrown out by plate umpire Terry Craft in the bottom of the sixth inning after arguing a strike on Joey Cora.

Ricky Bones (6-7) went five innings and improved his career record to 3-0 against Seattle. Bill Wegman followed with 2½ scoreless innings and Mike Fetters pitched the ninth for his 13th save.

Milwaukee took a 4-0 lead in the first against former Brewers player Chris Bosio (6-5), who lost his fourth straight decision. Two of the runs were unearned because of left fielder Warren Newson's error.

Vina opened the game with a triple and scored when Newson failed to catch Jeff Cirillo's line drive. Dave Nilsson followed with a two-run double and David Hulse's groundout drove in the fourth run.

After Seattle scored a run in

the first on Jay Buhner's infield single, the Brewers made it 5-1 in the second on Vina's second triple and Cirillo's double-play ground ball.

Martinez led off the third inning with a home run and hit a two-run homer in the fourth, giving him 16 for the season. Valentin hit his eighth homer to lead off the sixth.

Martinez hit two home runs in a game for the fifth time in his career and the first time this year. He had gone 13 games without a homer. His 16 homers are two shy of his career high set in 1992 when he won the AL batting title with a .343 average.

For the Brewers, Vina became the 10th player in franchise history to triple twice in a game.

BRISTOL, Conn. — It's just past noon and the Babe and the Boss are rapping about the Yankees over airwaves across the country.

George from New York, not a first-time caller, will wait behind Bruce in Fresno and Norm in Chicago to chat with "The Fabulous Sports Babe."

George Steinbrenner doesn't mind being put on hold. That way, the Yankees' owner can listen to "The Fabulous Sports Babe Show" until his turn comes up.

The calls show just how far Nanci Donnellan has come in the year since she became the first woman to host a national sports radio show.

"I've been trying to get him for 10

years, and one day he calls up and says 'I want to talk to her. I like her,'" says Donnellan, who prefers to be called the Babe.

The ranks of her fans, mostly males aged 18-34, have grown since she began broadcasting from her tiny studio at ESPN Radio Network headquarters in Bristol. Only an estimated 3 to 4 percent of callers get through.

Her syndicated program, which cele-

brated its first anniversary July 4, is broadcast weekdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. to nearly 140 affiliates, up from 30 in the beginning.

As soon as a Houston station signs up next month, the show will be heard in eight Top 10 markets. New York and Boston have not been cracked.

The program airs in Madison on The Team (1550 AM). With Donnellan on vacation this week, it is being hosted by

ESPN SportsCenter's Keith Olbermann. The time off gives the Sports Babe a chance to savor some of her success.

"She really took us from a part-time service to a seven-day-a-week syndication," said Mark Mason, general manager of ESPN Radio Network. "It takes time to build an audience. But in a year, the growth has been astronomical. And we're still growing."

There is a reason why: The Babe blends humor and in-depth knowledge of sports into a hip format.

"Using a syndicated personality in the morning usually doesn't work. She's so darn good that that doesn't come into play," said Jim Johnson, president and general manager of KFXN in Portland,
